

Professors to lead "special, unique" Christmas service

On Sunday, December 17, Dr. Joseph Walser, Head of the Religion Department, and Professor Edward Jacomo, from the Art Department, will lead a very special and most unique Christmas Service.

The service is entitled, "Lick the Bowl Clean! The Frosting is for You!" It will be held at 7:00 p.m. in the chapel, and everyone is invited! The service will include many special surprises in the form of congregation partici-

For the last seven years, Dr. Walser, and Mr. Jacomo have been putting on very special and unusual Christmas Services. These programs are experimental in format in that they use many different art forms in order to tell the Christmas Story in a way that has never been told before!

A few examples of the past services and what they consisted of are as follows: covering the congregation with black sheets to symbolize the darkness that many

people are in, constructing an eight foot high birthday cake and distributing individual cupcakes to the entire congregation, filling the chapel with white doves and balloons, pictures of babies being posted all over the chapel with recordings of babies burping and crying, enslaving the congregation in chains, and passing around actual samples of gold, frankincense, and myrrh to the congregation!

According to Dr. Walser, the main objective of these services is to make one see that the Christmas Story is not just about a child that was born a long time ago, but it is also about the birth of each and every one of us! Were you vaccinated for hard measles prior to 1967?

If so, the vaccine is ineffective and you are susceptible to this disease.

Do you have a history of hard measles?

If so, you are immune. However, receiving the vaccine will not harm you if you wish to "play it safe".

The vaccine for Rubeola [hard measles] will be administered in registration line, January 8, 1979.

Maurice S. Reizen, M.D. (Director of Michigan Department of Health) has announced that the Rubeola (hard measles) vaccine administered prior to 1967 is ineffective as this vaccine was mixed with gammaglobulin. Laboratory reports have revealed that this mixture will cause no immune response. Since college campuses are prime targets for communicable diseases. Dr. Reizen suggested that student health services begin an extensive campaign to inform students of their possible susceptibility to Rubeola. He urged all students to obtain a valid immunization or a history of the disease from their physician.

It has been announced by the Health Liason Committee that the Rubeola vaccine will be administered in registration line at Alma College January 8, 1979. An information table, including brief information cards to be completed if you desire the vaccine, will be set up in After proceeding through registration line, a trained group of registered nurses with members of the Health Liason Committee assisting, will handle the short vaccination process

The Health Liason Committee comprised of student representatives from the housing units, has posted notices throughout campus. Other information has been distributed in the food commons to familiarize students with this disease, and urge students to find out about their measles history. addition, the Resident Assistant staffs have received information about Rubeola and are presently taking a headcount of students interested in receiving the vaccine in registration line. If a student is unable to receive the vaccine on January 8th, Wilcox Health Services will have the vaccine available upon request.

Synchronized swim show based on theme of colors

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Plans to continue ministry

Rev. Chaffee plans to retire in April

Reverend Clifford Chaffee, Chaplain at Alma College, will retire after his 65th birthday in April of next

Rev. Chaffee was born in Washington, Oregon, and he attended the University of Washington doing graduate study at The Princeton Theological Seminary. He was engaged to his wife, Mary, while he was attending the seminary. He graduated from the seminary in 1941 with a master's degree in Divinity, and married that same year.

For two years after he was married, he served as Assistant Minister and Bethlehem Trinity Church in Philadelphia. During the years of the war, 1943-44, he went to a seminary in New York and received his master's degree in Sacred Theology. At this time, his wife, Mary, also received her master's degree in Religious Education.

The next two years were spent at Yale, where Rev. Chaffee prepared for his overseas China Service. He served in Yawaun for two years before it was taken over by communists. 1944, Rev. Chaffee and his wife were commissioned as missionaries for the Presbyterian Church to work in China. Following this, he came back to the states,

where he served as Chaplain, and head of the Christian Education Department at Whitworth Presbyterian College.

Rev. Chaffee and his wife then went to Thailand to work with the Chinese. They lived in Bangkok, where he was Principal of the Bangkok Institute of Technology. He was also the Associate at the Yellow Bridge Church, where his wife directed the choir. Mary Chaffee also directed the combined choir which consisted of 200-300

Rev. and Mrs. Chaffee lived in Thailand for a total of twenty-one years. Their three children attended elementary school in Bangkok, high school in India, and college in the states. During those twenty-one years, Rev. Chaffee and his family often traveled to the states on furloughs.

