### No Off-Campus Housing For Men Next Year

Announce Special Procedure For Room Selections; Reservation Deadlines

All men students, except those who are married or are living with parents or guardians, will be required to live in the campus residence halls, or in one of the three fraternity houses next year. Off-campus housing will not be permitted.

Students desiring a room in the residence halls must pay a \$25.00 room reservation fee to the cashier in the Business Office between the dates of April 4 and April 30. Students who have not paid their reservation fee or made arrangements to live in a fraternity house will be assigned to rooms in the residence halls.

A special procedure will be followed for room selection. All men who pay their room reservation fee by April 30 will have an opportunity to select their rooms. Those who desire to retain their present rooms may do so by paying their reservation fee.

If a man wishes to change rooms he will follow this procedure. Room selections will be made on Wednesday evening, May 4, in the Wright Hall Lounge, and will be in order of seniority.

Seniority within a class and the hall in which the student may make his room selection will be established by a drawing of numbers. The time for the drawing will be 8:00 p.m. for seniors, 8:30 p.m. for juniors, and 9:30 p.m. for sophomores.

Students who desire to retain their present rooms, or who desire a room in Wright Hall, or who are seniors, will not draw for hall placement, but only for order of selection in a class.

Approximately 70% of the juniors, and 30% of the sophomores may draw room selections in Mitchell Hall. A total of 16 places in each of the seven classes will be reserved for freshmen. A waiting list will be (Continued on page 2)

### Council Takes Action On Line Cutters

Two of the major items of business discussed at the student Council meeting were line cutting in the dining hall, and student reaction to the plan to bring an African student to Alma at the expense of the student body.

Student council will begin taking the names of those persons observed cutting line and will turn those names over to the president of the offender's sorority, fraternity, or residence hall. Line cutting will not be excused in any instances except student teachers, who have a 1:00 class. Holding a place for someone while he hangs up his coat and other excuses similar to this will not be accepted.

It is hoped that action further than an acquainting of the student body with the council policy will not be necessary. A mature student body should be willing to accept such a policy graciously.

A report from all the organizations on campus contacted about the idea of supporting an African student at Alma proved highly favorable. The plan will now go to the com- (Continued on page 2)

### Deterline Book To Be Published

Faculty Members Busy On Panels, Lec., Conf.

The Alma College faculty has been serving on panels, appointed to office and had a book accepted for publication.

Soon to be published is "Contemporary Learning Theory," a textbook written by Psychology professor, Dr. William Deterline. The book will be used by advanced undergraduates and beginning graduate students, and will be published in early 1961.

Dean of Men Kent Hawley was elected as one of sixteen delegates in the United States to the American College Personnel Association, a policy-making group that represents all personnel in training.

Athletic Director Art Smith was selected to lecture at the annual Pacific-Northwest coaches' clinic next June, held at Gonzaga University, Spokane, Wash. Smith will speak on the Pass Offense in football, having had three All-MIAA players in the last three years.

Admissions Director John Kimball will serve on a panel at the Guidance Conference to be held at Central Michigan University, April 29, dealing with "Present Trends in College Admission Policies."

Assistant Professor of Elementary Education, Mrs. Elizabeth Hartley, served on a panel of the Michigan Association for Higher Education at Wayne State University last week. Harlan McCall, head of the Alma College department of Education, was elected president-elect of the state group.

### Board Extends Deadline for Scotsman Applicants Until April 8; Stephens To Head Almanian

Sharon Stephens, Chicago sophomore, will be at the helm of the almanian next year as Managing Editor according to action taken by the Publication Board which met Tuesday evening. The Board also appointed Millie Howe, Decatur sophomore, editor-in-chief of the almanian, and David Marentette, Grosse Pointe junior, business manager of the paper.

The Board decided to extend the application deadline for the positions of the Scotsman editor and business manager until Friday, April 8.

There were five salaried positions to be filled and all of the candidates, except one, were completely unopposed.

Miss Stephens next year will fill the position this year held by Mary Onapu, Frankenmuth junior, who after three years with the almanian is stepping down "to try something different."

Stephens has been with the almanian two years and this year holds the position of editor-in-chief. This is the position Miss Howe will hold next year. Howe has been with the almanian two years and this year holds the spot of news editor.

Marentette will be assuming the position of the business manager with the paper for his second year.

The present editor and business manager of the Scotsman Brian Westveer and Doug Woodard did not submit applications for the positions next year. The deadline was extended to April 8 to seek out all capable and possible students for this work.

