Barlow Trophy will be Announced

Boulding to Speak at Honors Convoc

Dr. Kenneth E. Boulding, professor of economics at the University of Colorado and an economist of international prominence, will receive a Doctor of Letters degree at Alma College's annual Honors Convocation on Wednesday, June 2, and will be principal speaker at the convocation.

The Alma College Kiltie Band will open the convocation with the Processional, "Grand March from Aida" by Verdi. The traditional awards (President's Cup and recognition of the honoraries) will be given at that time. Dr. Boulding will then speak on "The Theory of Deteriorating Systems". At the close of his talk the Barlow Trophy winner will be announced. The Recessional, played by the band will be "March Militaire" by Saint Saens.

Before joining the faculty of the University of Colorado in 1967, Dr. Boulding taught at the University of Edinburgh, Colgate University, Fisk University, Iowa State College, McGill University in Montreal, and the University of Michigan. He has also served as a visiting professor on the faculties of University College of the West Indies and the International Christian University in Tokyo.

Dr. Boulding holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Oxford and has received a number of honorary degrees from various colleges and universities. He has written several books and articles on the theory of deteriorating systems, the theory of population, and the theory of the world economy. He is presently the principal speaker at the convocation for the study of the Barlow Trophy.

'34 A.C. Grad Joins S.S. HOPE

Allan H. Howard, M.D., a June, 1934 graduate of Alma, volunteered to join the staff of the hospital ship S.S. HOPE and was assigned to board on May 15. His trip will take him to Kingston, Jamaica in the West Indies for a two-month treatment mission.

Dr. Howard, whose hometown was Saginaw, attended Alma from 1930-34. After graduation he enrolled at Vanderbilt University Medical School in Nashville.

Today Dr. Howard is a Laguna Hills (California) urologist and is affiliated with the Orange County Medical Center and West Valley Community Hospital in that western state. He holds a post as Associate Clinical Professor of Surgery (Urology) at the University of California at Irvine. Previously he served with the S.S. HOPE in Nicaragua.

HOPE arrived in Kingston in mid-January and will remain there until October. Dr. Howard will be among more than twenty doctors serving a two-month rotation (one of the five rotations scheduled). There are also approximately 125 permanent staff personnel.

Final Decision on Fresh Hours to be Made during Summer

The decision about hours for next year's Freshmen Women will be made sometime this summer, according to Mr. Thomas Plough, Dean of Women. In an interview with Mr. Plough, he stated that the final decision concerning hours for freshmen will be in the 1971-72 STUDENT HANDBOOK when it is mailed out during the summer.

Questionnaires have been sent to parents of prospective Freshmen of next year. These questionnaires as well as the "personal reactions" of Dean Plough, Miss Reitz, Dean of Women and Mr. Southern, Dean of Men, will go into the final decision concerning hours for freshmen next year.

Mr. Plough, emphasizing that all the questionnaires sent to the parents are not in as yet, speculated that the Freshmen hour schedule next year would be much the same as this year. That is hours for Freshmen Women for Fall and Winter terms only.

The final decision about Freshmen hours will be made by the President of the college, Dr. Robert D. Swanson, but the President has asked for a recommendation from the Dean of Students.

BLACK PROPOSALS : An Update

On Monday, January 25, 1971, the black students of Alma College presented a list of six demands, which they later called proposals, to the Students and Faculty of Alma College. Today, a little over 18 weeks later, three of these six proposals have been met. Work is in progress on the other three proposals.

Proposal number six was the first proposal to be dealt with by the college and the black students working together. This proposal read, "That the Admissions Office submit a monthly report to the Afro-American Society, the first report due March 1971, and the names of suspected black applicants be forwarded to the Afro-American Society for cor-

Students Should Have Full Power on Academic Review

Risking the possibility that I may be running the subject into the ground with a commentary two weeks straight concerning the same subject, I reconcile it with the decision that probably few people read my commentary last week so this will seem fresh while those who did read last week's will either dismiss his one or be further interested in the matter.

