# Council schedules run-off election 

In a motion made by presidential candidate Jack McGill, student council voted by a 7-6 margin to validate last Wednesday's election of officers and members, even hough the elections were llegal according to the exist ing student council constiution

## Alma archers aim

## for MIAA title

The Alma College archery team raised their season record to 3-0 Wednesday, defeating the Britons at Albion 1434-389. Alma had outstanding performances by their archers in the 30 mph winds with Diane Vis mpher leading the way with scher leading the way with an excellent 492 followed closely by Marilyn Ennes' 491. Both scores were individual season highs.
Newly appointed coach Dan Stolz is very optimistic about his team's chances at winning the conference title to be held at Kalamazoo on April 28 and 29. Explained Stolz, "This team has incredible depth. All five of our women shoot close to 500 where most teams in the MIAA have only three women who shoot as well." Stolz admitted that he sometimes has a hard time choosing who doesn't shoot in a meet.

Another major reason this year's team can win the con-
ference title, added Stolz, is that they beat defending MIAA champions Kalamazoo last week by a score of 1506-1308. Jo Dunn Award Winner Judy Vasseliou shot a season high of 544 in that meet.

The Scots are led by Judy Vasseliou with a 495 average. The other Scot archers include Marilyn Enness, Diane Visscher, Captian Mary Beth Hatton, Martha Rosner, Jane Mack and Denise Prize.
The Scot archers' next home meet will be April 25 against Hope College.

violation of the constitution should have therefore made Wednesday's elections 'null and void.'
The implications of this violation were especially clear to council members, as a run-off election between McGill and Swartout was scheduled for this coming Wednesday, because neither
candidate obtained the majority vote necessary for a victory. Although Swartout won the plurality vote by a very narrow margin of five votes, council scheduled the run-off election as called for in the existing constitution, and by Wednesday after noon, April 12, sent out notices of the run-off election with absentee ballot information. Because of the postponment of the election by council, the run-off election will be taking place in the midst of finals week.

Swartout, in his appeal to council, stressed the importance of adhering to the provisions of the existing constitution.
"If council sees fit to disregard this article of the constitution, should we then also disregard the provision of the majority vote?" he questioned.

Council members debated the question for over an hour, some arguing that con-
stitutional adherence was crucial to the spiritual credibility of council, and others arguing that validation of last week's elections was crucial to the effectiveness of next year's council and that action taken to disregard the constitution and validate the election was in the best interest of the student body as a whole.
'I can't say what we did was right,' council member Tom Weede stated after the motion was passed, "but the overall well-being of council and the entire student body must be taken into consideration.'
A run-off election between McGill and Swartout will take place this Wednesday. Voting will take place in both commons during lunch and dinner. Students who will be leaving beforeWednesday may vote by absentee ballot. Absentee ballots are available from the Student Affairs office and must be returned by Thursday.

## Swartout explains problem

At the April 13 student council meeting, I was appaled to witness the following incident:
I brought to the council's attention the fact that the general election conducted on April 12 was in direct violation of the student council constitution, the reason for constitution, the reason for
this being that the constitution explicitly states that the election shall be held during "the second full week of classes in March.'

The council's reaction to my point was simply that the election was to be considered valid, although it was clearly contrary to the constitution, that they are legally bound to uphold. This reaction came in the form of a proposal by Mr. McGill to certify the election results and accept the decision of the election board to conduct a run-off election April 19 for the two presidential candidates left. Oddly enough, the very same section of the constitution that declares that the election shall be that the the second wee conducted the second week of March also contains the clause that "if a person shall receive a majority of the ballots cast for that of-
fice, he shall be elected president/vice president." This clause was put into effect, and allows McGill to be in the run-off election

Clearly, this is variable enforcement of the constitution, and it is a perfect example of the lack of accountability that I have mentioned before. The counci went so far as to admit that they were ignorant of
this constitutional section prior to the election. Ignorance is no excuse in the face of the law, and this is a prime example of the lack of efficiency that I have also mentioned before.
More importantly to the students should be this question: if McGill is approving this lack of accountability, how does he expect to be a voice of the students as president?

## Garber assails Council action

To the Editor:
On Thursday, April 13, Student Council passed by a 7-6 majority a motion proposed by Jack McGill to certify the election results of Wednesday, April 12, even though the election was in direct violation of the student council constitution. The constitution states that elections shall be held the second full week of classes in March; the constitution cannot be changed without an amendment voted upon by the student body. Thus, the council decided to ignore this part of the constitution.

However, within this same article (Article IV) of the constitution, it is stated that a presidential candidate must receive a majority of the ballots cast. This part of the article is being complied with, and thus allows Jack McGill to be in a runoff election with John Swartout, since Swartout received a plurality, but not a majority of the votes.

In other words, Student Council is selectively enforcing part of the constitution,
while ignoring another part - both of which are con tained in the same article I feel this action is unfair It is violation of the con stitution, and thus is in violation of students' rights. The present constitution, which was passed by the students, legally binds student council to completely enforce and follow the constitution. This has not been done. Instead, the council has taken it upon itself to decide which parts of the constitution will be followed and which will be ignored. Why have a constitution if it is not completely followed?
As a student council member, I feel this action was inconsistent, unfair, and in violation of the students' rights. Such inconsistency in following the constitution could allow one candidate to manipulate the constitution to his advantage. Either the constitution should be abided by and the election be declared invalid, or both parts of Article IV should be ignored, thus declaring the election results of Wed-
