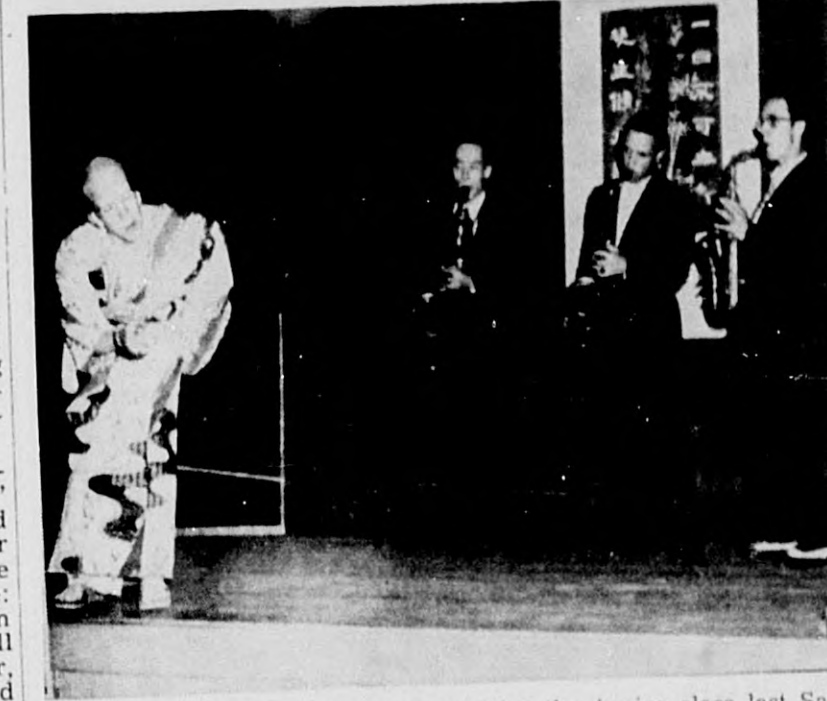
Congratulations are also in order for Jackie McAllister and brother Ken Smith who were recently pinned.

Prof. Glen C. Stewart of Alma College will play some organ works of Bach and some contemporary compositions as part of a Vesper Service to be presented at the First Methodist church of Alma on Sunday evening, April 22, at 8:00 a.m.

Prof. Stewart will be assisted by Dr. Samuel Thorndike, violist, in the performance of a modern composition for the viola and organ.

This is the first in a series of three organ programs to be presented by Prof. Stewart at the Methodist Church. The first two on April 22 and May 20 will be vesper programs and the third on July 1, the opening day of Sentennial week, will be a formal concert promoted by the Centennial Committee as a part of the churches' program for the week.

## Spring Choir Tour Begins

The Alma College A Cappella Choir leaves on Thursday, April 18, on its annual spring tour. The trip this year takes the choir not only to some half dozen of the chief cities of Michigan but also to Niagara Falls and Hamburg, New York and to Welland, Ontario, Canada.

The choir has already sung its spring concert at Greenville and Grand Rapids. Then last Saturday, the group sang a concert as guest choir and Professor Ernest G. Sullivan, head of the college music department, served as a judge at the High School Choir Festival at Bad Axe. Present at the festival were five hundred choir members from District three high schools, District three covering generally the Michigan Thumb area.

Professor Sullivan has again chosen a program of music for the tour which will appeal to the most diverse tastes. The selections range from the incomparable polyphonic music to the 17th century, Bach chorales, and Negro spirituals, to anthems by contemporary composers, and modern songs.

The choir this year numbers fifty members, coming from cities, towns, and farms scattered throughout the country. Each year finds new lustre added to this splendid group's already bright reputation, and it is being increasingly hailed as one of the mid-west's finest college choirs.
