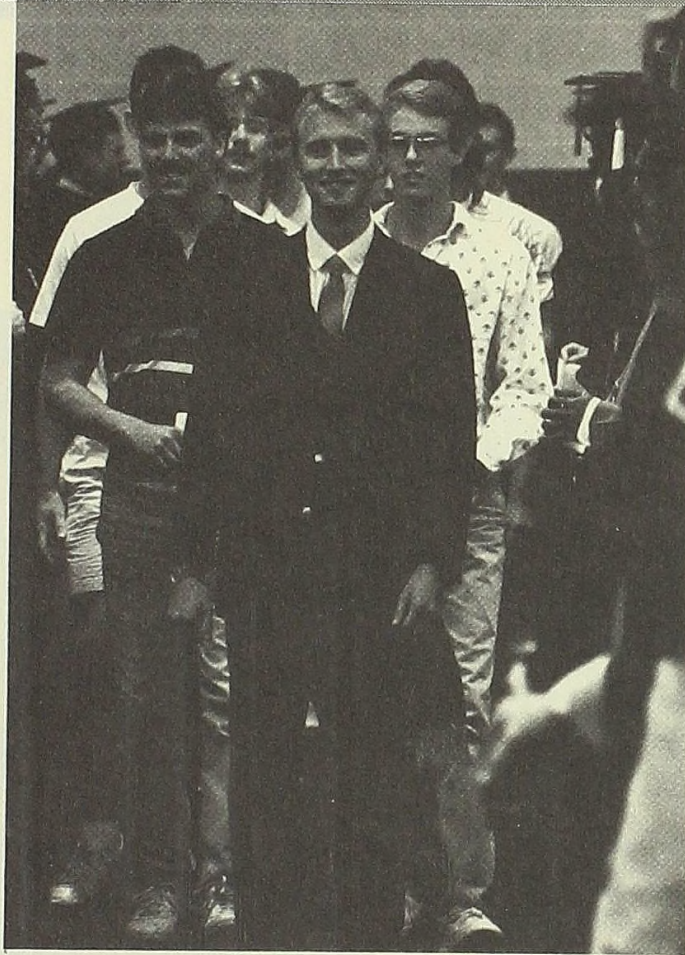
With the determination of these new administrators, Alma College faces a bright and certain future.

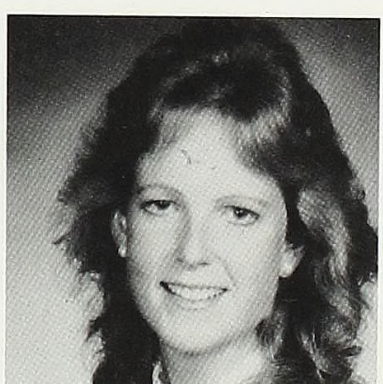
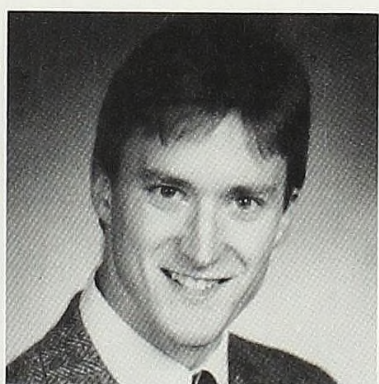
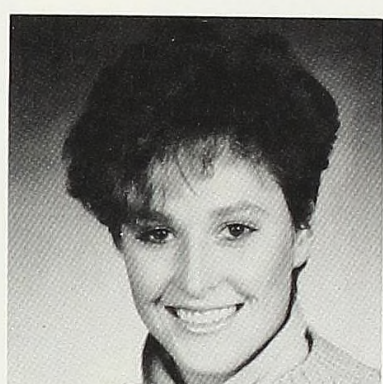
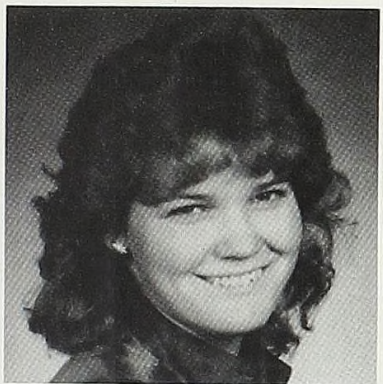
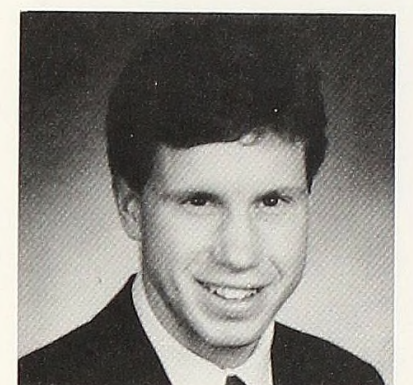
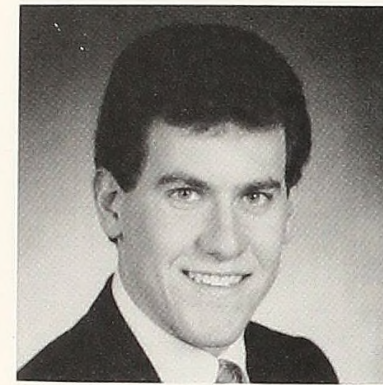
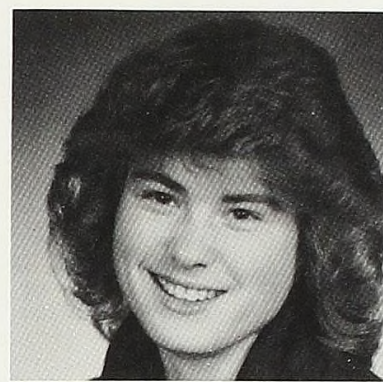




Senior Memories

The addition of a new stadium and track last year enabled the Scots to celebrate their centennial year on their new field. Intramural football, volleyball, basketball, and bowling are offered every year and are a large part of the Alma College community.

A Surprising Season

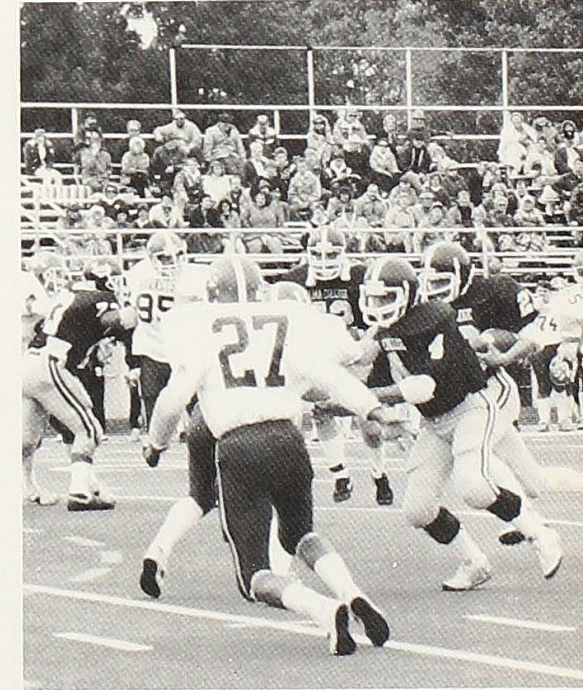
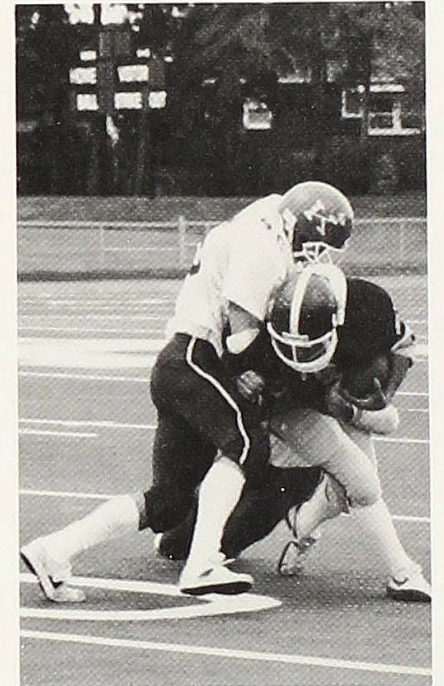

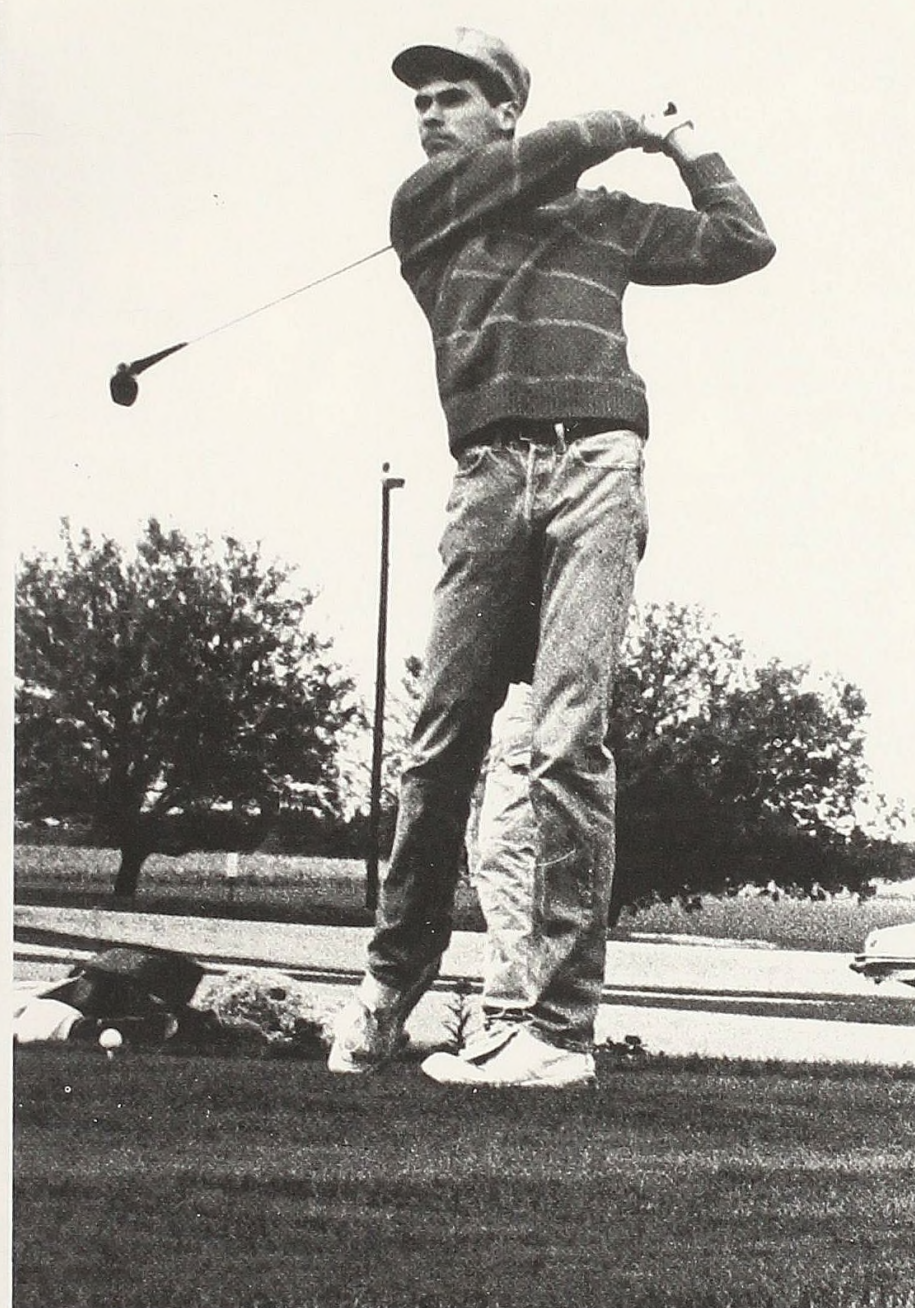

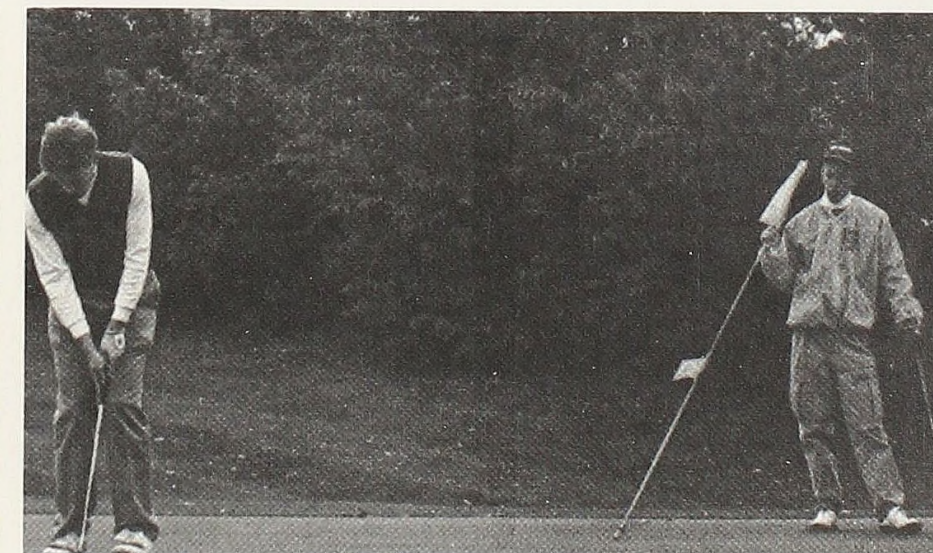
Teeing Off, Golfers Improve

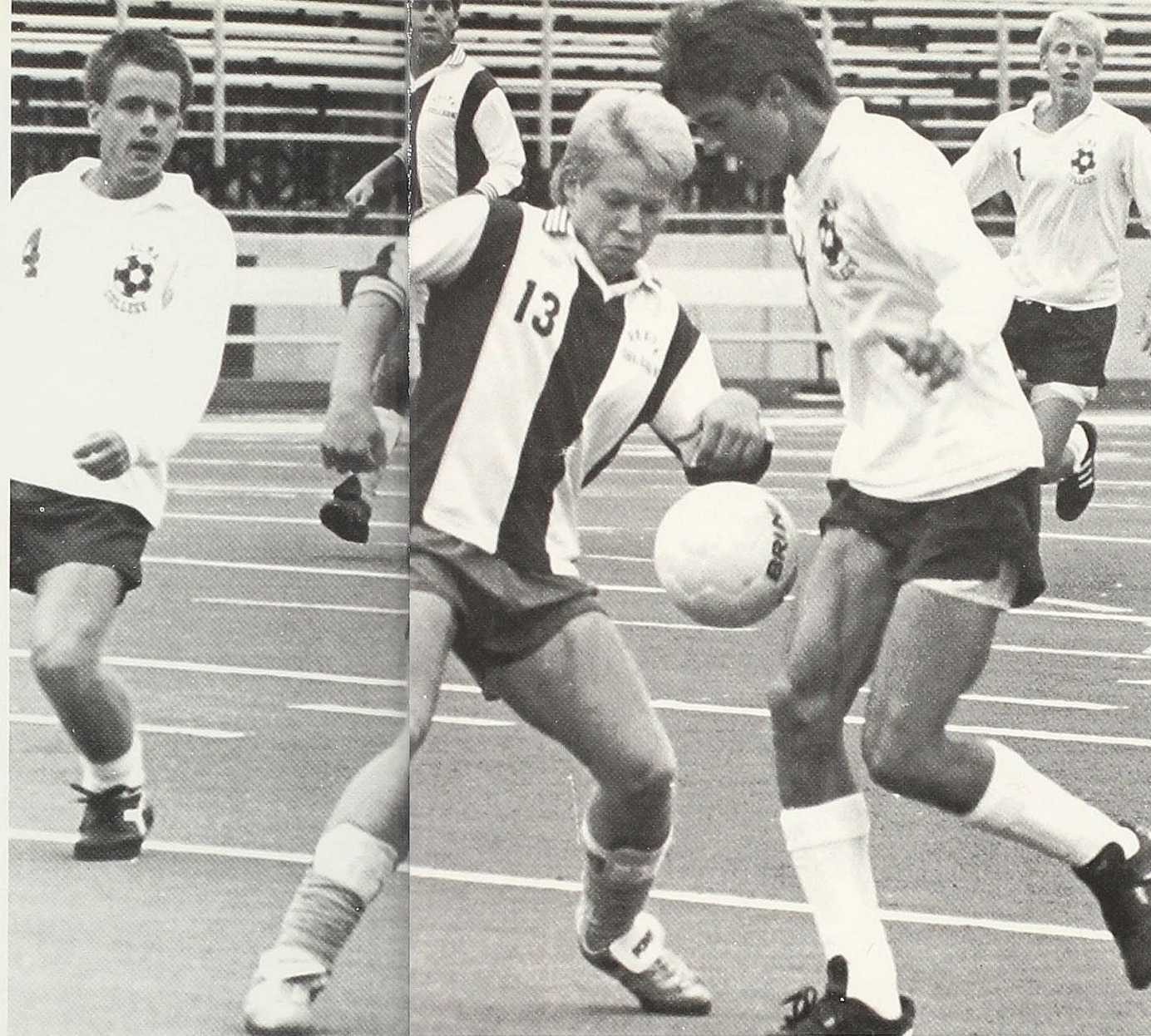
having trouble putting 11 players on the field for away games. Unfortunately the outcome of the season depended not upon the talent or ability of the team but on the overall health and consistency of the players.

