# Klomp Sees "Crucible" as Best Since "Apley"

Last Tuesday's performance of Arthur Miller's The Crucible by the Alma College Masquers under the direction of Professor Gregory was, in my opinion, the best dramatic performance on the Alma campus since The Late George Apley in 1952. Even in the latter, in spite of some outstanding individual performances, the acting was not as uniformly good as it was in The Crucible. The fact that there were so many prominent roles was a good feature because it gave several Masquers an opportunity to display their talent, and none of the seven or eight leading actors turned in a mediocre performance.

One of the gratifying features of the production was that certain students who had not particularly distinguished themselves in earlier plays suddenly exhibited talent of which we were not wholly aware. The Crucible was a real challenge, and the actors responded to it remarkably

Perhaps the greatest surprise of the evening was the excellent acting of Edna La Fleur, who had performed well but not impressively in previous plays. Her voice quality and personal mannerisms were peculiarly adapted to the roll of the weak-willed Mary Warren, and she played it very convincingly.

Equally striking was Bob Woods' portrayal of the highminded and earnest Reverend John Hale.