In 1972, Rev. Chaffee finished his missionary work in Thailand. That same year, Alma College invited him to come to Alma, and serve as Chaplain. The offer was viewed by Rev. Chaffee as a great opportunity to work in a stimulating environment. The invitation was accepted and Rev. Chaffee has been the Chaplain here at Alma from that time

According to Rev. Chaffee, one of the most challenging adjustments to be made was getting used to the cold winter weather in Michigan, compared to the mild weather in Thailand.

The new job offered him the familiar challenge of working with young people. One of Rev. Chaffee's most important roles here at Alma has been his work with students in the Chapel Affairs Committee. This is the group that works to prepare chapel related services and Rev. Chaffee programs. expresses the real joy that he has experienced in working with Chapel Affairs, and comments that the increase in student involvement with Chapel Affairs is one of his most gratifying accomplishments.

Rev. Chaffee has been a part of many important seminars that have been held here at Alma. These seminars have focused on such things as marraige, death, alcohol abuse, premarital sex, and even interfaith workshops. A program on world hunger is now being planned for next term.

Rev. Chaffee has had the opportunity as Chaplain to serve as liaison between the college and the presbytery of Lake Huron. He has served on many committees, and has been a speaker at many church functions.

Rev. Chaffee is also the coordinator for the volunteer services here on campus. He is responsible for working

with such organizations as Big Brothers and Big Sisters, Volunteer Friends, Gamma Sigma Sigma, Sigma Beta, and the Masonic Home. The services of these organizations are always greatly appreciated by many, and Rev. Chaffee feels as though his work with these groups has been one of the highlights of his work at Alma.

The group, "Scholia", is also under the direction of Rev. Chaffee. This is a group of interested faculty, staff, and community members who hold gatherings in the Heather Room in order to listen to a staff member present programs which focus on important topics of concern


Until this year, Rev. Chaffee was also Chairman of The Mid Michigan Community Action Council. This is the organization that is responsible for providing career information to high school students in Gratiot County. This group hosts 'Career Day'', which is held twice a year to give eleventh grade students a chance to spend a day visiting with representatives from their field of interest.


Rev. Chaffee is also president of the Rotary Club of St. This club meets Louis. weekly in the Heather Room, and is responsible for holding fund raising activities for various organizations. These organizations include the Salvation Army, and the Boy Scouts. The Rotary Club also takes foreign students into their homes to live during the school year.

Through various surveys, Rev. Chaffee has helped the faculty become aware of many student needs. His years of service here at Alma are highlighted by his constant concern for the student body.

Rev. Chaffee points out that he enjoys working with intelligent, dedicated, and capable young people like the students here at Alma! After his retirement, he will work part time in Arizona or California as a Minister of Evangelism, or a Minister of Visitation, where his wife Mary will also practice her musical talents.

Looking back on his years at Alma, Rev. Chaffee commented, "I have many, many happy memories of Alma's faculty, students, and community. I cannot think of any other place that I would have rather served, other than Alma." He went on to say, "These years have been challenging, satisfying, rewarding, and I have had many wonderful experiences. It was possible to work in many programs that will continue into the years ahead. I would have liked to have done more, but it has been very rewarding!"

Check cashing service to be offered

Alma College will provide a check cashing service to its students starting next semester.

Certain stipulations will go along with this new privilege. No checks will be ing se accepted unless they are made payable to Alma College and are written for \$25.00 or less. Only personal checks will be accepted, and no 2-party checks will be taken by the new service.

The Cashier's Office will handle the check cashing, and the office hours will be from 1:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. You must present a driver's license and student I.D. to the cashier along with your check.

If you cash a check with closer to its students.

insufficient funds in your account (bounce it), it will cost you a \$5.00 service charge. If this happens twice you will lose the check cashing privilege. Alma College Controller Wilmer Schweinsberg states, "We set this up (the check cashing service) to follow the procedures businesses follow." The program will be under an experimental basis, and if things run smoothly, the \$25.00 limit may be

Presently, cashing a check on campus means coping with a \$5.00 limit at the Scot Shop. West Superior Pharmacy and 7-11 will cash student's checks up to \$10.00.

The College hopes this new service will bring the convenience of quick cash closer to its students



He was writing feverishly now.



3. In the attempt to offer "equal" service to all, this system has only expanded inconvenience for everyone.


We feel that these problems in and of themselves are sufficient to warrant a reconsideration of the system. Therefore, we recommend:


Thus, we feel that this shoddy attempt to provide equal service has not only failed in its objective but has also expanded a problem once localized to South Complex to the entire campus.
