The contest rules, according
to Miss Wills, librarian are as follows:

1. The contest is open to students of Alma College, except student library assistants and members of the
2. Fifty pictures illustrating literary selections are in the 1 i brary. The selections incluad fables, short stories, poems, novels, operas, and ${ }^{\text {songs. }}$. The correct titles must be printed or typewritten on a sheet of paper opposite the coresponding numbers of the pic tures. The contestant's name and address must appear in the upper right hand corner of the entry sheet.
3. The entry sheet must be in the contest box in the library by $5: 00$ P.M., Monday, Apri 20. Answers
following day.

The winner will be able to order a book of his choice from List of more than 65 Classics his prize. Judges for the contest are Dr. Kirk, Miss Deifenbach, and Miss Pigg.
Miss Wills stated that the person with the largest number of correct titles will be the winner, even if no one is able to identify every one. In relation to the slogan "Wake Up and Read" she asks, "Have you been asleep? You will know the an-
swer when you try the contest.
This will be the second ob-

Mr. Paul Sarver Sicrey, an Assistant Professor of English at Aima Ccllege was one of sev-enty-three men and women
from across the country who have been chosen for the 1959 Danforth Teacher Study Grants. according to an announce ment made by Dr. Pressley C. McCoy. Associate Director of the Therh Founciation
The successful candidates
were chosen from four hundred hirty-nine nominations provided by the deans of the accredited colleges in the United States The selection was made on the basis of academic ability, personal qualities promising suc cess in teaching, and religious maturity in the candidate's own area of faith.

## Library Must Keep Pace With New Curriculum

With the increased emphasis on independ－ ent research and study featured in Alma＇s new is an incressed goes into descending upon the college library facilities．

In truth，the move toward more independent experience in liberal education has gained con－ withstanding the new program．The load on the library has increased proportionately．

It is unreasonable to expect library holdings to be reduplicated to the point of＂nominal re－ serve shelves．The variety of holdings is more important than the quantity．This has been evi－ denced here with the librarys increased subscrip－ tione to periodical literature．Bound journals are without the telium of＂stack－running．＂

However，it is equally unreasonable to ex－ pect the student＇s problems concerning＂reserve books＂to be solved by mere＂scheduling＂of his hours in the library．Regardless of the student＇s
schedule arrangement，there still remains but a schedule arrangement，there still remains but a
limited and unchanged number of hours in which limited and unchanged num
a given book is available．

A new library for Alma College is now rated high－priority，but the word＂priority＂carries no dareline．In the meantime，present facilities must do－and they are sorely tried even now．What will be the situation next year？

It is not unusual for colleges the size of Alma
to provide 24 hour library service．A number －lose their doors only from midnight Saturday un－ ail noon Sunday．Very fero of them close for supper and most
morning．

Although various improvements in Alma＇s library hours have been tried in the past two years， none were continued for $a$ full year and none of these plans took into account Almis increased efforts in the felld of independent study．Hence
these well．meant experiments were hardly these well－meant experiments were hardly signifi． Contra
Contrary to President Swanson＇s recommen－ dations at the March 18 Open Forum，the prob－ lem is not one to be hashed over endlessly in stu－

Miss MacCurdy has done，and is doing outstanding job．Her skill in the field of library science is recognized throughout the state．Alma College is indeed fortunate in being able to count her as a member of its liberal arts community． But she is only one person，not a whole corps，and she is limited in time and budget as are the rest

Until a new library is built，any solution to this growing problem must be an expedient．Expedi－ ents are not always the most desirable solutions but a solution we must have．

With its already many tasks，the administra－ tion has little time for added burdens，but cer－ tainly the problem is as＂priority＂entitled as the proposed new building．The only way，then，to tack the problem objectively，now．
