Although Anigone is played straight from Jean Anouilh's interpretation of Sophocles Antigene, it holds a relevance to campus life. Antigone is concerned with injustice. The king has arbitrarily desecrated the body of a girl's brother. To Antigone this is an injustice which she cannot let pass.

A modern audience can read into Antigone's struggle a simllarity to any number of causes for justice today. In every int stance all of the characters in the play tried to convince Antigone to let the situation go unnoticed. What Anouilh, Sophocles and the director and players of the Alma College production of Antigone are trying to say is "stand up and be
