Spring Term at Alma

Each May students are given the opportunity to take part in spring term classes. With the chance to study both on campus and off, classes focus on one subject for the whole month. With classes based in all subjects, spring term is an easy way to spend more time in your major or work through your distributive requirements. This year Alma offered forty-seven spring term classes, half of which were on campus and half which were off campus. This year professors took students around Michigan as well as to Chicago, Hawaii, New York, Key West, and Canada to study a wide variety of subjects. There were also many trips out of the country to destinations such as Germany, Peru, China, Spain, and Great Britain. Whether it be learning about world religions, music history, computer game designing, and even stage combat, spring term offers Alma students a unique learning opportunity for specialization and travel.



A Fond Farewell





A Proud Day to be a Scot



This year's commencement address was given by John Dau, a genocide survivor who founded the John Dau Foundation to provide medical assistance to those in Sudan. 



Aside from their philanthropic endeavors, sisters of KI are involved heavily in campus activities; from Model UN to theatre, choir to lacrosse, the sisters of Kappa Iota have a strong presence on the campus of Alma College.








Women's Soccer Gaining Recognition














Multicultural Student Union Celebrating All Types of Diversity




Swing Club Why Don't We Just Dance?


ACDC Alma College Dance Company




Scots Take to the Stage





"Glee Club is the place to have a wonderful time learning music and to make really great friends with a wonderful group of girls." -Jessica Sutherland '16