A new twist was added to the season in the form of Janet Webster. Janet is the first women to be on a Scot soccer team.



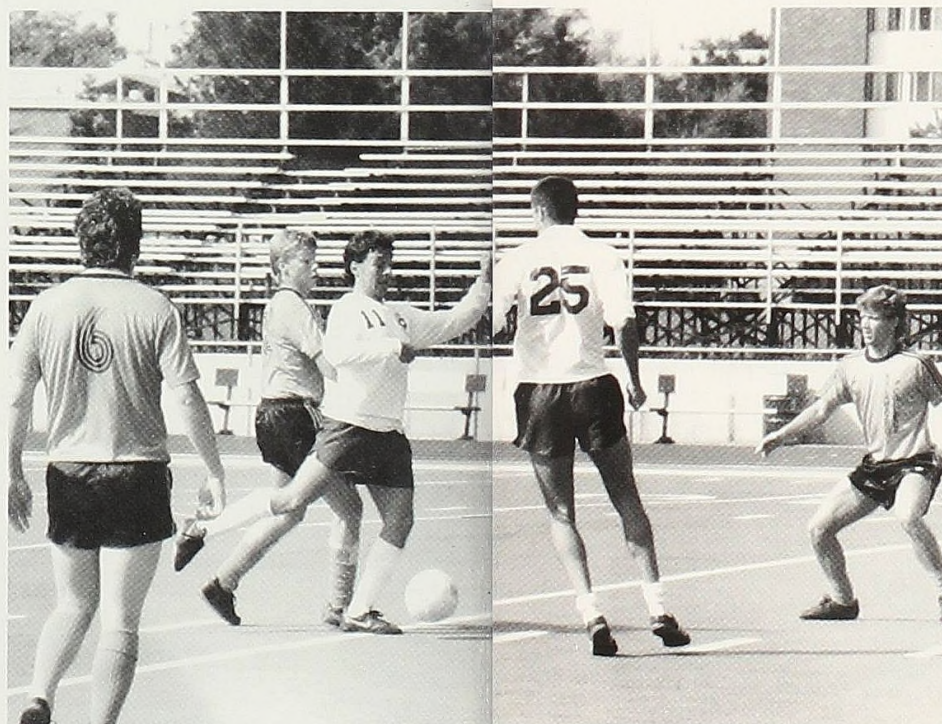
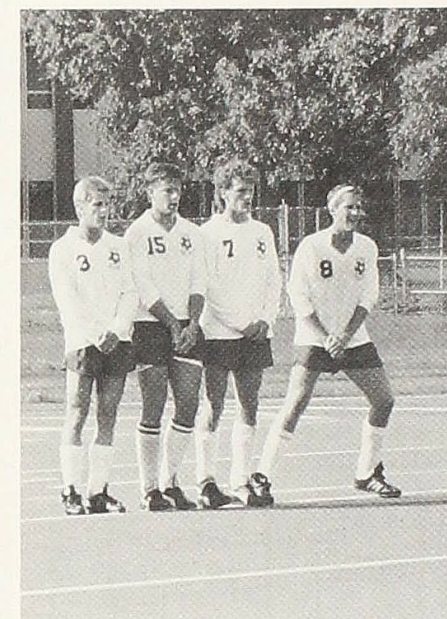

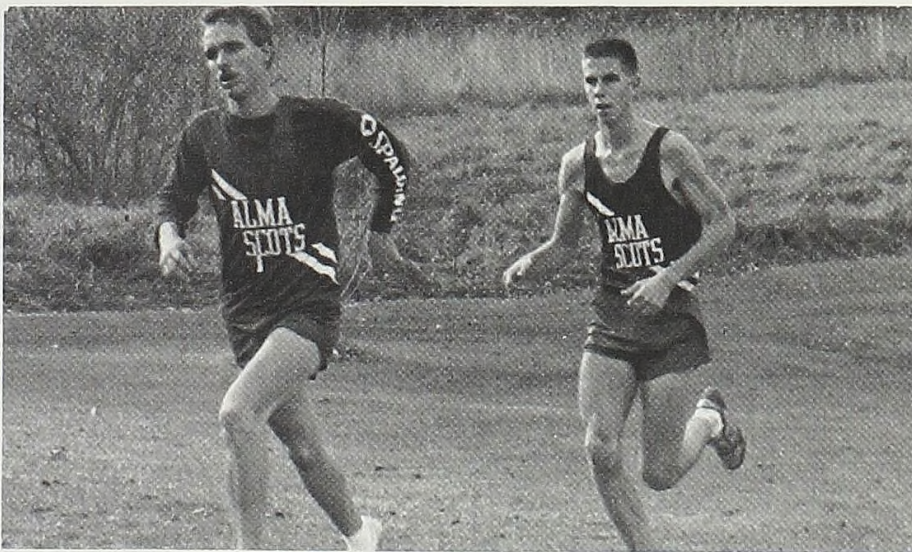

Young Team Proves Strong

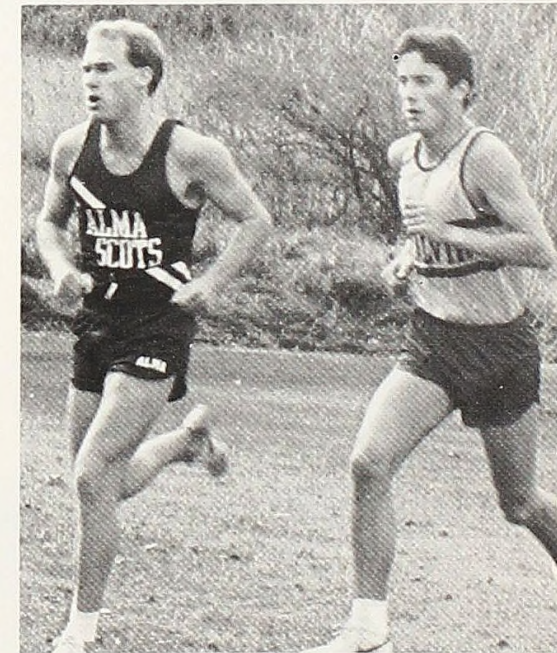

R. of 17:59 earning her a 4th place spot on the All-MIAA team. Team captain Kelly Betzold also ran extremely well taking 6th place and earning her All-Conference honors for her fourth year.

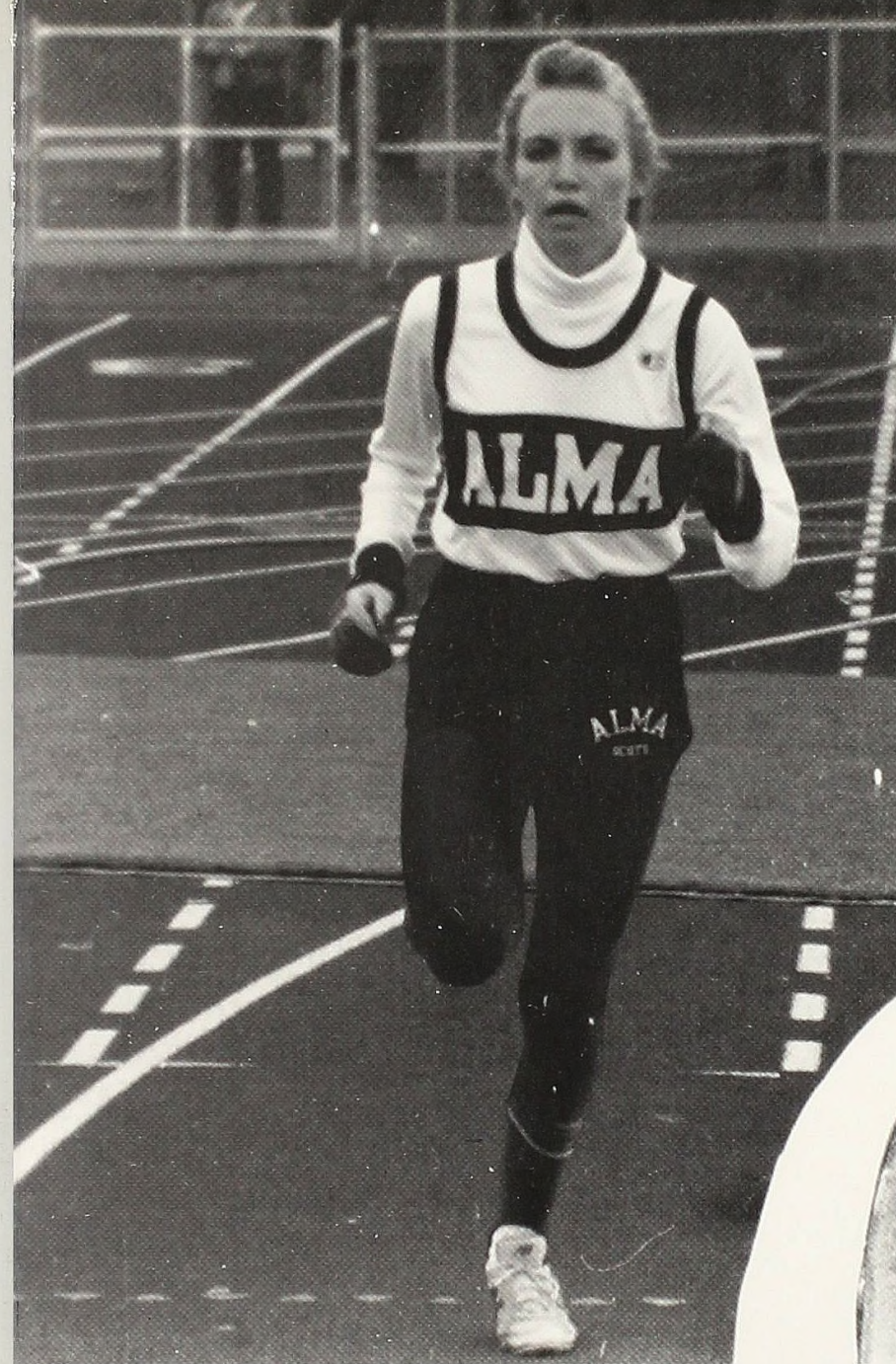


Sophomore Becky Irrer uses her tri-athlete training to her benefit as she paces herself in the Conference meet.

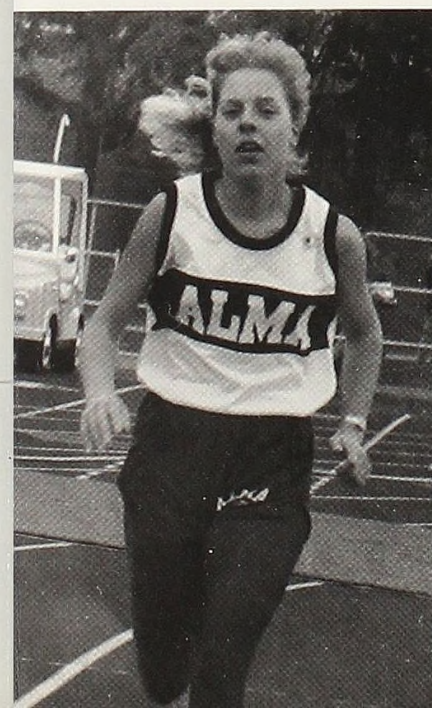
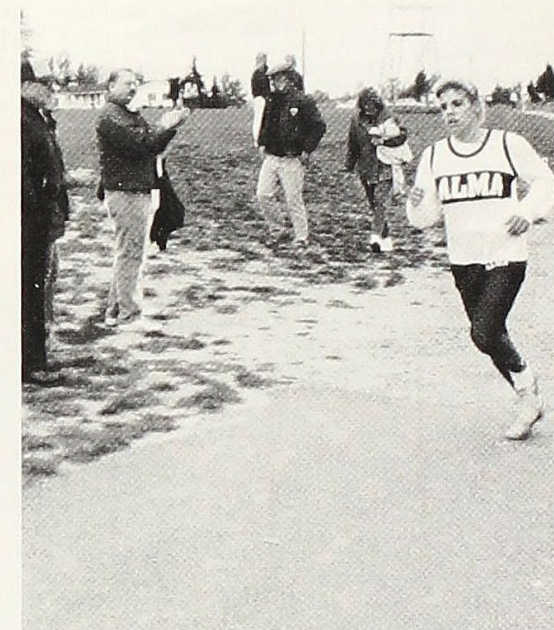

