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SNOW CARNIVAL BEGINS FRIDAY WITH SCULPTURES, DANCE, CONCERTS

ALMA -- Snow sculpture, a dance, concert, outdoor winter sports, the final home basketball game of the season, and coronation of a queen will be highlights of Alma College's Snow Carnival this weekend February 19-20.

The traditional statues of ice and snow which this year reflect the carnival theme of "Astrological Signs," will be judged at 4:30 p.m. Friday. Trophies for the best of the frozen statues by Alma's fraternities, sororities and residence hall units will be present Friday evening by the 1971 Snow Carnival queen.

Sophomores at Alma nominated ten candidates for carnival queen last week, and a campus-wide election selected the queen and her four-member court. The quintet of finalists includes Susan Craig of Grand Blanc, Sue Elston of Detroit, Wendy Giesy of Flint, Wendy Rigby of Detroit, and Nancy Wilson of Livonia.

Which of the five is the queen will not be announced until the 6:30 p.m. Friday coronation ceremony. The 1970 Alma Snow Queen, Margaret Odell of Grosse Pointe Park, will crown the sophomore

coed who will reign over this year's event.

Another Friday Snow Carnival feature will be a concert-dance by Mr. Flood's Party, scheduled to begin at 8:30 p.m. in Tyler Auditorium.

Snow games on the campus and an ice hockey tournament at Alma's Wright Park will start at 10 a.m. Saturday.

A Saturday afternoon highlight will be the auction of faculty-donated items and services, with proceeds supporting the Africa Fellowship Program which enables an Alma College student each year to serve on the faculty of Mayflower School in Ikenne, Nigeria. The auction in Dow Auditorium begins at 1 p.m.

Saturday evening's basketball game against Albion College in the college's Physical Education Center will be followed by a 9:30 p.m. concert by The Ormandy in Van Dusen Commons.

Two showings of the motion picture "Zorba the Greek" are also scheduled for Snow Carnival weekend at Alma. Starting times are 7 p.m. Friday in Dow Auditorium and 2 p.m. Saturday in room 100 of Dow Science Building.

I.F.S. PRESENTING "WAR" MOVIES SUNDAY

For its program Sunday evening, February 21, the International Film Series shows four shorter pieces treating "war" Screen time is 8:00. Sight site is Dow Auditorium.

Two of the films are based on stories by Ambrose Bierce (1842-1913). In one adaptation, CHICKAMAUGA creates a symbolic world of war horrors as a little boy wanders from home, reaches a battlefield where he plays soldier, then returns home to find house and family destroyed. Running-time is 33 minutes. Written and directed by Robert Enrice, CHICKAMAUGA is an award winner at San Sebastian.

AN OCCURRENCE AT OWL CREEK, also a Bierce story, succeeds in recreating the atmosphere of the American Civil War. The opening lines of the story - and of the film - plunge the reader-audience immediately into the drama-laden world of the War of Secession! "A man stood upon a railroad bridge in northern Alabama, looking into the swift water

twenty feet below. The man's hands were behind his back, the wrists bound with a cord..." Bierce makes the ambiguities of time and space as much the protagonists of drama as are the characters. OCCURRENCE is another Enrico film piece. Running time is 27 minutes. This one is a 1962 Grand Prix winner at Cannes. The following year it got an Academy Award as the best live-action short subject.

The scene for TOYS is a store-window full of them. As children press shiny-eyed faces against the glass, a revolving platform of soldiers, rifles, tanks, planes comes alive. The faces of the children first register delight, then freeze into almost hypnotic response to the action on display. Done by Grant Munro, this 8-minute animation is produced by the National Board of Canada, whence come many good film things. This one is a 1967 winner at Cannes.

Also from the National Film Board of Canada is A TRIP DOWN MEMORY LANE, a compilation of striking movie sequences, some from the turn of the century, all of them conspiring to cast a disturbing reflection on events of the present day. In this 12-minute review there is a leg show, a monkey girding for space flight, a zeppelin, warships, war medals, a defense minister welcoming Canada into a big war, Adenauer, Nixon, Einstein, a sword swallower. All sights are matched with borrowed commentary in a sometimes bizarre way. This too is an international award winner.

General admission tickets will be available at the door at 75¢ each.

Workers, Mazey was active in a variety of capacities, at both the local and international union level, including delegate to both UAW and AFL-CIO conventions.

In 1963 he received the Law Day award of the Young Lawyers Section of the State Bar of Michigan. He was also the recipient of the liberty award for "pursuit of human rights through constructive dissent" for Detroit's 1969 Human Rights Day observance.

Snow Carnival 13 Years Old

On February 7, 1959 a new tradition began at Alma College. Tyler Board sponsored its first snow carnival which has always been on the first weekend after mid-term break. Snow Carnival has been a big event every year and will celebrate its 13th birthday this year.

The first Snow Carnival weekend began on Friday night with a jazz concert. The faculty and students competed in a hockey game Saturday morning. The queen, who is always a sophomore, was crowned at half-time of the game. During the afternoon, there was an ice-skating exhibition, tug-o-war competition between the freshmen and sophomores, an all-campus snowball fight, and a social hour that gave everyone a chance to warm up. The snow sculptures which had been built in the morning were judged in the afternoon and in the evening was a Masquerade dance.

Snow Carnival is still a popular social event on the campus. However, it has changed slightly through the years. In 1961, the Alpha Thetas added a dime dance to replace the Masquerade dance and the queen and her court started wearing ski sweaters rather than costumes. The ice-skating exhibition was cancelled that year because there was no ice and it was never started again. There have only been three years when there wasn't any snow.

Last year the APO faculty auction happened to fall on the same weekend and it appears that it will become a part of the Snow Carnival weekend tradition. This is the story of Snow Carnival at present but the story will go on and another page in its history will be added to this weekend.

High Schoolers Visit Alma

These fifteen high schoolers will stay overnight in various dorms and will return home Sunday afternoon.

It is the hope of Campus Affairs that a program of introducing high school students to college life can be established on a permanent basis, with special attention for prospective college students from minority groups.
