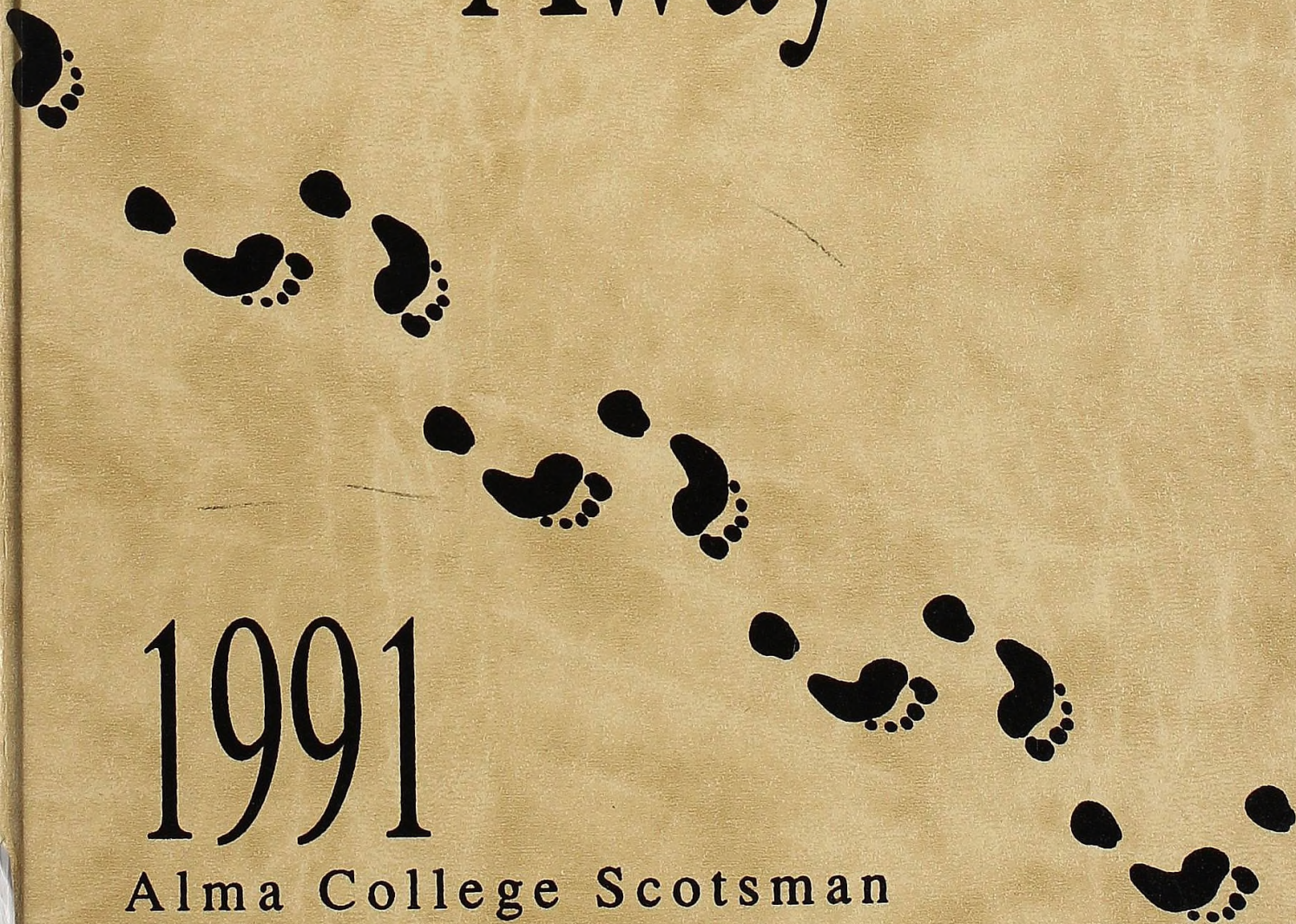

Students divided their time between campus and the town of Alma. The Alma merchants are very supportive of the students, the college, and the *Scotsman*.