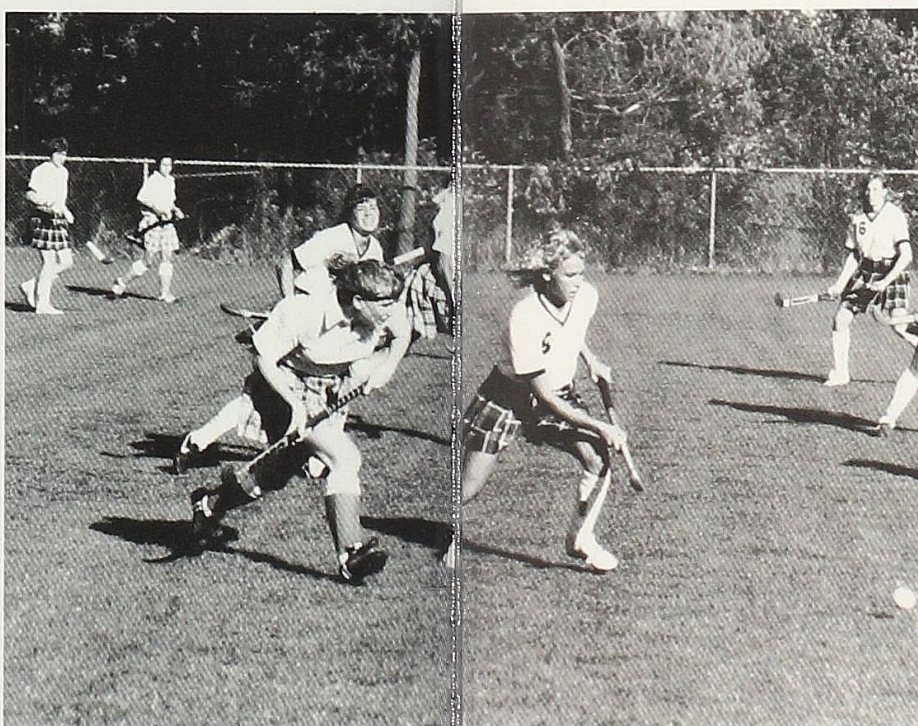

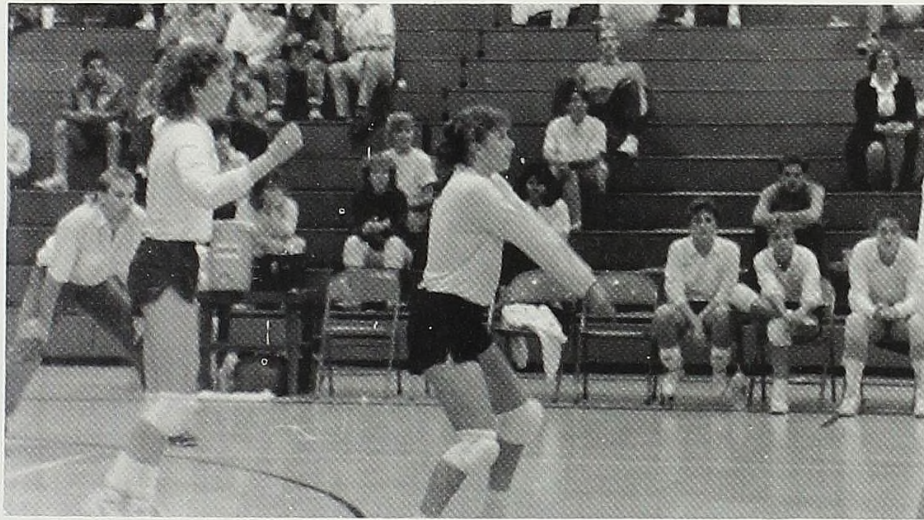
Spikers Struggle Through Disappointing Season

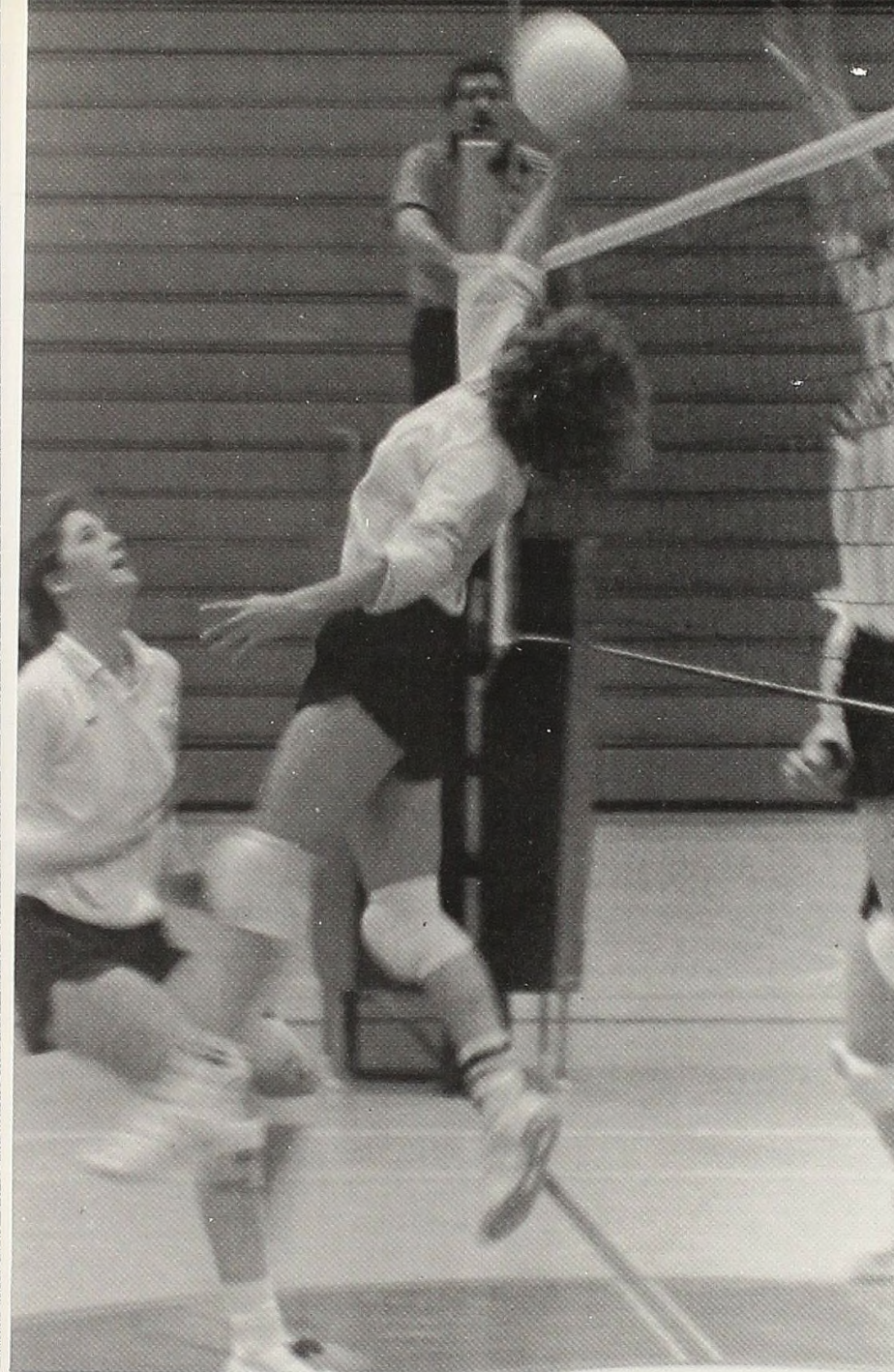
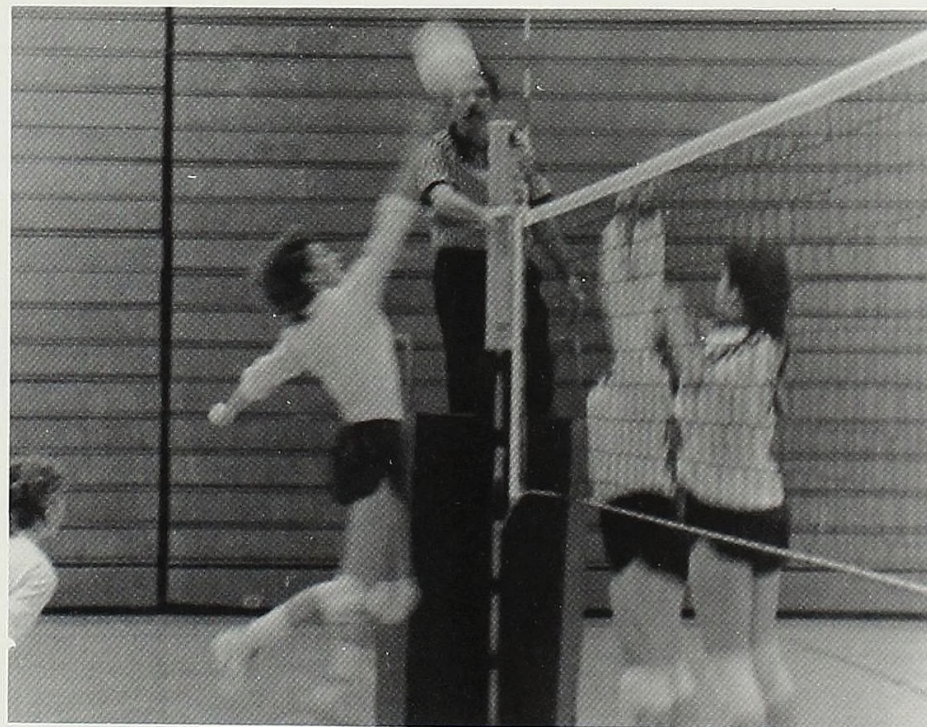

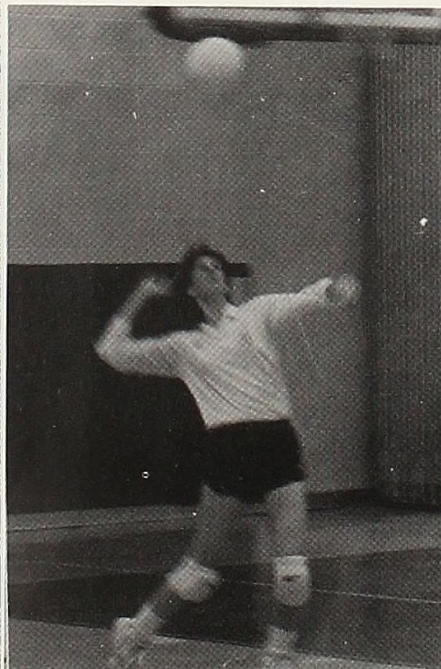

the team, "we're very unified, everyone is always cheering for and supporting everyone else." That is what made this years team a success.

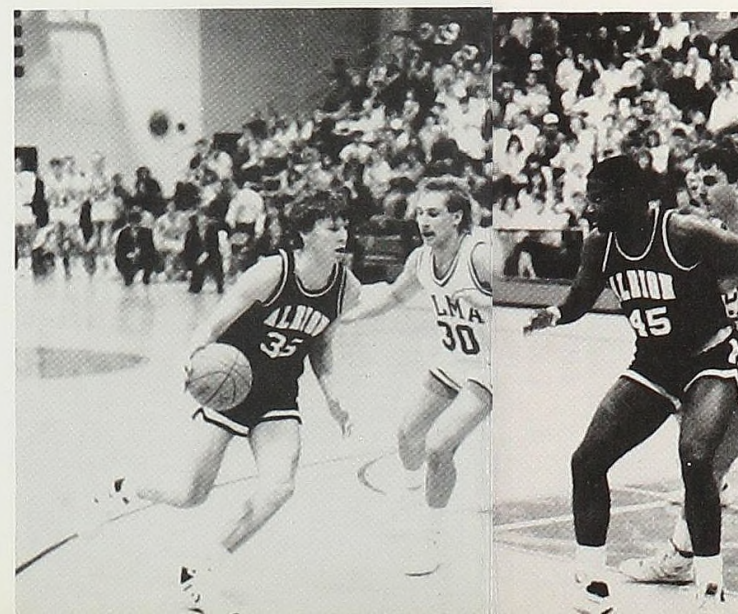
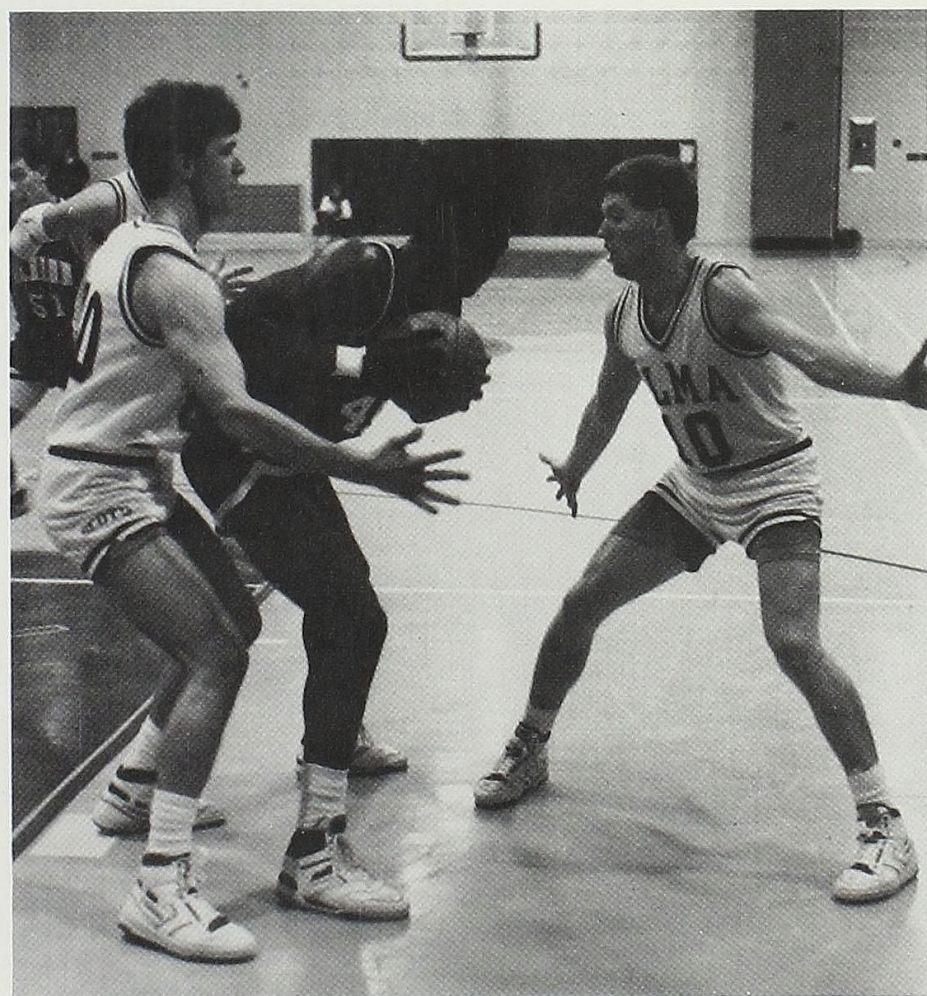

