DR. RONALD O. KAPP March 10, 1935-March 24, 1989

In memory of his devotion to and love for the Alma College community, this year's <u>Scotsman</u> has been dedicated to Dr. Ron Kapp. He was a highly admired man who was an inspiration to all those fortunate enough to have had their lives touched by him. Dr. Kapp was one who appreciated the opportunities which were brought with the dawn of each new day, and he believed that study and hard work were the keys to success.

Dr. Kapp had a life full of accomplishments. Hailing from Ann Arbor, Dr. Kapp, a Phi Beta Kappa member, graduated from the University of Michigan in 1957 after completion of both a B.A. and M.S. in biology. After graduation, he started his career at Alma College as a biology instructor. In 1963, Dr. Kapp earned his Ph.D. from the University of Michigan and continued teaching biology, advancing from instructor to full professor. Six years after receiving his doctorate degree, Dr. Kapp was named provost and vicepresident of academic affairs.


The college and community were terribly shocked when, on November 20, 1989, Dr. Kapp resigned from his position as provost of Alma College. His resignation was due to a deep and complex brain tumor which was determined to be malignant and inoperable.


Dr. Kapp was popular with and well-liked by both students and faculty throughout his career. "He combined good scholarship, caring for students, and an ability to motivate students to do their best, " said Robert Swanson, Alma College's president from 1956 to 1980. President Alan Stone added, "Dr. Kapp has been a major figure in this institution. Much of where we are today is the result of his good work."

This campus will not be the same without Dr. Kapp, but we must reflect upon the positive influence which he had. Dr. Joseph Walser, interim provost and Professor of Religious Studies at Alma

College, said, "Kapp left us a remarkable example of a strong life...the spirit of that strength will lead us through our tomorrows."

Thank you, Dr. Kappfor everything.




HOMECOMING '89 -








12 ALMA SCOTS **TRIUMPH**


THE TIME OF YOUR LIFE Winter 1990 Play Proves To Be Dramatic






DANCE CONCERT


TALENT ABOUNDS AT SONGFEST

Women Enjoy Another Good Year





A BIG HIT Softball record is impressive



The Scots will host the First Alma Invitational, a six-team tournament. The Scots hope to keep the trophy in Alma as they face five teams during the two day tournament.




WOMEN'S TRACK ON TOP "Get set for six!"


It's a smash!

Under the leadership of John Heinlein and Steve Gardner, Amnesty International held a four-band Amnesty concert and circulated petitions protesting the executions of individuals in foreign countries. They also wrote letters demanding the release of prisoners of conscience.




CHI EPSILON MU Chemistry Honor Society


