Union Board Meets Tonight

Next year's newly organized Union Board will meet tonight. At 5:00 in the Student Council room in Tyler, all those students interested in planning next year's social calendar and all-campus events are urged to attend this meeting. With a \$23,000 budget and the initiation of Big Name Entertainment, next year will be extremely important and needs your help and suggestions in order to be successful.

The newly organized "Union Board" is a combination of the present Tyler Staff and Tyler Board. Under the old system, Tyler Staff was comprised of 4 paid students of equal position appointed by the Dean, to be responsible for co-ordinating the campus social activities and to control the Union, Tyler Board was a standing committee of Student Council, whose president was appointed by the President of Student Council. The Board was open to all students and worked with an approximate \$3,600 budget. With the new "Union Board" much of the "Staff-Board" confusion will be eliminated.

The five paid officers of the Union Board are chosen by the Dean and approved by Student Council. There are 5 manager positions: Business, Building, Big Name Entertainment, Major Events, Minor Events. One of these is elected president and is responsible for the cohesive-

ness of the officers as well as presiding over Union Board meetings. The Union Board Membership is open to everyone. From the members of the Union Board, committees will be selected and people will work on either Big Name Entertainment, Formal Events, Informal Events, or Movies. Each committee will have a vice-chairman. This is a fine opportunity for anyone interested in becoming an officer of the Board in future years to assume responsibility and gain experience in any of the areas mentioned. Two other jobs are available and will be paid: Secretary and Publicity. Chairman. This week three Alma debaters were honored at a special dinner for their contribution to the forensics program of the College during the current year. Singled out for particular commendation were Robert Aumaugher, Jack Roslund, and Larry Nelsen.

Under provisions of an endowment left by Adelbert Lindley, Class of 1911, the three recipients of the Lindley Award received \$50.00 (Aumaugher), \$30.00 (Roslund), and \$20.00 (Nelsen).

Prior to the presentation Professor Robert W. Smith, Director of Forensics, recalled for the debaters and their guests how college debate embodies the principles of free speech in a free society.

On Tuesday evening, May 28, the Art Department will present the Swedish film, *Sawdust and Tinsel*, (also known as *The Naked Night*). This film was written and directed by Ingar Bergman and is one of his earlier works (1953).

In *Sawdust and Tinsel*, Bergman takes a sustained look at the darkest side of the human personality. The plot is often reminiscent of the masochistic drama of the German theatre of the 1920's. Lighting, decor and music are all used to build up a sinister atmosphere. This is one of Bergman's so-called "dark" films.

The film will be shown at 9:30 p.m. in Dow Auditorium. It is 82 minutes long. There is no charge for admission.