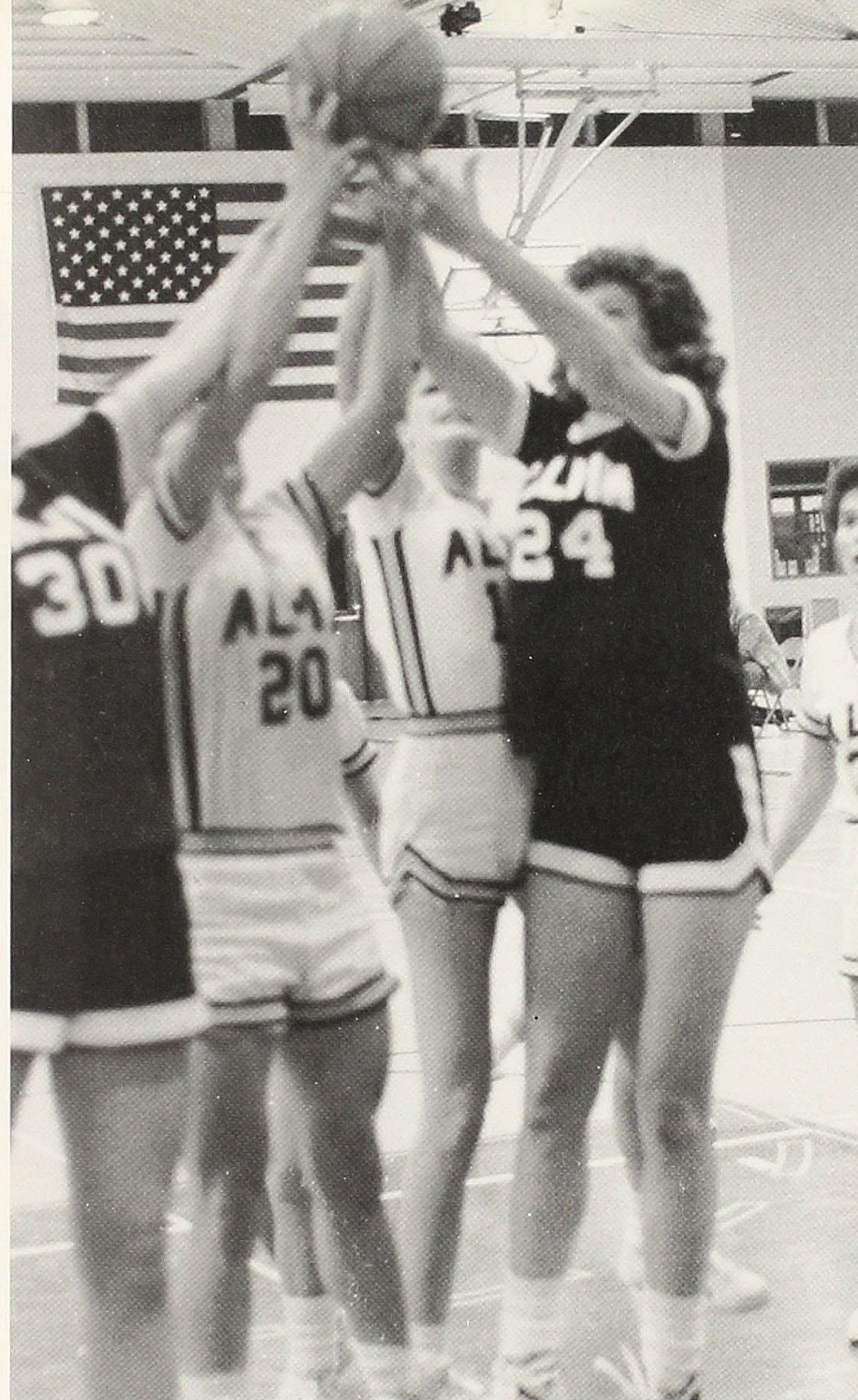
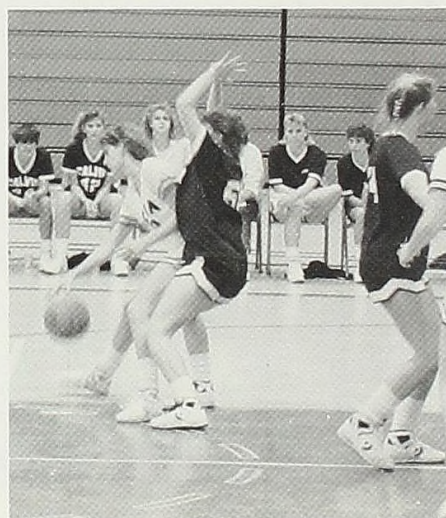
Cagers Hang Tough

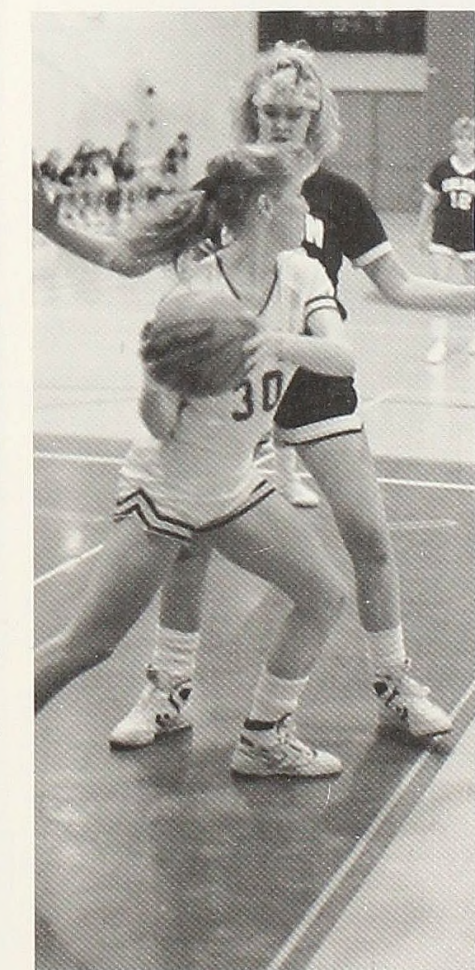
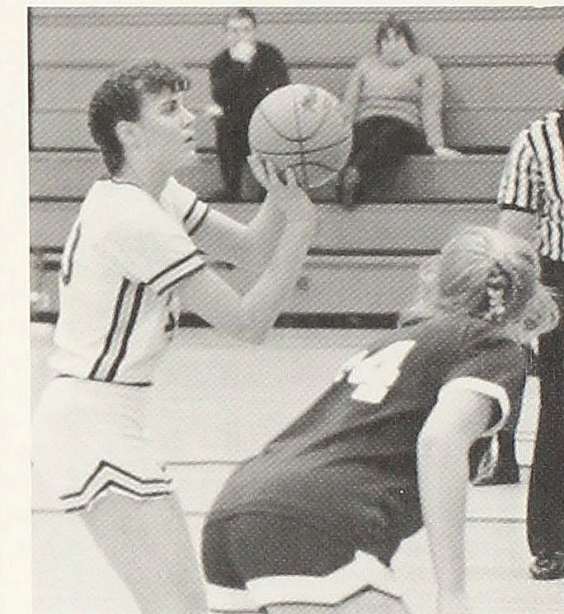

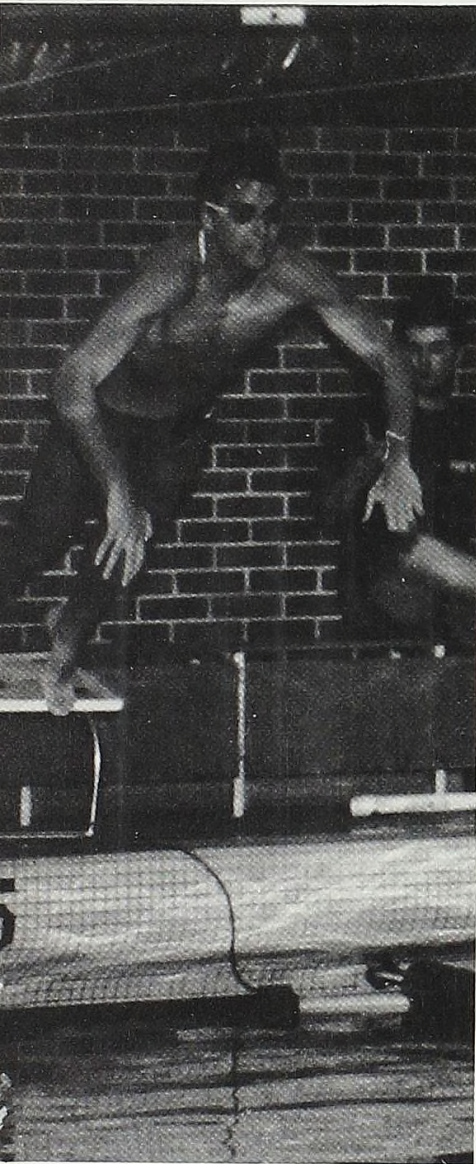

Men's Swim Team Shows Unity

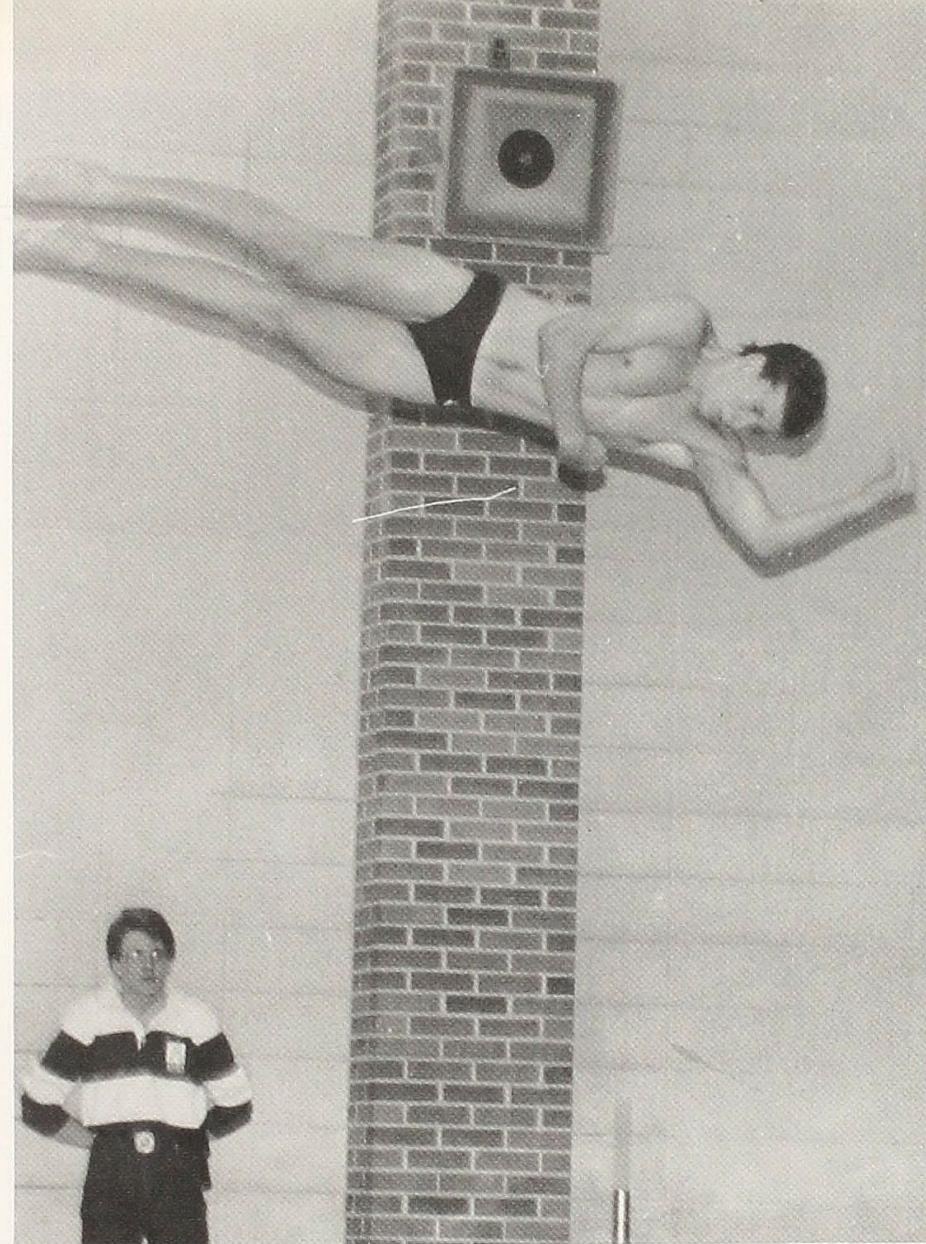
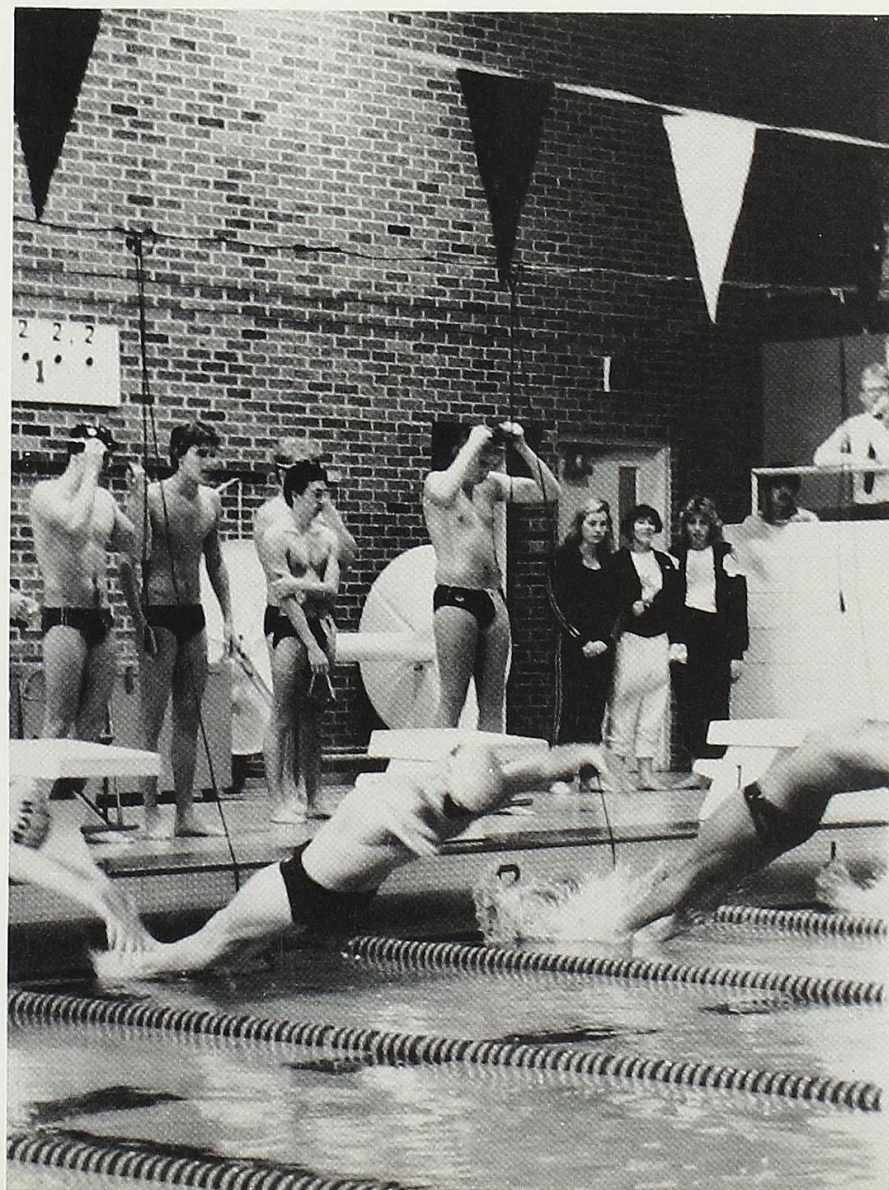