### Saturday Is Women's R.A. Deadline

All women who are interested in becoming a Resident Advisor in either Mary Gelston or Pioneer Hall should apply before the March 26 deadline.

Next year 7 women will be needed as R. A.'s in Mary Gelston Hall and 3 women will be needed in Pioneer Hall.

Any woman who is a junior or senior with a 2.00 or above average is eligible to apply for the position.

Applicants will be screened by a committee composed of the present R. A.'s, the Head Residents, and Mrs. Esther Vreeland. Recommendations for individual applicants are obtained by the committee from faculty members and corridor residents as well as from the senior women.

Resident Advisors for next year will be announced Friday, April 8.

### April 7 Test Day For Seniors, Sophs

All seniors and sophomores will take comprehensive exams Thursday morning, April 7. Specified seniors will take advanced tests in their major field in the afternoon.

The comprehensive tests will cover three areas: social science, humanities, and natural science. These tests are given nationally and Alma students will be rated and compared with students from other colleges.

Advanced tests will be given in the following areas: biology, chemistry, economics, education, engineering, French, geology, government, history, literature, mathematics, music, philosophy, physics, psychology, scholastic philosophy, sociology, Spanish, and speech.

### "Go Fly a Kite" Presented Here

The wit, wisdom, diplomacy and every-day "horse sense" of Benjamin Franklin was beautifully delineated by Dennis King in his program, "Go Fly a Kite" presented on Alma's campus Tuesday evening, March 22.

Using material long available to students of this fascinating personality of our history and also making use of new data revealed in recently found letters of Franklin, Mr. King presented a portrait of Franklin rarely equalled in literature or the theatre.

Mr. King and his audience followed Franklin from his youth in Philadelphia through his writing and publishing career, to the Continental Congress of the very youthful U.S. and finally to the courts of Europe where Franklin represented the new America as Ambassador.

"Go Fly a Kite" was a mentally stimulating program which gently reminded the audience of America's priceless heritage in a thoroughly entertaining fashion.

Born in Coventry, England, Dennis King began his theatrical career as a call boy at the Birmingham Repertory Theatre, (Continued on page 2)

board that will establish the need of each applicant and other selected references.

The loan procedure should be begun two months prior to the date the loan is needed to assure consideration, because

it takes approximately four weeks for the CSS form to be returned to the college. Therefore, applications will not be considered during the 10 days prior to the final processing of the application.

**Terms and Payments**

Loans are approved one semester at a time and all requests for renewal should be made to the Dean of Men 30 days prior to the semester for which the loan will be in effect. Loans will ordinarily be continued the rest of the academic year for the same amount as the first semester.

Loans may be made for educational expenses up to, but not to exceed \$500.00 per semester.

The first payment on the loan becomes due and payable one year after graduation. For those entering full-time graduate or professional training, the first payment shall become due one year from completion of their schooling.

Repayment of the loan may be spread over a period not to exceed 10 years. Loans shall bear interest at the rate of 3% per annum on the unpaid balance, beginning one year after graduation. Any portion of the loan paid during the first year after leaving Alma College shall be interest free.

Plans for repayment of the loan must be arranged with the Business Manager 10 days prior to the student's leaving college.

**Transfer and Drop-Out**

All Long Term Loans shall become due and payable on the date the student applies for transfer to another college, or drops out of Alma College. Exceptions to this policy will be reviewed by the Loan Committee. The payment schedule must be arranged with the Business Manager before the student leaves the college.

**Special Features**

Graduates who enter public school teaching may earn a 10% reduction of their loan obligation for each year of service in public school teaching, up to 50% of the loan.

An achievement award equal to 10% of the loan in effect for the semester will be granted, if the student achieves a "B" average for that specific semester. This amount, considered to be a scholarship, will be granted from scholarship funds.

If other scholarship money is received by the student during the semester, it will be deducted from the achievement award, and the student will receive the balance toward reducing his loan.

established for Mitchell Hall. The list will be used to fill any vacancies for the Fall and Spring Semesters. Choice from the list will be made by seniority.

In cases where students desire to room together, the higher seniority of the two will determine the room choice.

Students will lose their seniority and will be forced to draw for room choice after the last sophomore, if they have not paid their residence hall dues by April 21, or if they have three unsatisfactory room inspections before the drawing.

Drawings may be made by proxy, if the individual has the written consent of and the receipt from the person for whom he is drawing. However, the college reserves the right to alter room selections in cases of misconduct or serious abuse of college property.

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
