FACULTY APPROVES RETENTION

After nearly two terms in committee, the Greek issue finally emerged from the Student Affairs Committee, ana was placed before the faculty for their accept ance or rejection. Finally, last Tuesday evening during the faculty meeting, the faculty, by u voice vote, approved both the retention of the Creek system on Almas campus and the major recommendations of the Student Affairs Com mittee.

Although the Greek System was overwhelmingly accepted by the faculty, nevertheless through the debate and discussion which preceded the faculty vote, it was understood by the faculty that the continued existence of the Greeks on campus uvuld be accompanied by "a vigorous effort to implement reform".



Among the major recommeniaiiom passed by the faculty with respect to the Greek System are

I) Fraternities and sororities should "investigate areas which would iiccomodate their needs for recreational or housing space.

2) "Rush and pledge programs be shortened and restricted to time periods which do not seriously interfer with the academic calendar, Further, we recom-


ETTERS TO THE EDITOR
