## **McGill reiterates promises**

Since election results were so close, the students again have an opportunity to vote for the president of the student body. inadequacies of council and has developed programs to cope with ineffectiveness. Remember that as Student views are better represented, so council and the office of president become more efficient and effective. I am willing to work with Mr. Maust over the summer to create a strong and efficient council for the 78-79 academic year.

candidate obtained the majority vote necessary for a victory. Although Swartout won the plurality vote by a very narrow margin of five votes, council scheduled the run-off election as called for in the existing constitution, and by Wednesday afternoon, April 12, sent out notices of the run-off election with absentee ballot information. Because of the postponment of the election by council, the run-off election will be taking place in the midst of finals week.

Swartout, in his appeal to council, stressed the importance of adhering to the provisions of the existing constitution.

"If council sees fit to disregard this article of the constitution, should we then also disregard the provision of the majority vote?" he questioned.

Council members debated the question for over an hour, some arguing that con-

stitutional adherence was crucial to the spiritual credibility of council, and others arguing that validation of last week's elections was crucial to the effectiveness of next year's council and that action taken to disregard the constitution and validate the election was in the best interest of the student body as a whole.

"I can't say what we did was right," council member Tom Weede stated after the motion was passed, "but the overall well-being of council and the entire student body must be taken into consideration."

A run-off election between McGill and Swartout will take place this Wednesday. Voting will take place in both commons during lunch and dinner. Students who will be leaving beforeWednesday may vote by absentee Absentee ballots ballot. are available from the Student Affairs office and must be returned by Thursday.

## Swartout explains problem

At the April 13 student council meeting, I was appaled to witness the following incident:

I brought to the council's attention the fact that the general election conducted on April 12 was in direct violation of the student council constitution, the reason for this being that the constitution explicitly states that the election shall be held during "the second full week of classes in March.'

The council's reaction to my point was simply that the election was to be considered valid, although it was clearly contrary to the constitution, that they are legally bound This reaction to uphold. came in the form of a proposal by Mr. McGill to certify the election results and accept the decision of the election board to conduct a run-off election April 19 for the two presidential candidates left. Oddly enough, the very same section of the constitution that declares that the election shall be conducted the second week of March also contains the clause that "if a person shall receive a majority of the ballots cast for that of-

fice, he shall be elected president/vice president." This clause was put into effect, and allows McGill to be in the run-off election .

Clearly, this is variable enforcement of the constitution, and it is a perfect example of the lack of accountability that I have mentioned before. The council went so far as to admit that they were ignorant of

this constitutional section prior to the election. Ignorance is no excuse in the face of the law, and this is a prime example of the lack of efficiency that I have also mentioned before.

More importantly to the students should be this question: if McGill is approving this lack of accountability, how does he expect voice of the to be a students as president?

Senior Mike Gnatkowski pitched a no-hitter as the Alma Scots took two from Olivet by identical 5-1 tallies last Saturday at Bahlke field. Jamie Knapp allowed only two hits in the second game. The victories bring Alma to a 5-3 overall record on the young season, and move the team to a 2-0 record in the The losses drop MIAA. Olivet to 0-6.

Gnatkowski raised his over all record to 2-0 as he struck out seven and walked only

four. Olivet scored their lone run in the seventh on a walk and two Alma errors.

Alma scoring in the first game began in the bottom of the first inning. Jim Davidson singled and stole second. Charles Fiebernitz singled him in.

In the second inning, Todd Friesner was hit by a pitch and took first. Todd Crose followed with an attempted sacrifice bunt, but was safe at first as the Olivet catcher couldn't find the handle on the ball. With Friesner and Crose on base, AI Leirstein laid down a perfect bunt that loaded the bases. Morley Fraser singled to left and drove two runs in. With men on first and second, Gary Condon hit into a double play. However, another run scored as the Olivet shortstop threw the ball into the bleachers.

In the third inning, Fiebernitz popped a fly to short right field which dropped in the middle of three Olivet fielders. Freshman Tadd Harburn, pinch runner for Fiebernitz, stole second and scored on a single to right by Venias Jordan.

Leading batters for the Scots in the first game were Fiebernitz who went two for three with one RBI and Fraser who went two for three and had two RBIs. Senior Jamie Knapp

struck out three and walked one in a solid performance in the second game. Knapp evened his overall record to 1-1 in his two-hitter.

Scoring in the second game again began in the first inning. Gary Condon and Bob Hamilton singled to left. Outfielder Jim Davidson followed with a single to left driving Condon in and mov-Hamilton to third. Fiebernitz then sacrificed Hamilton in on a fly to center. Davidson moved up to second on the sacrifice. Jordan followed with a single that drove Davidson in. Friesner tripled over the left fielder's head to drive Jordan in.

In the sixth inning, Fiebernitz singled. Pinch runner Tadd Harburn took second on a sacrifice bunt by Jordan, and crossed the plate when Friesner singled to left.

In the top of the seventh, Olivet scored their only run against Knapp on a walk and a double to left center.

Leading batsmen for the Scots in the second game were Hamilton who was two for four, Jordan who was two for two with an RBI, and Friesner who went three for three with two RBIs.

The Alma Scots' next home game will be Sunday, April 23 at 1:00 against Aquinas College.

## Garber assails Council action

#### To the Editor:

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On Thursday, April 13, Student Council passed by a 7-6 majority a motion proposed by Jack McGill to certify the election results of Wednesday, April 12, even though the election was in direct violation of the student council constitution. The constitution states that elections shall be held the second full week of classes in March; the constitution cannot be changed without an amendment voted upon by the student body. Thus, the council decided to ignore this part of the constitution.

However, within this same article (Article IV) of the constitution, it is stated that a presidential candidate must receive a majority of the ballots cast. This part of the article is being complied with, and thus allows Jack McGill to be in a runoff election with John Swartout, since Swartout received a plurality, but not a majority of the votes.

In other words, Student Council is selectively enforcing part of the constitution,

while ignoring another part -- both of which are contained in the same article! I feel this action is unfair. It is violation of the constitution, and thus is in violation of students' rights. The present constitution. which was passed by the students, legally binds stu-dent council to completely enforce and follow the constitution. This has not been done. Instead, the council has taken it upon itself to decide which parts of the constitution will be followed and which will be ignored. Why have a constitution if it is not completely followed?

As a student council member, I feel this action was inconsistent, unfair, and in violation of the students' rights. Such inconsistency in following the constitution could allow one candidate to manipulate the constitution to his advantage. Either the constitution should be abided by and the election be declared invalid, or both parts of Article IV should be ignored, thus declaring the election results of Wed-


sell each ticket for a dollar