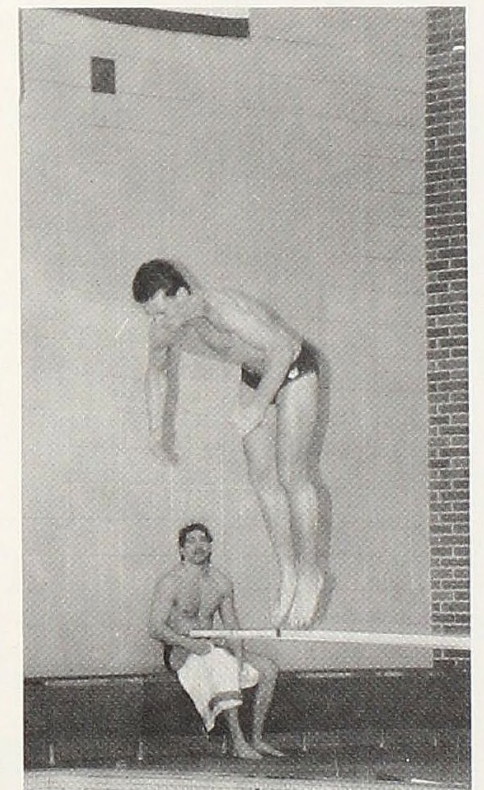

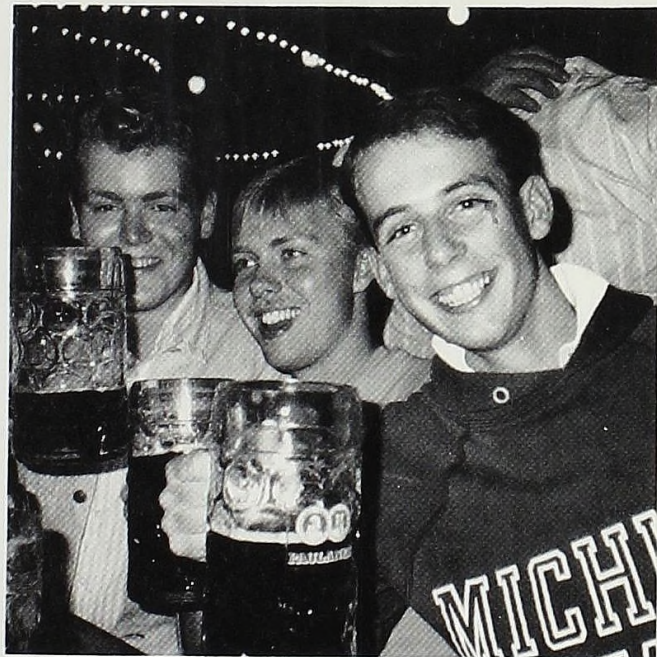
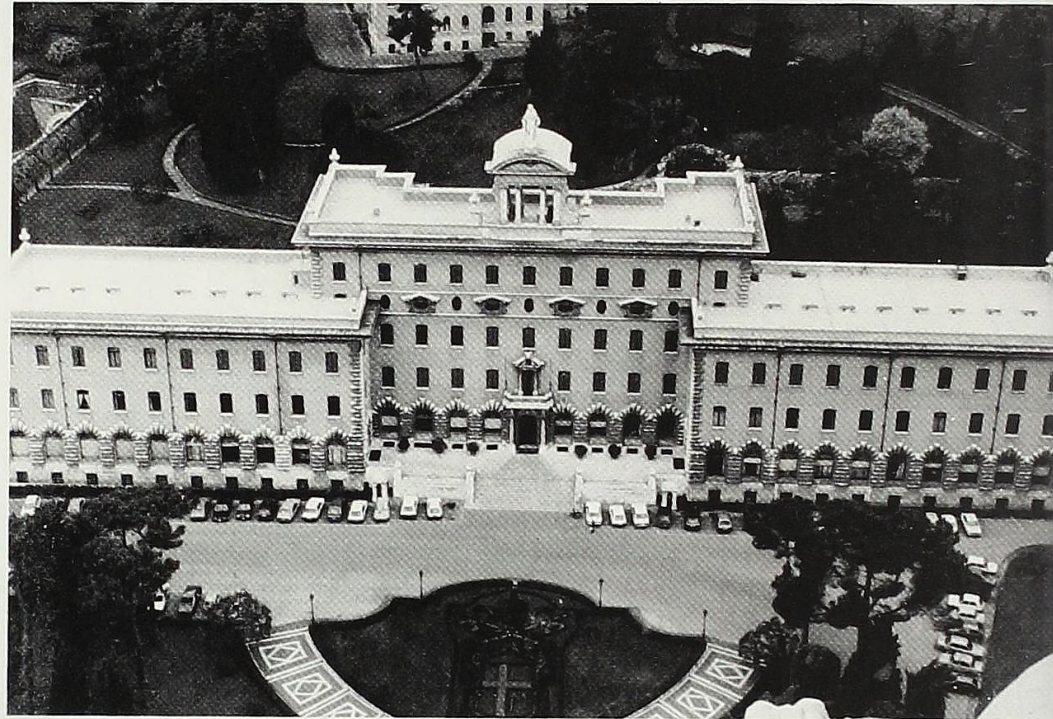
Social Events

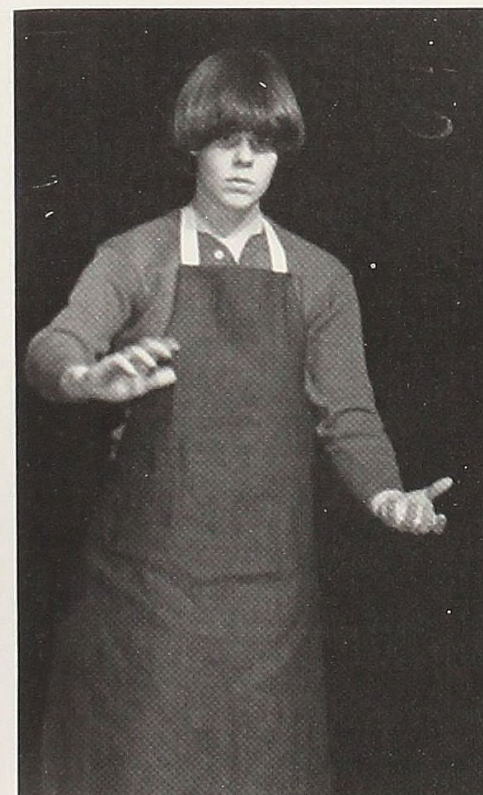
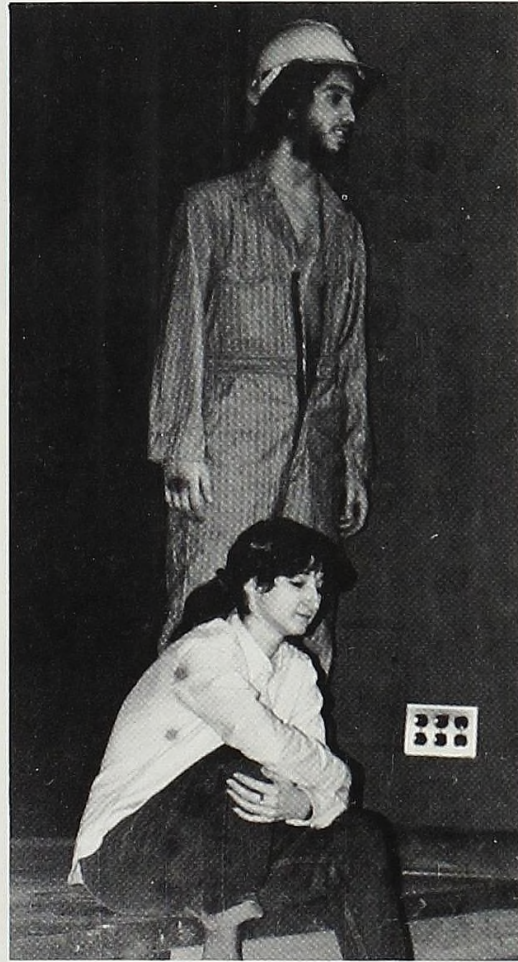
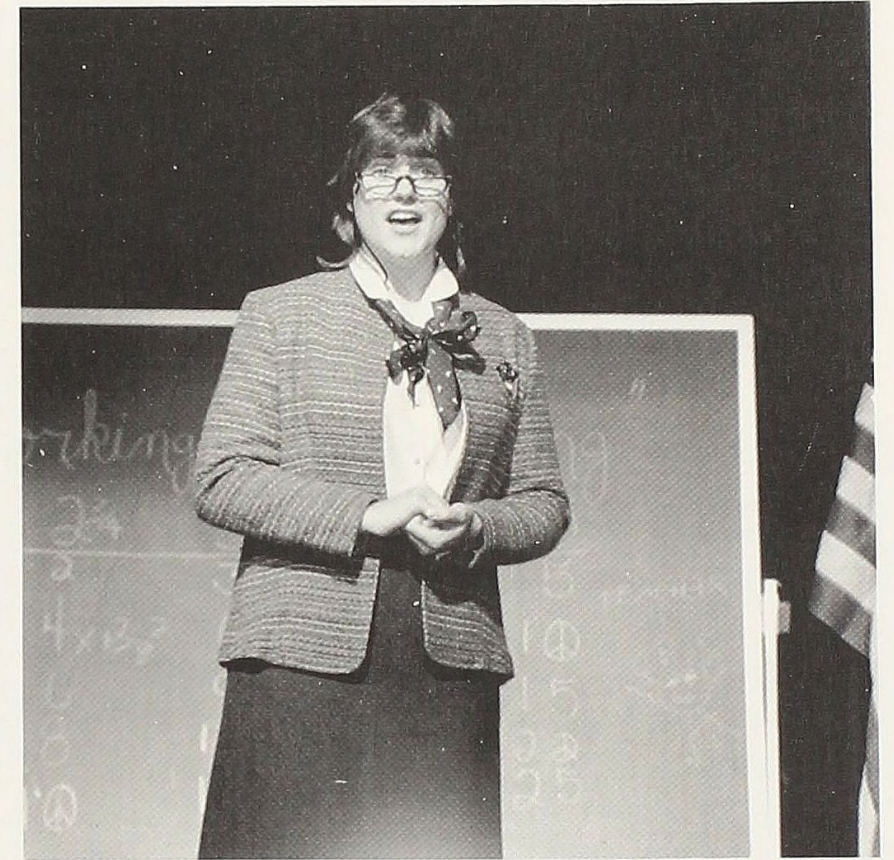
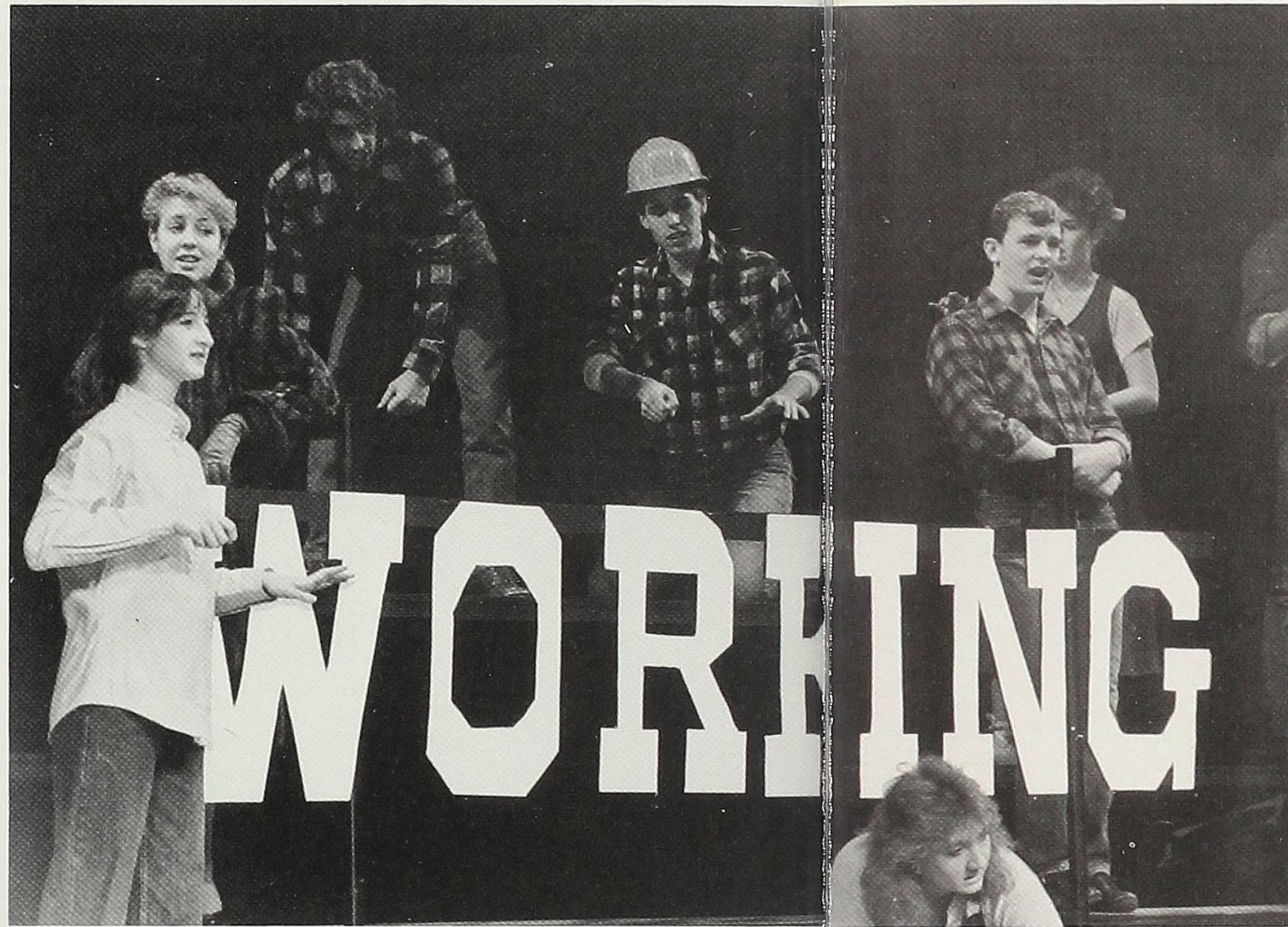
Concert Groups

