## Panel discusses relation of politics and administration

Last week an informal panel discussion addressing the topic of "Politics and Administration: Inseparable Careers?" took place in Swanson Academic Center. The discussion was well-attended by students, and the panel, partially composed of Alma College graduates, raised many interesting ideas about the relationship between politics and administration.

On hand at the discussion were 10th District U.S. Congressman Don Albosta and Isabella County Commissioner Cathy Ling. Other panelists included Alma College graduates Rich Bearup (74), currently an Administrative Assistant to State Senator John Engler, Paul Inglis (68), Oceana County Administrator, and Rich Studley (74), former Clare City Manager and presently employed by the Alma Center for Continuing Education.

Congressman Albosta opened the discussion With his idea of the politician. Albosta suggested that the effective politician must have a complete overview of the people within his district and that the main objective of the political process is trying to get those people to share a single point of view. Commissioner Ling brought in the idea that this shared point of view is a main source of power within the legislative system. Any group of citizens of beaurocratic organization that can show it has a significant number of individuals sharing a point of view on a particular topic can in theory have much power in government.

Rich Studley called politics from an administrative point of view the decision making process. Moderator Dr. Daniel Behring then drew the initial line between poli-

## U.S. recognizes Iran

The United States gave formal diplomatic recognition to Iran's Islamic government Friday. The government of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini began executing top generals and other government officials loyal to the Shah as the announcement came of U.S. recognition.

## Traffic deaths top 50,000

For the first time since the 55 mile per hour speed limi was imposed five years ago, U.S. highway traffic deaths topped 50,000 federal officials said last week. Safety agency administrator Joan Claybrak urged motorists to observe the 55 limit and to use seat belts.

## Talks with Mexico end

The troubled talks between President Carter and Mexican President Jose Lopez Portillo ended Friday as both sides agreed that the major issues dividing the countries remained unsolved. The two presidents agreed to meet next summer to continue talks on such crucial issues as the U.S. purchase of Mexican oil and gas, and the flow of tens of thousands of illegal Mexican workers into the United States every year.

What is really sad is that the students don't realize that Student Council runs under this Constitution. It is through this organization that other committees such

tics and administration. Dr. Behring refered to politicians as the policy makers and administrators as the policy enforcers. This drew much attention from the panel as many of the panelists maintained that politics and administration could not be separated that easily. Paul Inglis said that the two are still intimately related. Rich Bearup suggested that administrators could be viewed as "Rule-makers" for the broad "game" that the politicians are engaged in. The panel seemed to agree on the fact that politics and administrators are related, but the exact connection did not emerge as a clearly-defined function. Dr. Behring asked the panelist why they were involved in the business of politics and administration Rich Bearup described the occupation as "fascinating", with every day bringing new situations and new problems. Congressmen Albosta thought of his job as a challenge to find the faults in

society and try to correct them through the government. Paul Inglis described the occupation not only as a challenge, but also as filling the definite need for good administration in society.

In trying to determine the qualities essential to a good politician or administrator, the panel suggested that he must be proficient in many technical skills and possess the ability to critically analyze. Rich Studley brought in the faults of the academic setting in terms of the structured and ordered lives that students live. Studley said that the effective administrator must be able to function well in a variety of situations in which there is no concensus as to an efficient procedure. Commissioner Ling urged students interested in a political or administrative career to get involved in campus politics or local political activities.

## Men's Basketball upsets Kalamazoo

 Sports WriterThe Alma Scots Basketball team came out firing Saturday as they posted a 104-83 win over visiting Kalamazoo. Seniors Jim Davidson, Dan Stolz and Dave Froelich led the potent Scot attact as they put down 26, 24 and 21 points apiece.

Davidson was the crowd pleaser as on numerous occasions he would take the outlet pass, come down two on on in a fastbreak situation, only to pull up and put down a 20 footer. J.D. put down 16 of those points in the second half as he helped the Scots pull away from the sloppy Kazoo squad

Alma had held a skimpy 49-47 halftime lead as both teams were really hot. Kazoo hit on $58 \%$ of their shots in the first 20 minutes while Alma hit on $57 \%$

It was a different story in the second half though, as Alma tightened its defense, and kept its own offense rolling. Alma hit on $66 \%$ of its second half shots while Kazoo only hit $36 \%$
Dan Stolz also tossed out 10 assists to go along with his 24 points. He hit on 7 of 11 field goal tries while hitting all 10 of his free throws.
Dave Froelich also pulled down a game high 12 rebounds to go with his 21


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points. Fro hit on 8 of 15 field goal attempts and hit on all five of his free throw attempts.
Jeff Meath tossed in 10 of his 14 points in the first half, all from long range, with many coming at the start of small first half rallies for the Scots.

Subs Cavin Mohrhardt and Mark Henn also contributed substantially to the Alma cause, Cavin with his ball handling and playmaking and Henn with his rebounding and defensive work.
The Scots will entertain league leading Albion on Wednesday and will travel to Adrian on Saturday. Alma's record now stands at 14-6.

Besides having their best week thus far in the season, the women's basketball team set a new Alma College scoring record last Tuesday night against Kalamazoo. The Scotswomen scored 91 total points to the Hornet's 40 on their way to the first of two conference victories within three days

Thursday night the Alma netters defeated Hope 76-49 in what was undoubtedly their best overall team performance of the year

In the record breaking game, Linda Ban squeeked by Barb Lundy for top individual scoring honors with 27 and 25 points, respectively. Junior guard Mary Curtis helped with 12 points, as did Cookie Novitsky and Jeri Hanley with 6 apiece. Ban pulled down the most rebounds with 16 while Novitsky had 11.
Against Hope Thursday, it
was Linda Ban once again with 27 points to lead all
scorers with 18 of those points coming in the first nalf. Lundy had 14, Novitsky 8, and Marcia Mikan, another freshman, contributed 8 points in one of her finest efforts of the season. The entire Alma squad shot 51\% from the floor, and $67 \%$ from the free-throw line.
Besides having endless favorable comments about the performance of her team, Coach Glennie Smith was very disillusioned with the fact that more students turned up at Cappaert Gymnasium Tuesday night to watch an intramural game than the women's varsity basketball team. "I can't understand it, especially since we have such a talented team. I think it's a shame.
The last home contest for the Scotswomen will be Saturday the 24th when Alma is once again hosting the MIAA tournament. Play begins at 10:00 a.m. and will be continuous until the final match-up at 7:00 p.m. that evening.