Tomorrow the campus will find itself set by another election though this maybe of greater importance than some of the previous elections. Specifically, I speak of the issue of students of community government committees being allowed the right to consider and vote on student petitions. For me this matter involves really two issues, one of which is simply my belief that students should be involved because they could provide helpful insights about their peer's petition. Simply because the petition is a student's does not necessitate approval by other students and the possible crucial of confidential reports is not necessarily a bad thing. The access to an consideration of confidential reports by other

students is a mature action, therefore students considered for specifically Academic Review should be chosen with this in mind, that they are capable and mature enough to hold that responsibility.

The second issue involved on this matter is of even greater importance for it strikes right at the roots of Community Government, what power do students actually have in this system. Are students on committees, and I'm speaking specifically of Academic Review, to function only as an advisory group with no real power on matters pertaining directly to their fellow students or are students to have a voice in passing judgement upon fellow students? This seems to be more of a question not of the right to vote but rather a definition of student power.

Students have the chance to voice their opinion tomorrow, if they don't want other students involved then their vote will indicate that and the matter will ever probably be dropped. If, however, students want to have their peers involved then tomorrow is the time to take action.

Strong Opposition in EPC of Pass-Fail Amendment

The Student Council proposal regarding the change in pass-fail option was met with heavy opposition in Monday's Educational Policy Committee meeting. The major argument against it was that the "un-fair and unfair" treatment of students by professors could not be documented. The proposal was not brought to a vote. The proposal will be submitted again next fall when there is adequate time for documentation and presentation of the document.

The following is a copy of the proposal.
Whereas: A student taking any course on a pass-fail basis is entitled to equal treatment.

Whereas: The right to privacy is essential if a student taking any course on a pass-fail basis is to receive equal treatment by the instructor as his classmates.

Be it resolved:

That instructors shall be unaware of which of their students are taking a course on a pass-fail basis.

Be it further resolved:

That any student eligible to take a course on a pass-fail basis shall submit a written request of his intent to the office of the Registrar. Upon completion of the course, the registrar shall take the grade submitted by an instructor and accordingly record a grade of pass or fail on the student's official transcript.

The resolution was amended to state that advisors will be notified if one of their advisees is taking a course on a pass-fail basis.

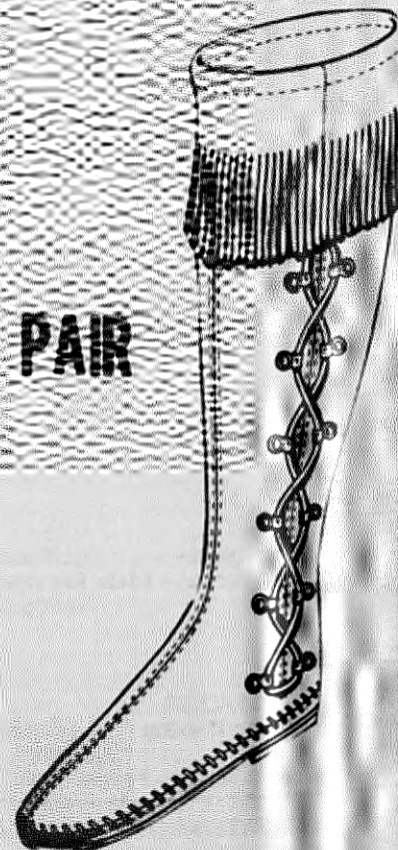
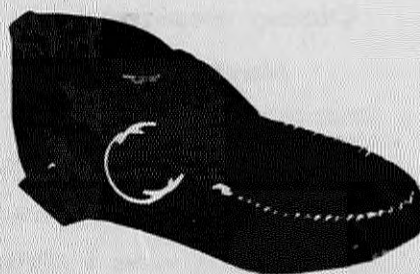