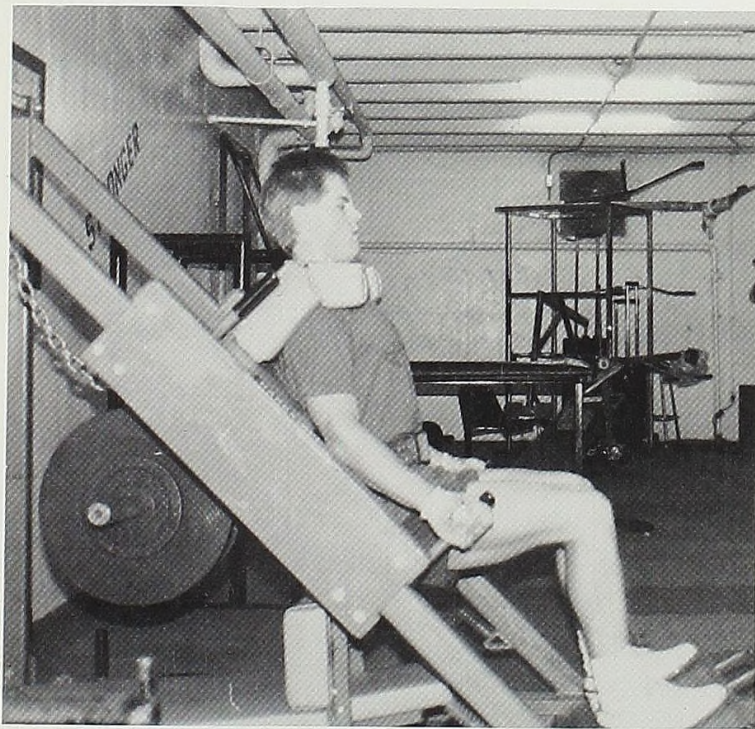
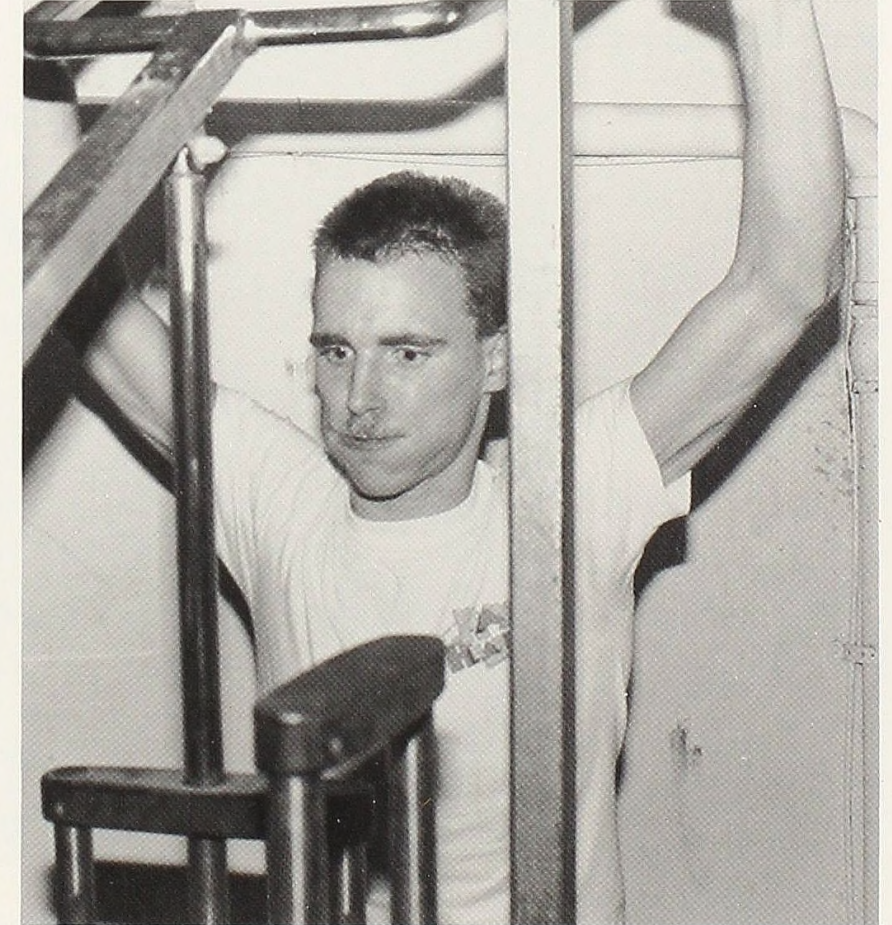
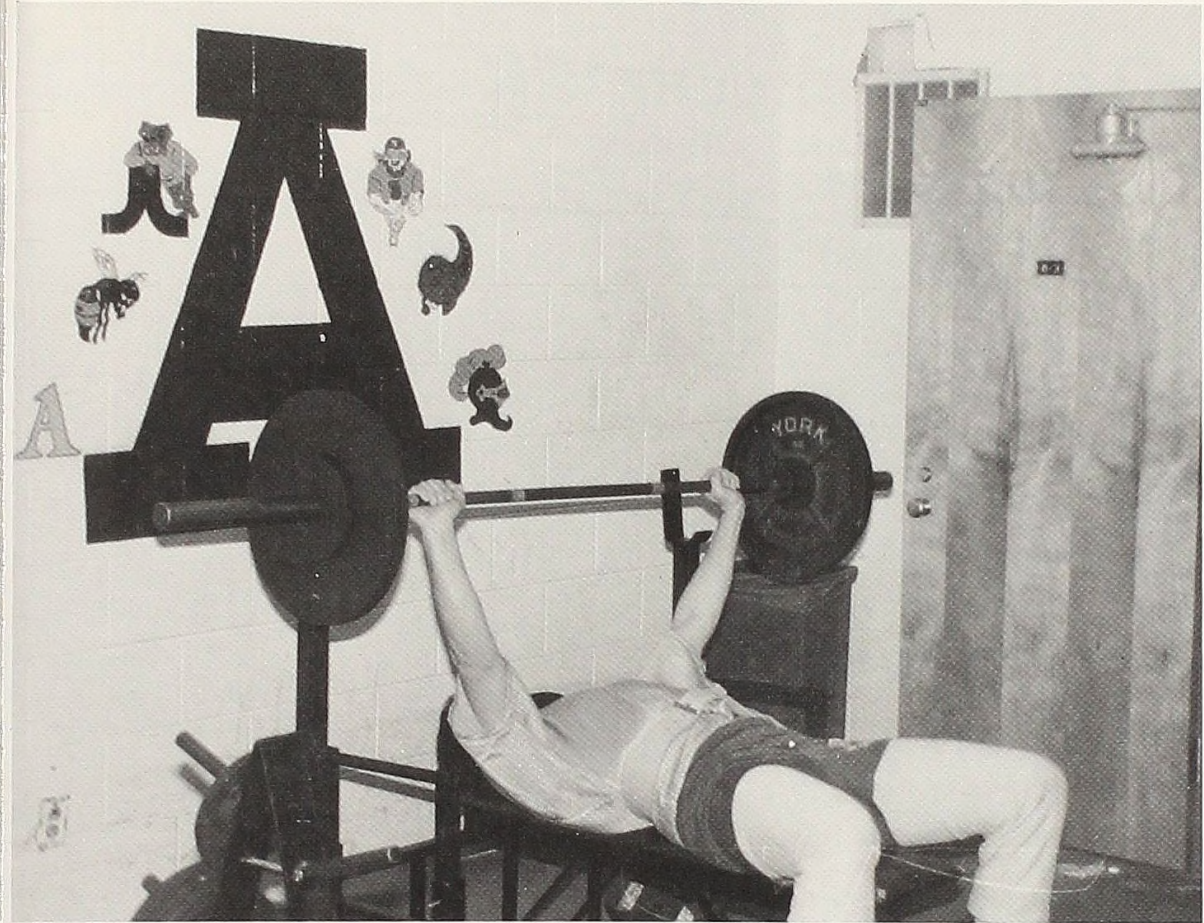
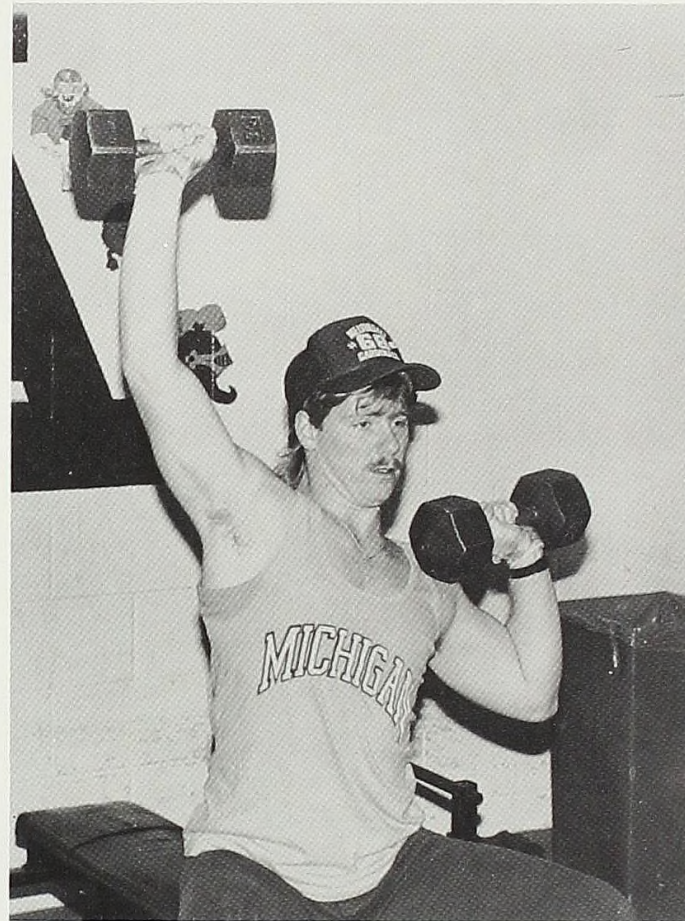
Dancers Take The Stage

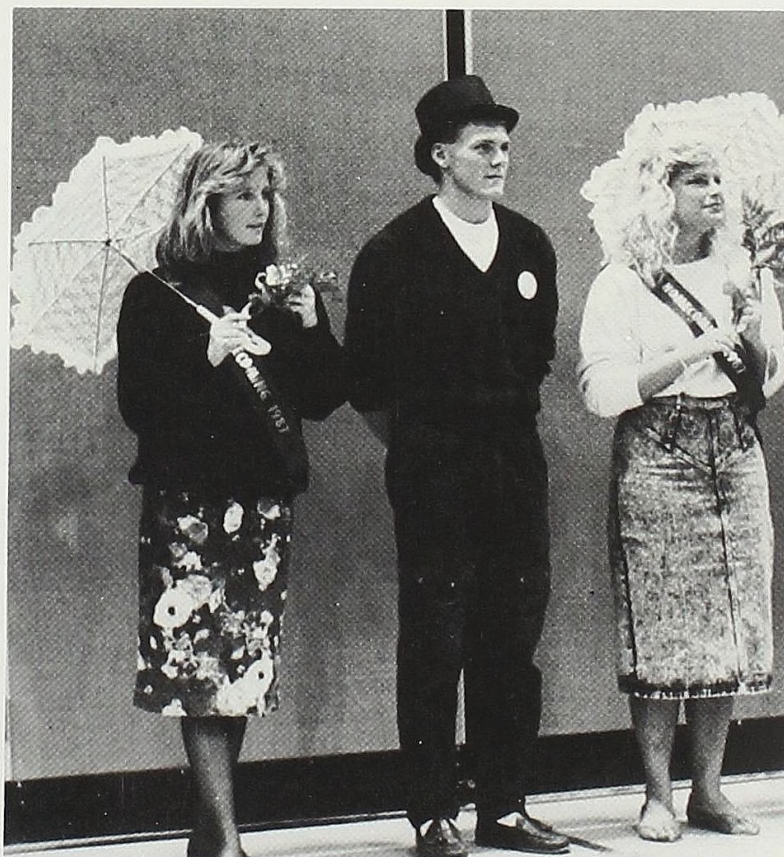
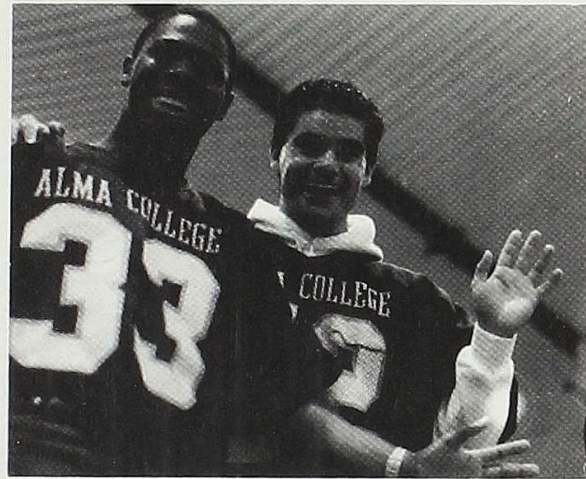
Kampus Kaos

