

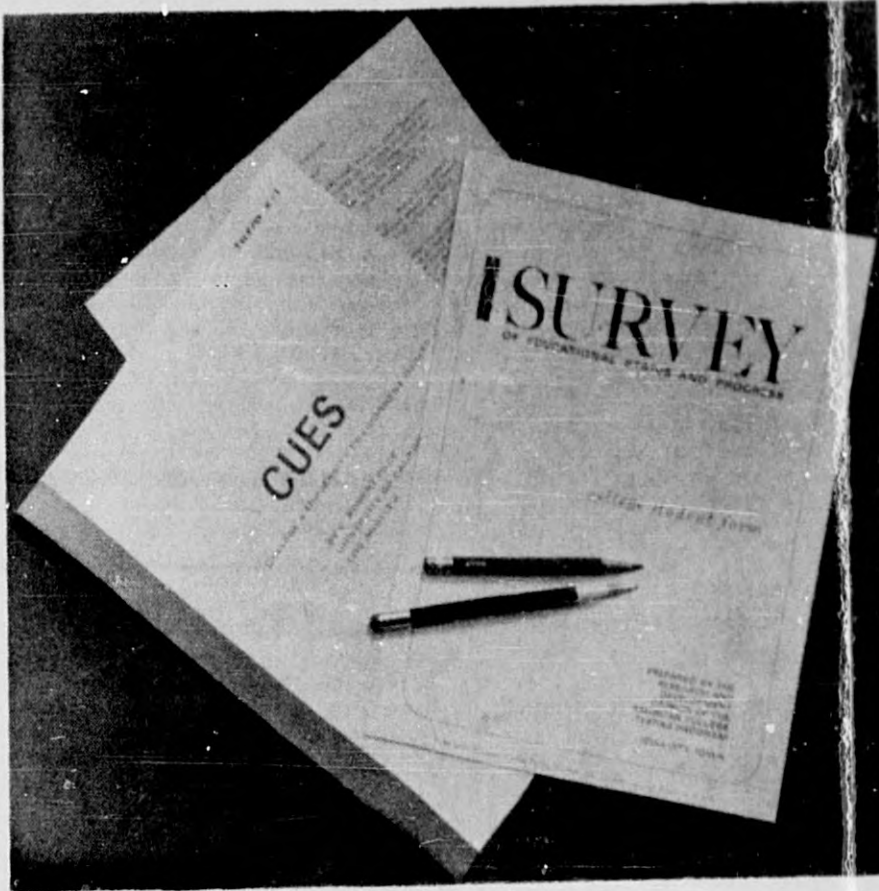

Views of Alma sought

During the next two weeks all Sophomores, Seniors and full time teaching members of the faculty will be asked to provide their opinions on many aspects of Alma College and its program as part of the CSCA Research Project.

All Sophomores and Seniors will be asked to express their views of the environment and program of the college on two instruments, the College and University Environment Scales and the Survey of Educational Status and progress. Dr. John Kimball, institutional director of the research project, stressed the point that these instruments are not questionnaires but are devices providing the students with an opportunity to express his opinions about the college in a very candid manner. All responses are confidential and no student will have his responses individually identified.

The results of the survey will be processed at the Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey and the American College Testing Program, Iowa City, Iowa. The responses of Alma College Sophomores and Seniors will be compared to the responses of like groups from the other CSCA schools to provide information valuable to a better understanding of campus environments on all twelve campuses.

Funds to carry on the research project are provided by the Federal Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The current allocation of funds was provided through the office of Dr. Joseph Murnin, Regional Director of Research, in Chicago.

Dr. Kimball indicated that the

CSCA colleges plan to continue the research project next year.

All Sophomores and Seniors living in college residence halls and houses will be provided with the opportunity to complete the instruments in the residence halls. Commuting students and men living in the fraternity houses will be contacted directly by Dr. Kimball and provided with an opportunity to complete the instruments.

