All re sponses are confidential and no student will have his responses individually identified.

## Hudson and Hetrick named

## MOST VALUABLE

A freshman forward from Detroit and a four-sport letterwinner from Fowlerville have been named co-most valuable players on the 1967-68 A1ma College basketball team that finished in a second place tie in the Michigan Inter collegiate Athletic Association (MIAA) race.

They are Charles Hudson, 6 ft
zin. freshman from Hetroit West ern ifigh School who led the Scot in boith scoring and rebounding this season, and Gordon Hetrich an all-round athlete who has also lettered in football baseball and track at Alma and last fall was co winater of tho MIAA most valuable feotball piayer award

Alma coach Bill Klenk credits Hetrick with a leading role in the Scots basketball comeback. The 1967-68 campaign was the first winzinis season for Alma Since 1963-64 when it also finished secend in the MIAA.

Hetrick came to Alma in the fal1 of 1966 as a transfer stu dent from Lake Superior College. Khenk says, 'Gordy was one of the transfers who took a gamble gras. who came in when our prograun was down and made our pro-
gram what it is
Hetrick also played a leading role in Aima college's footbai comeback that culminated in the MIAA championship and an undefeated season last fall. He wa: both an offensive and defensive backfield star for the Scots and twice was named the MIAA's bach of the week.

Hetrich, an all-MIAA selection at guard in basketball this year scored 322 points during the sea son, averaging 14.6 per bame.

Hudson set a freshman scoring ecord at Alma with a season total of 369 points, highest on the eamounds with a 2 the scot rebounds with a 226 total