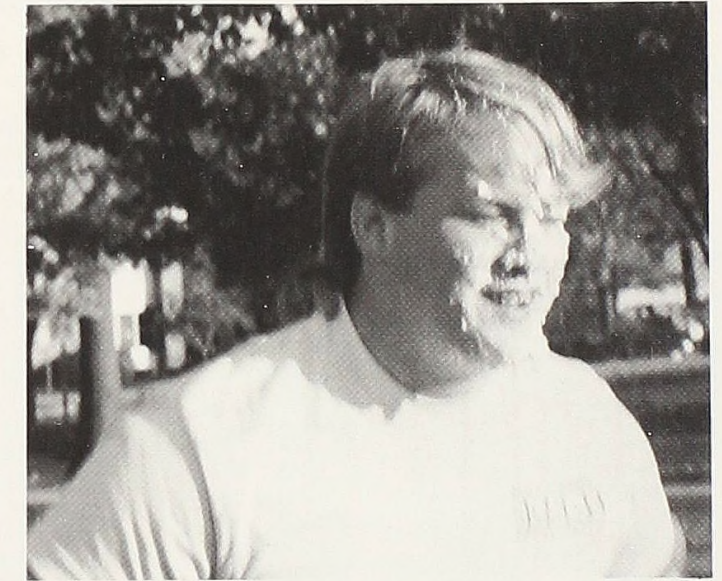

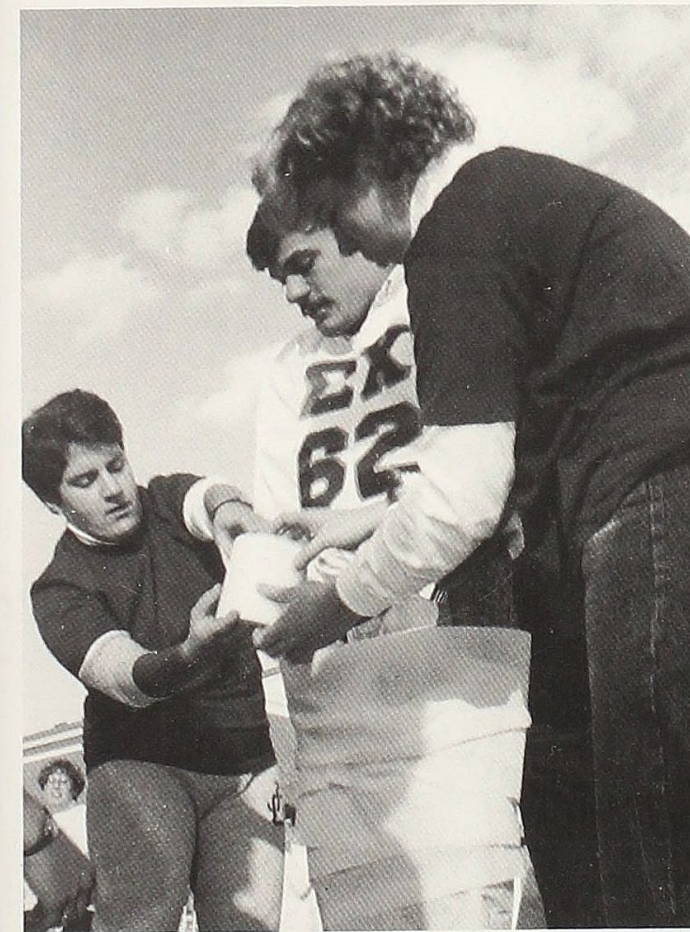


Derby Days Aids Charities

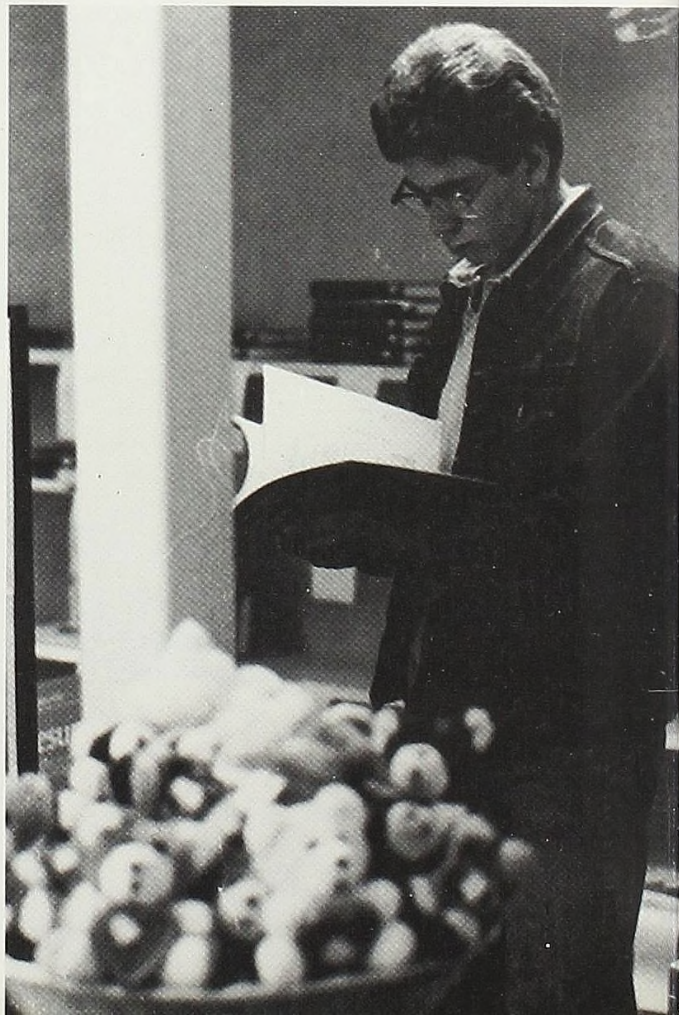
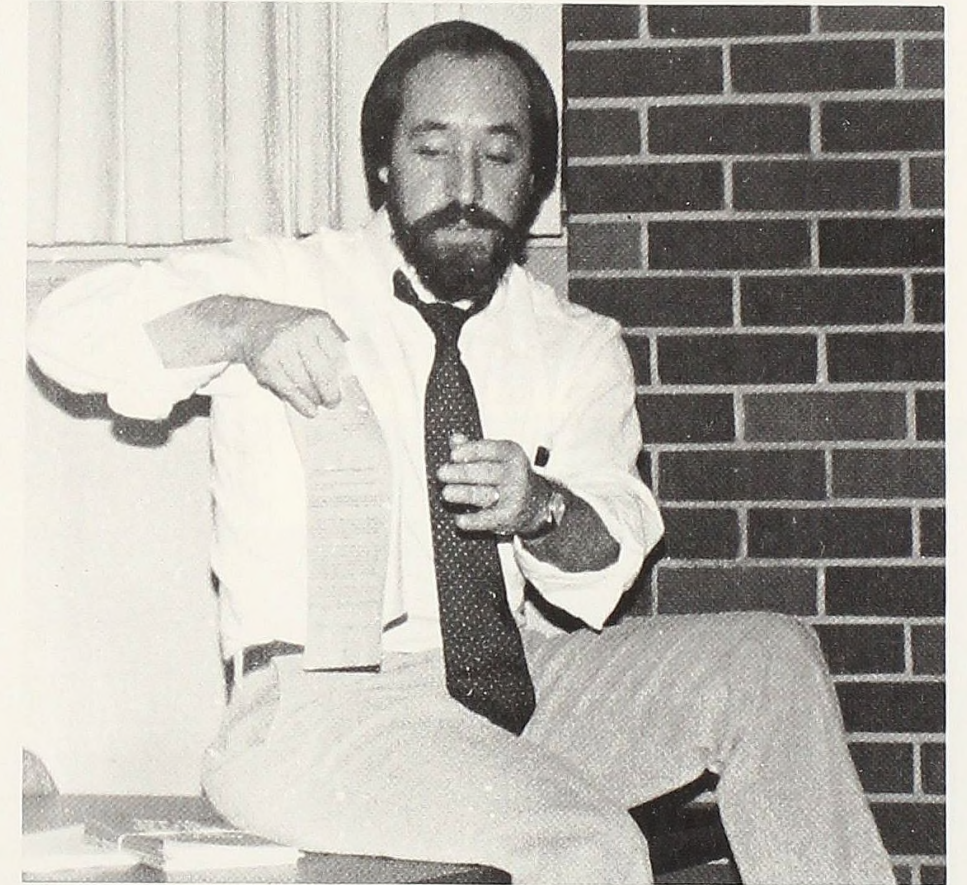
Scot Shop

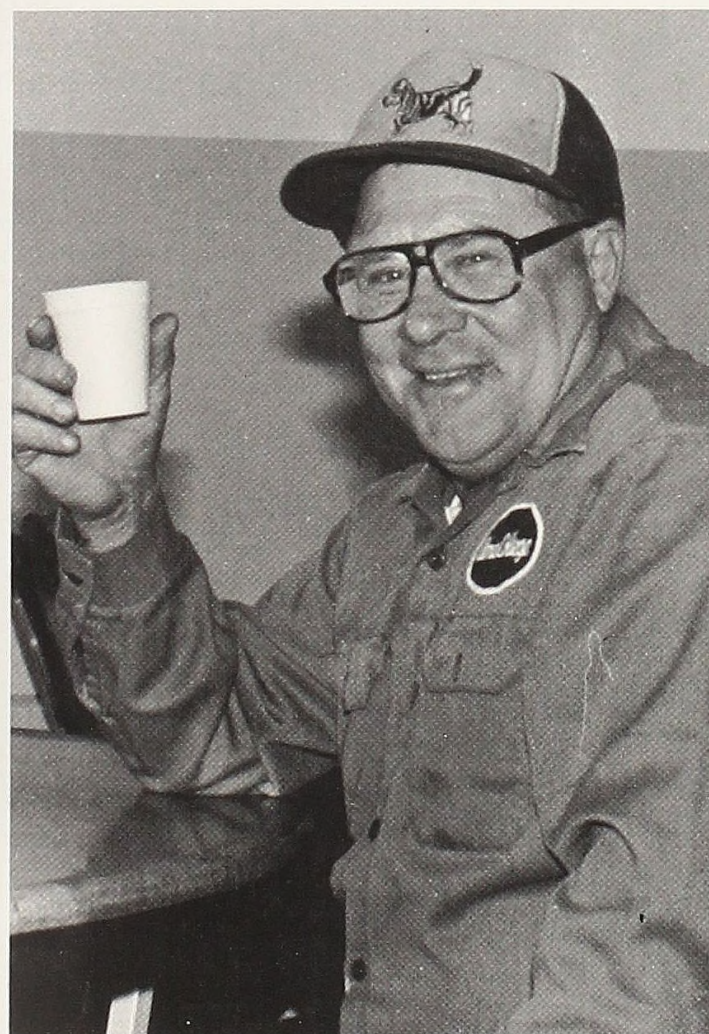
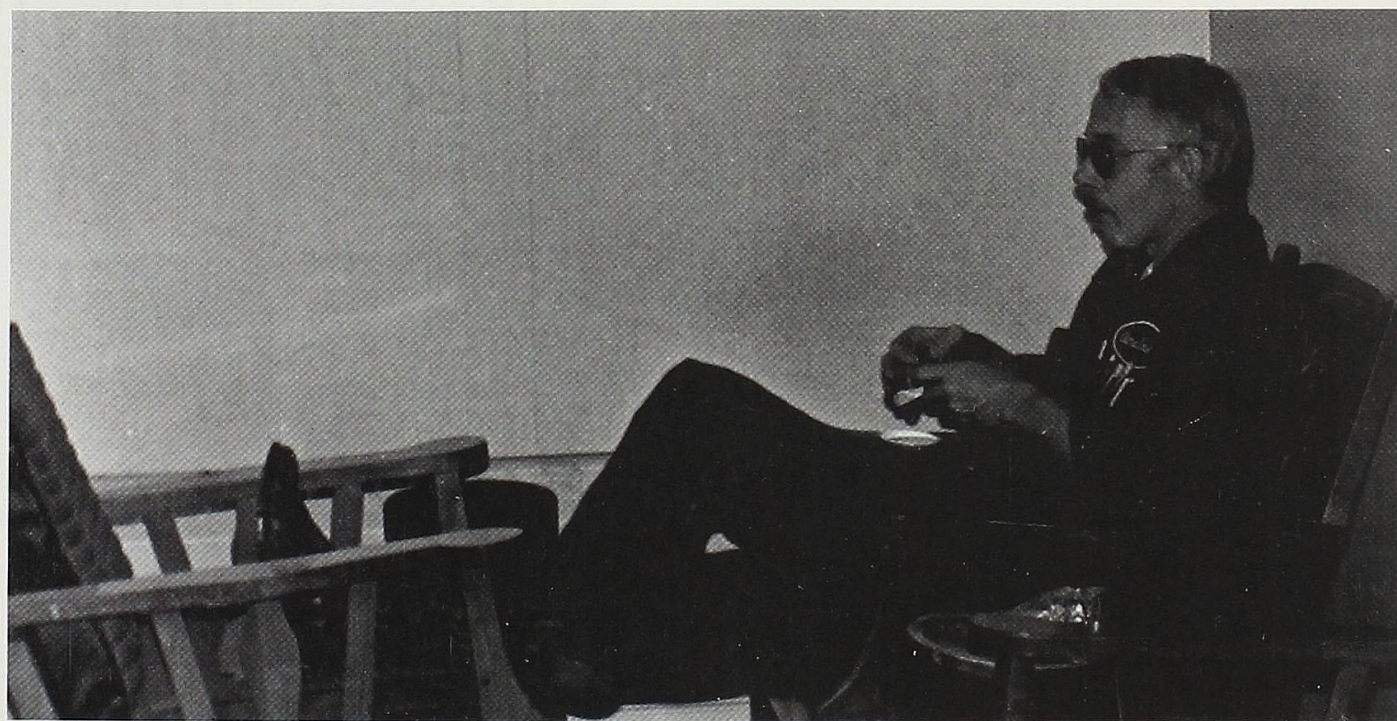
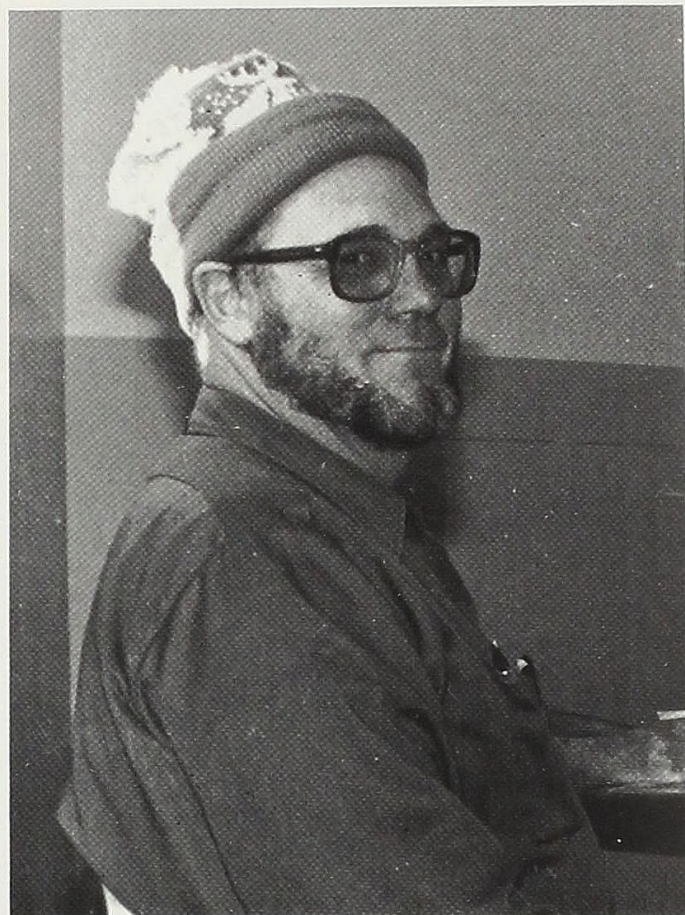
The Center Offers Guidance