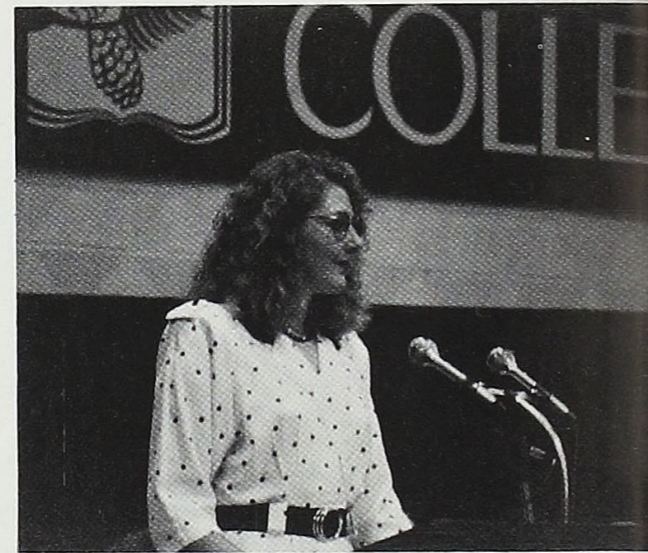


# A Different Beginning For A New Year

The 1990-91 school year began with a little more than the usual pomp and circumstance of opening convocation. The professors donned their caps, cowls and gowns. 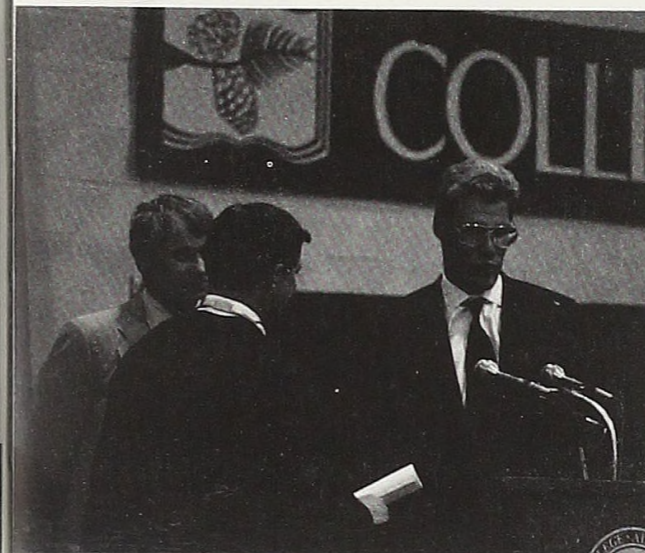
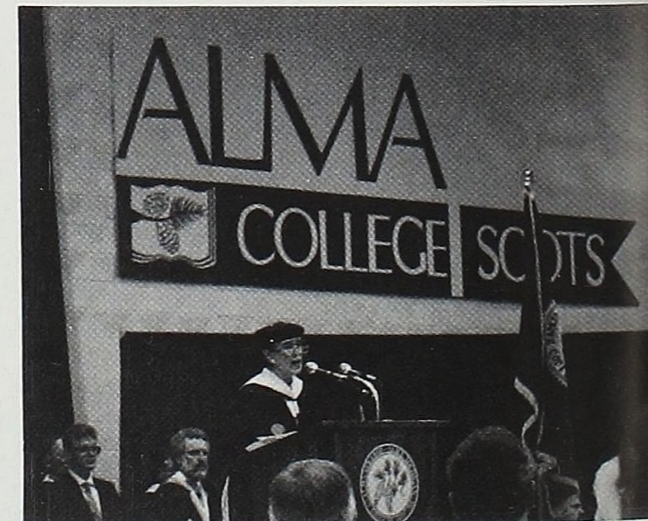