PSI CHI PAPER-READING SESSION TO BE HELD ON CAMPUS THIS SATURDAY

The fifth annual paper-reading session sponsored by the Alma College Chapter of Psi Chi (psychology honorary) will be held on campus on March 30, this Saturday. This program is designed for psychology majors from all schools in the state of Michigan and allows an opportunity for undergraduate students to present and discuss brief papers on their original research or theoretical thinking.

Interested students and faculty are welcome to attend this event which will be held in Bow Auditorium. The schedule will be as follows: The morning session will be from 10 o'clock to 12 o'clock at which time 4 or 5 papers will be presented. From 1 o'clock to 2 o'clock a guest address will be given by Dr. Edward Walker, professor of psychology, University of Michigan. His topic will be "Reinforcement: The One Ring."

The afternoon paper-reading session will be from 2:30 to 4:00.

A Capella Choir presents spring concert Sunday

The Alma College A Cappella Choir, which recently completed a six-state eastern tour, will present a concert in Dunning Memorial Chapel on the college campus at 8 p.m. Sunday, March 31. Convocation credit will be given.

The concert will feature both The A-Cappella Choir and the Alma Singers, a select group of 16 vocalists. Both groups are directed by Dr. Ernest G. Sullivan.

The choir will sing "Alleluia We Sing with Joy" by Jacob Handl, "Motet for Double Choir" by J.S. Bach, "Sing We Merrily of God" by Martin Shaw, "Evening" by Zoltan Kodaly, "Wake a Joyful Noise" by Heinz Werner Zimmerman, and "Wash My Sins Away" by Weaver.

Other selections by the choir include "Motet, Op. 29, No. 2 - Psalm 51," Johannes Brahms; "Holy Radiant Light," Alexandre Goretchanoff; "Jojobalai," Robin and Rainger; "Laughing Song," Earl George; and "Brother Will, Brother John," Johnny Bacco.

Claudio Monteverdi; "Gehiauf, ihr Gaste," Erasmus Widmann; "April is in My Mistress' Face," Thomas Morley; "O occhi, manzonia," Orlando di Lasso; "Dolcissimo ben mio," Grazia Vecchi; "Lanster Quadrille," and "Father William" from "Alice in Wonderland," Irving Fine; "It's a Raggy Waltz," Dave Brubeck; "Carousel" selections, Rodgers and Hammerstein; and "Bouree," Fred Boch.

FELLOWSHIPS AWARDED TO A.C. STUDENTS

Three Alma College students and one from Adrian College have been awarded fellowship to participate this summer in Alma College's 1968 undergraduate biological research program.

The program, financed by a grant from the National Science Foundation, will enable the four students to spend 12 weeks on full-time research projects in cooperation with Alma College biology staff members Dr. Ronald O. Kapp and Dr. Arlan L. Edgar.

The student researchers are Richard L. Walker, Alma College junior from Troy; Joseph S. Leach, Alma college junior from Bridgeport; James A. Ogg, Alma College senior from Gladwin; and Thomas St. Clair, Adrian College senior from Adrian.

Walker will work with Dr. Edgar in research involving the effects of air pollution on invertebrates. Leach, Ogg and St. Clair, working with Dr. Kapp, will do research on plant ecology, pollen analysis, or both.

CAMPUS NOTES

Monday and Tuesday of next week, Peace Corps representatives will be in Tyler offering general information and answering questions. Director of the Midwest Recruiting, John W. (Bill) Todd, and his wife, Anita, will be at Alma to lead recruitment this year.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Todd worked from 1965 to 1967 in a community development program in Sierra Leone. Bill Todd helped introduce new rice varieties and methods of rice cultivation, as well as a new vegetable crop for commercial and home use. Under his encouragement, a construction company was established which furthered the housing possibilities. He also worked with water control in swamps, and organized an adult literacy class.

Anita Todd organized sewing classes and held lecture-demon-

stration classes at the local maternity clinic on nutrition, child care and general health practices. In addition, she

organized a feeding program for children under five, using the available CARE commodities.

