On Monday mountag, March 10, just one hour before whit, a file be-wan in the attic of the of Alma College's ear-Diest Dandmarks florty dive minutes later, Old Main was a smouldering heap of twisted metal, broken glass, and shattered brick.

Students who were attending their ten o clock classes in Old Main just noticed a billowing of thick smoke about the classcomm windows. Then, in an orderly fashion, they filed out of the doomed hullding,

Next came the francis attempts of professors and the numerous students who aided them to salvage as much material as bessible from the placement and faculty offices. In less than fifteen minutes, students and professors had mathered a heap of file cabinets, typewriters, books, and other valuables before the situation in Old Main became too dangerous for any more salvage attempts.

Total estimates of losses sustained by Alma College and the professors whose offices were in Old Main have not yet been determined. Besides the office equipment and classroom furniture, doctoral theses, priceless and irreplaceable manuscripts and books had been consumed.

The departments of Political Science, History, Speech, Econowide, Psychology, and Education are now in temporary exile. Their new locattons and new oless schedules can be found on the bulletin boards of most living units.

Sculpture, jewelery and ceramics were his field of study and educational preparation. His first love for ceramics grew out of his work towards the M.E.A. degree at the University of Utah. For five years he taught in the unique Pioneer Craft House in Salt Lake City.

DIMKA (20 April) a 1964 Russian film about children which provides a unique view of Russian society.

THRONE OF BLOOD (4 May) - a 1957 Japanese version of the Macbeth story.

A NOUS LA LIBERTE (11 May) - a 1931 French comedy treating the problem of happiness as it relates to working hard to succeed.

GOLDEN AGE OF COMEDY (25 May) - a compilation of scenes and sequences from USA comedy routines of the 1923-28 era.

A series ticket for the spring program of five films costs \$2.75. That series plus the Fields Festival costs \$3.00.

General admission tickets are 75¢ each. That price applies also for general admission to the Fields Festival.

For persons with series tickets good for at least two terms there is no added charge for the bonus program.

Spring series tickets and general admission for the Fields are now on advanced sale at Hood 204. Note that the showing of a Fields film on the evening of the registration day in January drew an overflow crowd. A ticket bought now will assure you a seat on March 31.

Two Championships



Debate Team Successful

Te lun Colloge Debate feats made another fine showover the weekend of Februery 21-22 with an excellent performance at the lichigan Intercollegiate Debate Issociation tournament at the University of Michigan. The Scots finished with a 6-2 record, good for 3rd place out of 19 teams. Only U. of Detroit and Jayne State finished ahead of Alma. The affirmative team of Waldron and raimer won 3 out of 4, defeating Wayne State, Adrian and Eastern Michigan. The negative of Matich and Nelsen also won 3 of 4, defeating Calvin, Kellogg Community College, and Wayne State. The double victory over Wayne State was especially gratifying for Alma since Wayne State was the last school in Michigan that the Scots had not beaten. Wendy Waldron was honored as one of the excellent debaters in the tournament as she finished among the top ten debaters out of 76. Alma's overall record now stands at 32-14, and in MIAA competition the Scots are 9-0.0n the weekend of February 28-March 1, Alma participated in a two-day tournament at Heidelburg College, Tiffin, Ohio.

A tolkr of blansession sames that paces Alex College to m weconduplace finish in the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association Baskettall race this year have been named the Spots co-most valuable players.

Drake Serges of Pitht and Charles Hotson of Detroit, picked by their taskentes is co-contains at the atert of the season. Were also tabled by them was the top per-Cormers for Alma at the end of the camnaign.

Serges, a senior, topped the Scots in scoring with 419 points in 22 games for a 19.1 average. He was also the team leader in free throw percentage at 74.6 percent on 91 successful tosses in 122 attempts. From the field he had 164 goals in 362 shots for 45.3 percent.

A product of Flint Central High School, Serges was named to the ATA tournament tesus in the California Western Tournament and the Alma Inquestal Tournement last Secen-