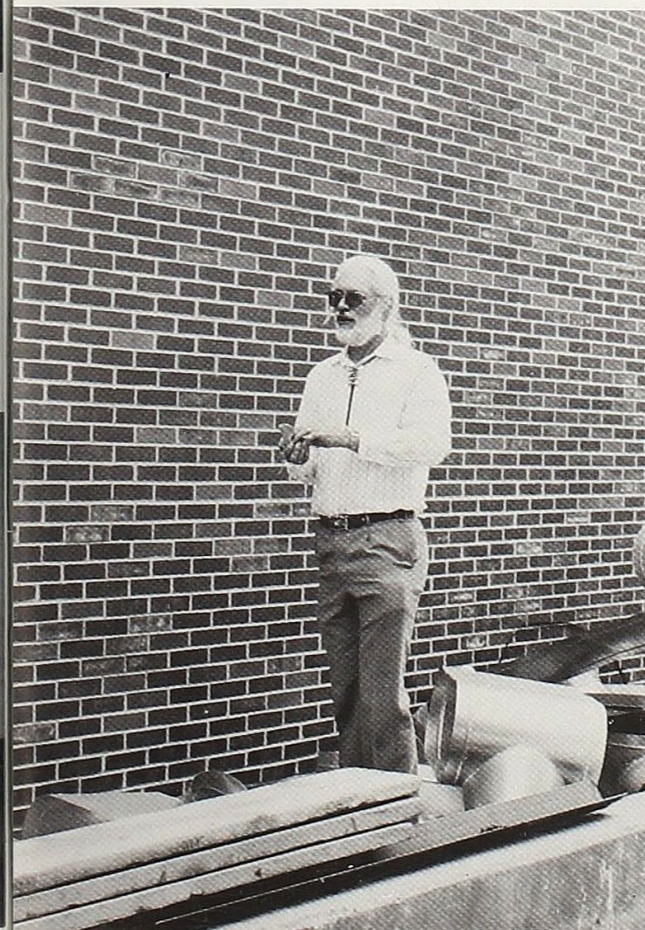

On September 6, 1990, the Ronald O. Kapp Science Laboratory Center was dedicated. Now Alma College's chemistry and biochemistry programs have one of the most modern laboratory buildings in the country. Facilities in the building are ten classroom laboratories, six smaller labs for faculty/student research and four specialized labs, including one for the quarter-million dollar Nuclear Magnetic Resonance Spectrometer (N.M.R.). Among the innovative features of the Kapp Science Center are a walk-in cold room and chilled laboratory enabling experimentation under controlled conditions, special equipment and instrument rooms providing decentralization for special projects and study, and a Macintosh computer laboratory.