HUDSON AND HETRICK NAMED MOST VALUABLE PLAYERS

A freshman forward from Detroit and a four-sport letterwinner from Fowlerville have been named co-most valuable players on the 1967-68 Alma College basketball team that finished in a second-place tie in the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association (MIAA) race.

They are Charles Hudson, 6ft. 2in. freshman from Detroit Western High School who led the Scots in both scoring and rebounding this season, and Gordon Hetrick, an all-round athlete who has also lettered in football, baseball and track at Alma and last fall was co-winner of the MIAA most valuable football player award.

Alma coach Bill Klenk credits Hetrick with a leading role in the Scots' basketball comeback. The 1967-68 campaign was the first winning season for Alma since 1963-64 when it also finished second in the MIAA.

Hetrick came to Alma in the fall of 1966 as a transfer student from Lake Superior College. Klenk says, "Gordy was one of the transfers who took a gamble on us, who came in when our program was down and made our pro-

gram what it is.

Hetrick also played a leading role in Alma College's football comeback that culminated in the MIAA championship and an undefeated season last fall. He was both an offensive and defensive backfield star for the Scots and twice was named the MIAA's back of the week.

Hetrick, an all-MIAA selection at guard in basketball this year scored 322 points during the season, averaging 14.6 per game.

Hudson set a freshman scoring record at Alma with a season total of 369 points, highest on the team. He also led the Scots in rebounds with a 226 total.

"Charlie is by far the best basketball player at Alma in years," Klenk says, "and I think he'll be one of the finest ball players in the MIAA a year from now."

Hudson and John Fuzak of East Lansing were honorable mention listings on the 1967-68 all-MIAA squad. Fuzak, like Hetrick, was an all-MIAA football selection last fall.

Alma nine upsets Georgia

Alma's 1968 baseball nine returns to Michigan following a booming display of offensive power in Georgia. With six performers clubbing above the 300 mark, the Scots won two, including a "season-making" 5-4 upset over awesome Georgia Tech, dropped three, and tied one.

The first three southern encounters were rather gloomy ones as Coach Charley Skinner's unit lost consecutive tilts to Berry College 14-11 and 7-1 and Georgia Tech, 14-3. The locals out-hit the Mt. Berry squad 15-11 and 9-8 in losing causes.

But Thursday saw Peter Schmidt and Captain Rob Masson pole eighth inning homers to overcome a 4-1 deficit over Tech. Schmidt's second HR of the contest was a 385 ft. shot with a mate aboard. Jerry Ernst and freshman Randy Mast divided the hurling duties.

Gordon Hetrick was the winning pitcher in the opener of a Friday afternoon double header with Augusta College. A grand slam round-tripper by Jack Ward was the big blow in the 10-6 victory. Larry Kirchner smacked a home run with all sacks occupied to salvage a 7-7 deadlock in the nightcap.

The Scots open the Northern campaign Saturday, April 6, at Central Michigan University.

TENNIS TRIP IS SUCCESSFUL

The Alma College tennis team returns home after a successful Southern trip. The three meet tour was highlighted by shutout victories over Berry College at Rome, Georgia and Augusta College at Augusta, Georgia. The Scots' sole defeat was a 7-2 decision at the hands of powerful Oglethorpe College.

Barring ineligibility, the tennis squad will depend on the talents of returning lettermen Tim Lozen, Marc Sylvester, Don Anderson, Danny Williams, Paul Croom, and Ron Sexton. Also rated highly is Royal Oak freshman Jim Tarrant. Added support will come from senior Don Swanson and freshmen Bruce Rogers and Dave Lukins.

Once again the Scots will be trying to improve on their perennial fifth place finish in the MIAA. Kalamazoo will be seeking its 23rd straight title led by all-MIAA selection John Trump. No one is powerful enough to challenge Kaze's dominance but Hope, Calvin, and Albion are expected to put together strong squads.



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
