Biology Club News

At the meeting on April 12th, the biology club was privileged to hear Dr. Loren G. Burt, M.D., from Alma. Dr. Burt spoke on the interesting subject of "Hypnosis and the Mind." He began the informal lecture by stating that most people do not really know themselves. He illustrated this point by several examples of some of the things manner people can be sick, when there is actually no organic dis-turbance. Such a case was review-ed of a girl who had polio and was unable to swallow. Several years later a psychiatrist treated her by hypnotia her by hypnotic means and her the research course. ability to swallow was restored. Many cases are not of this degree, but Dr. Burt explained the use of hypnosis as a therapeutic agent in the treatment of certain types of Alumnus Receives functional disorders. 