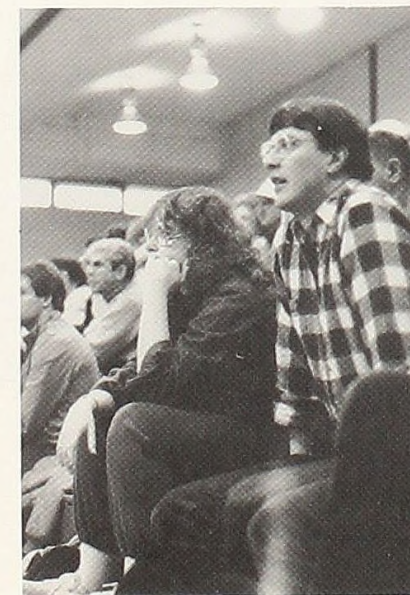
January 13, 1924- December 26, 1987

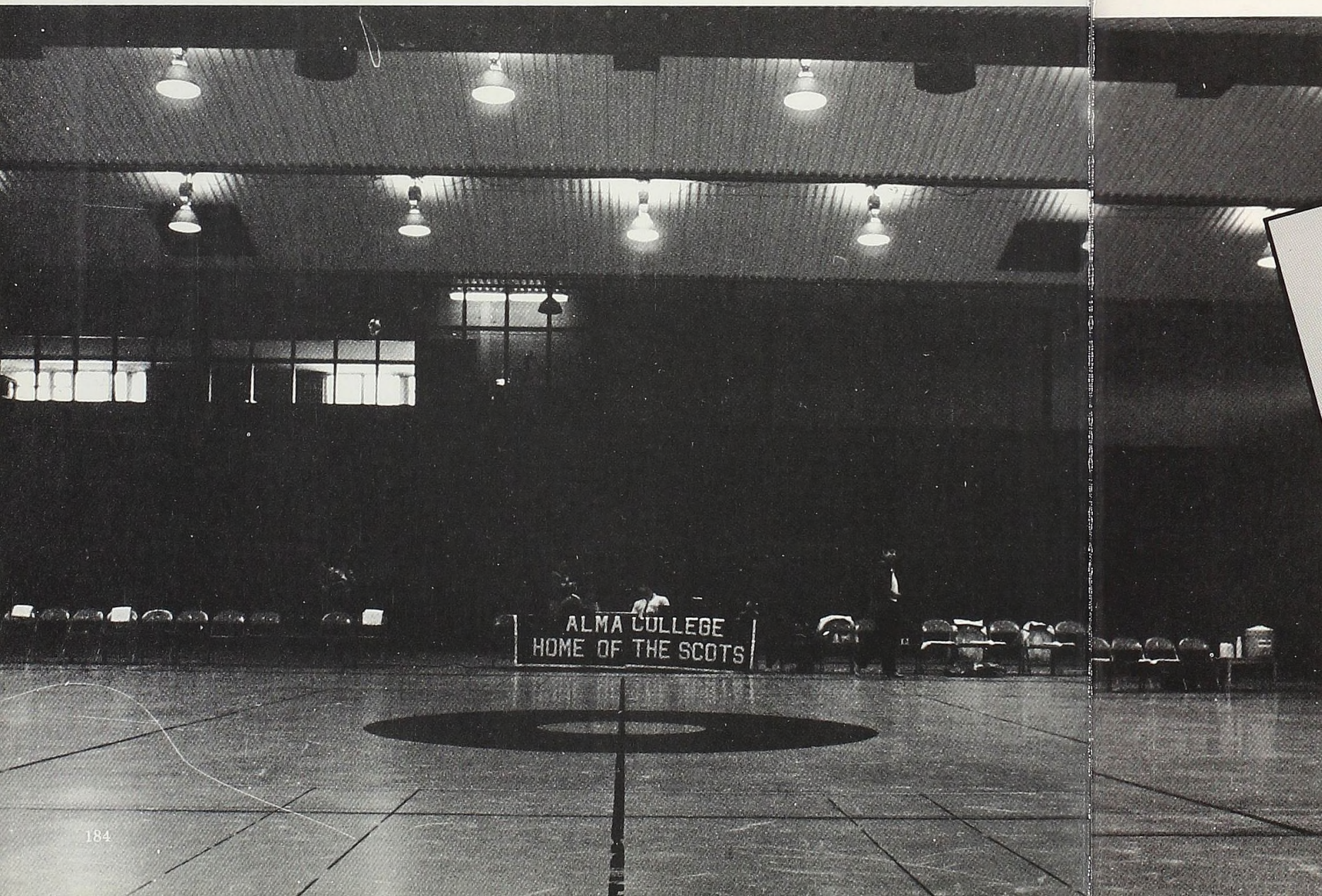
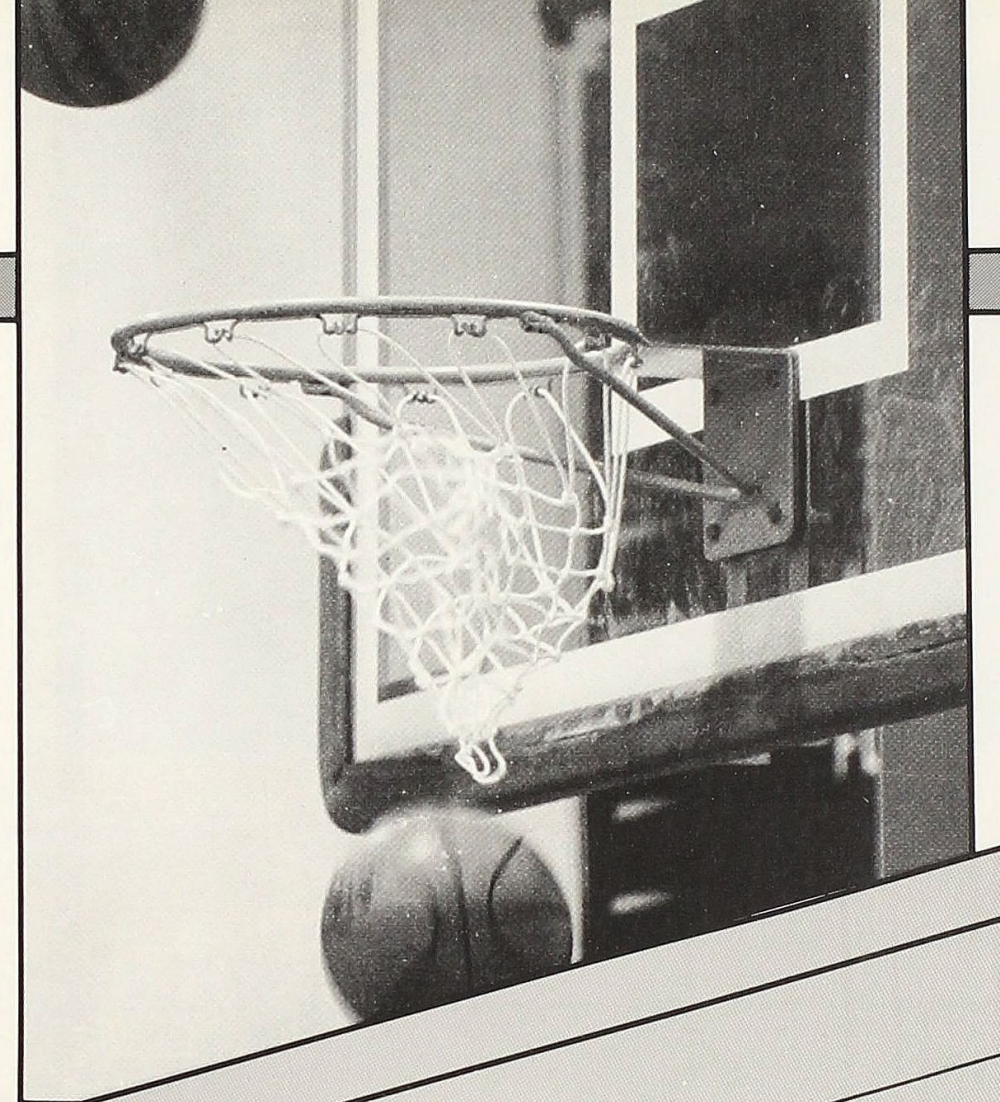
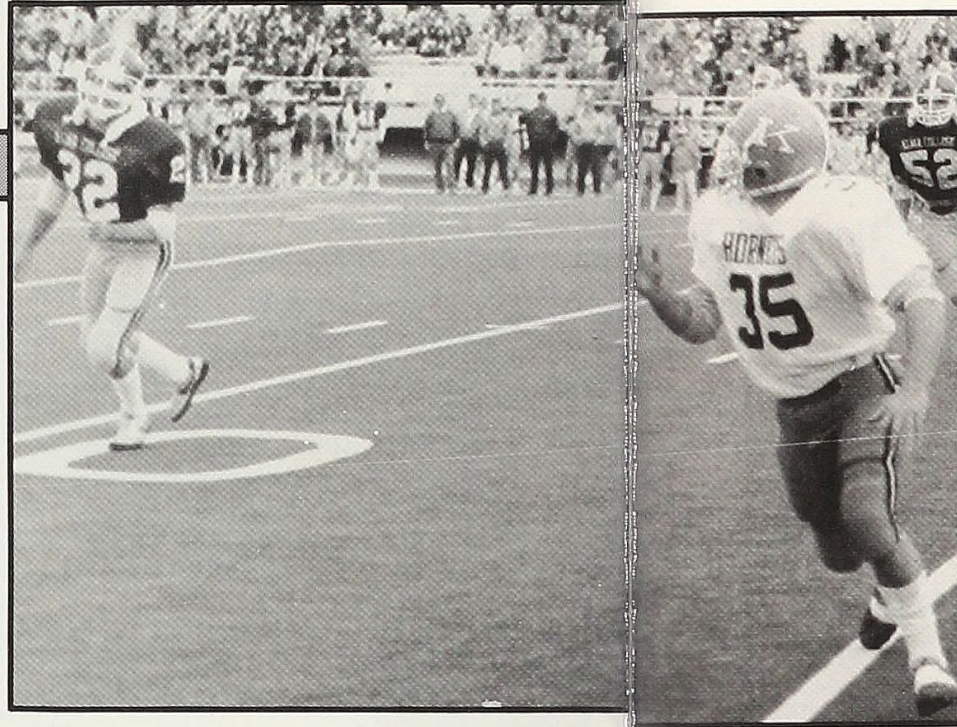
O.C. Welcomes New Students

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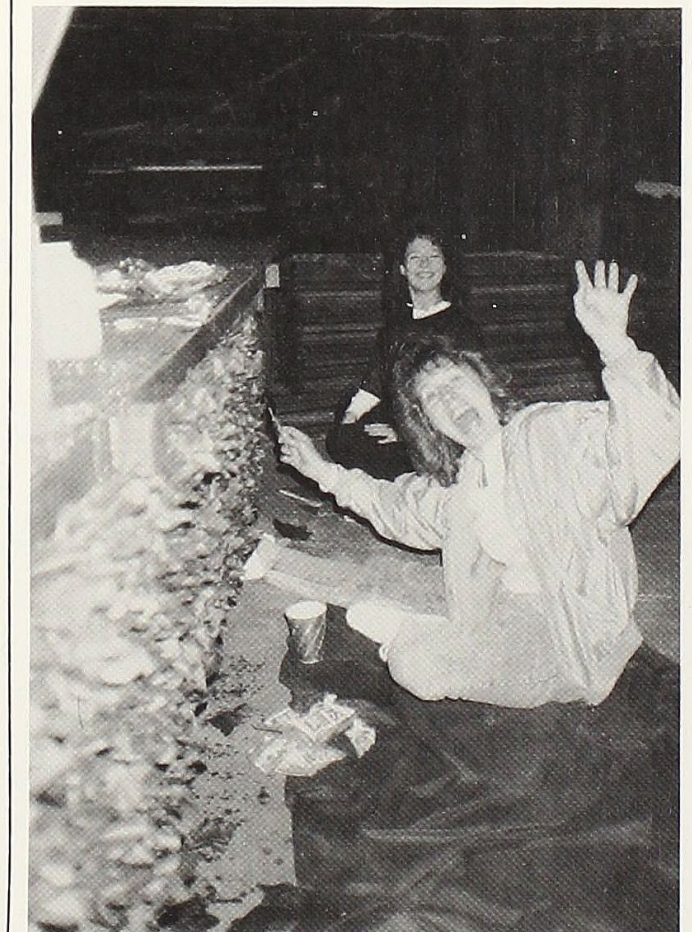
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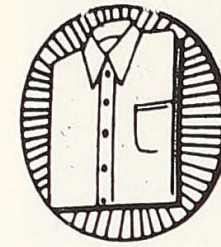
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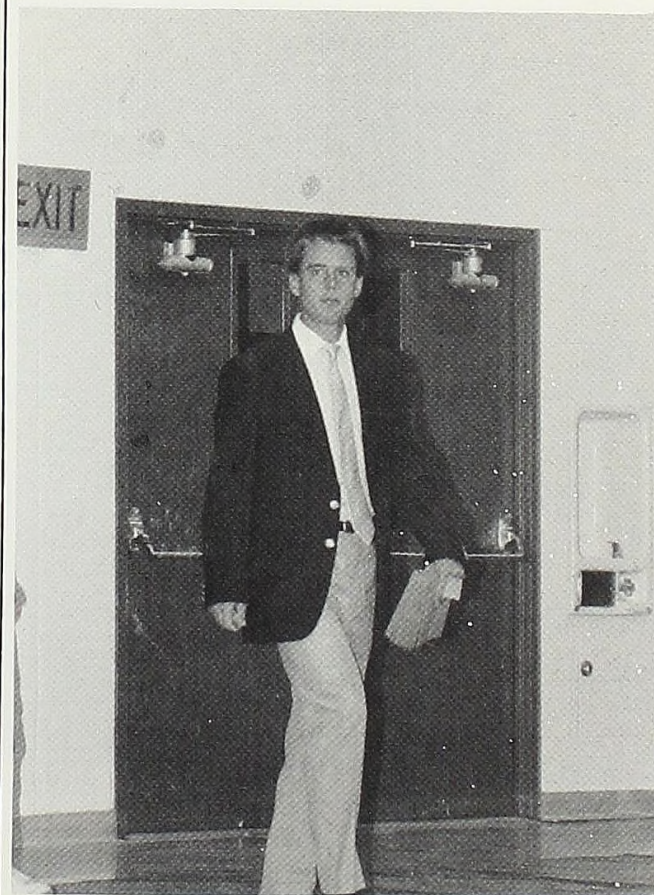
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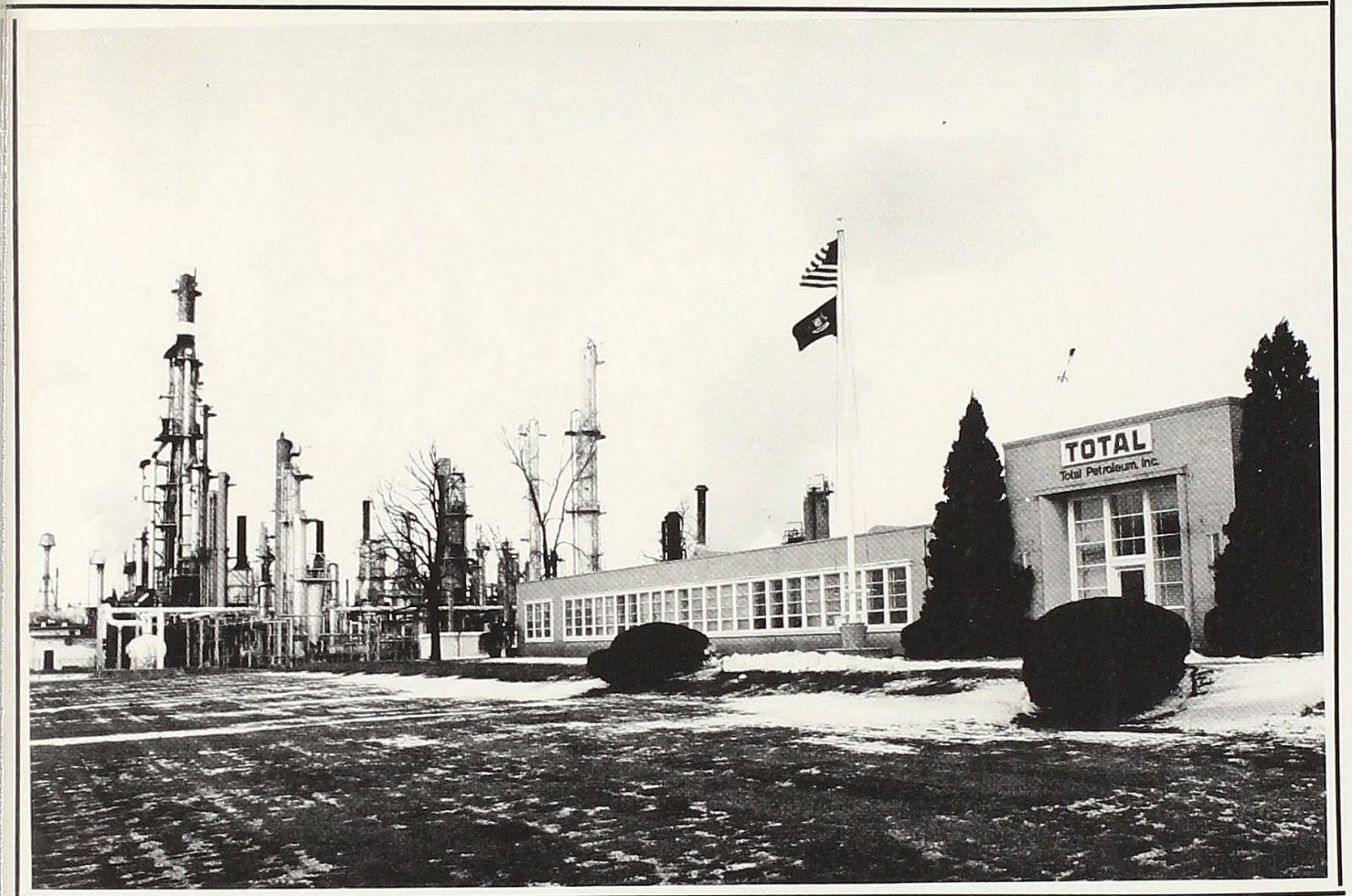
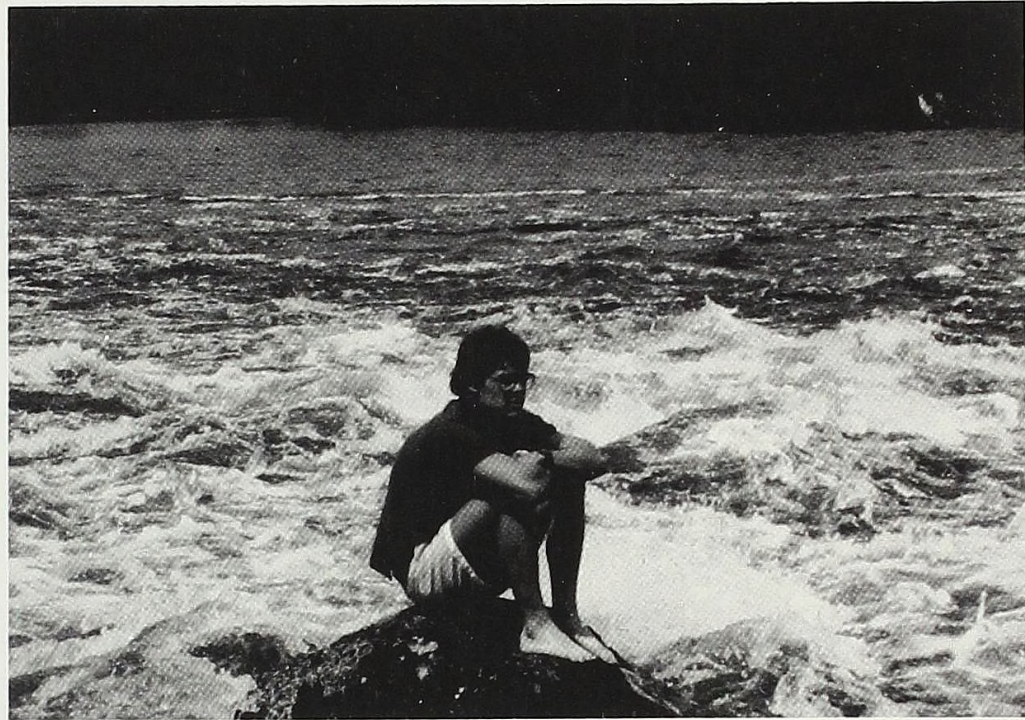
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To the graduating seniors