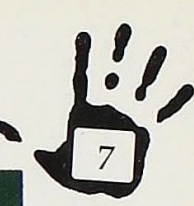

# Alma College



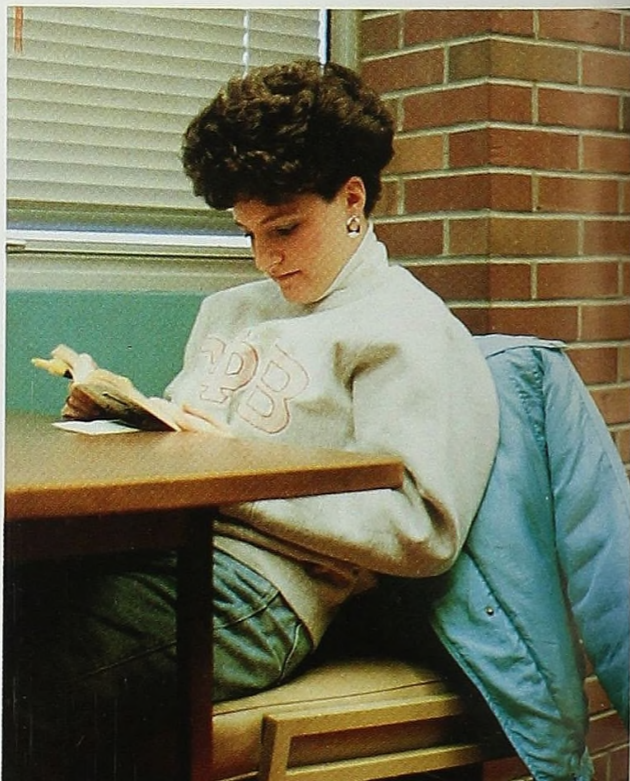

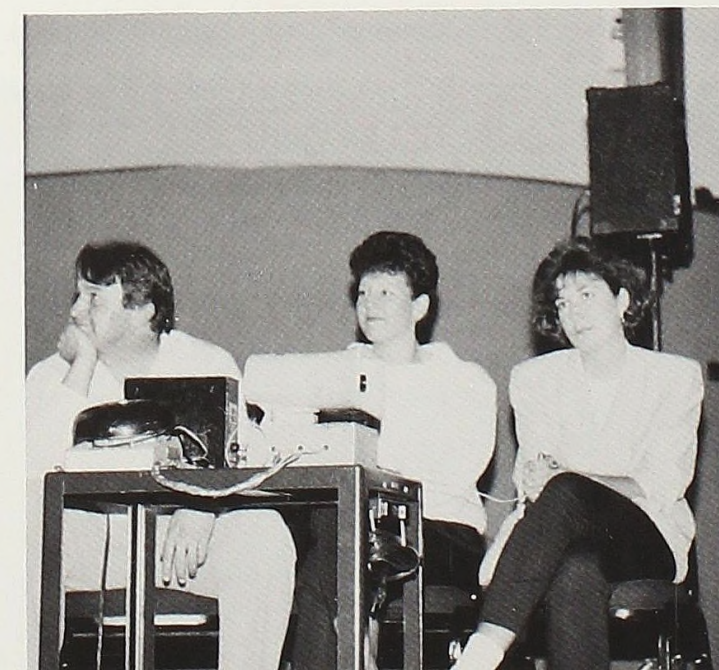

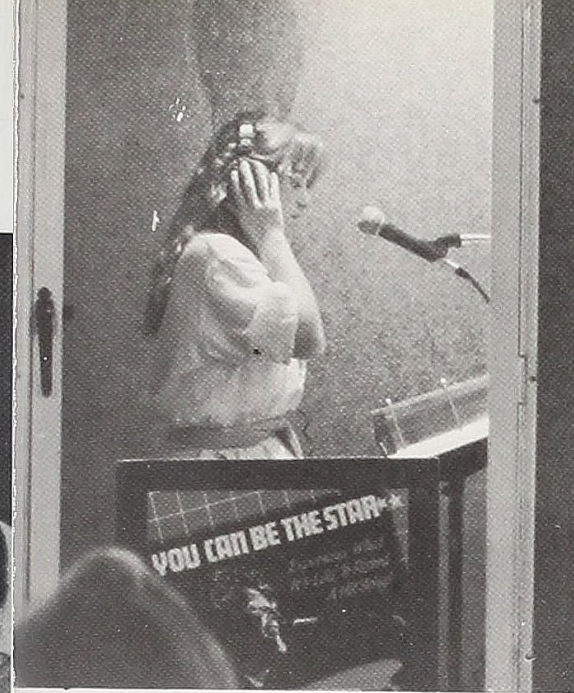
## ACUB All-Nighter

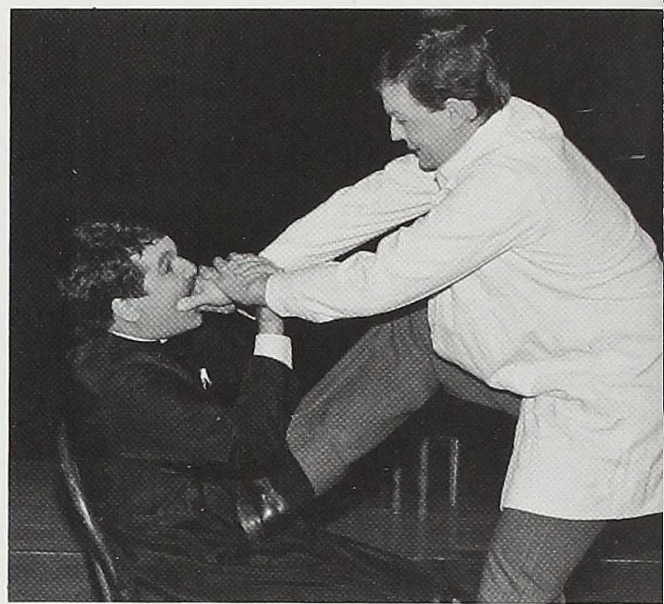

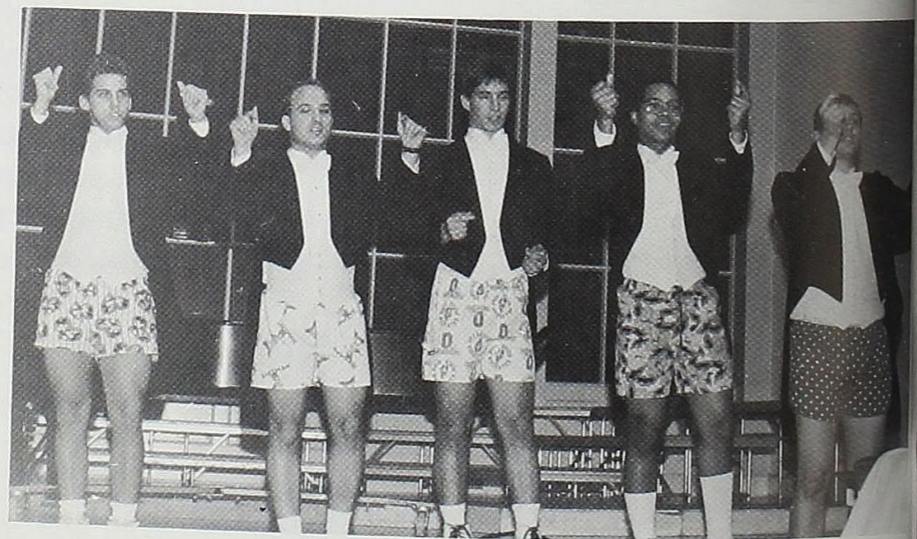

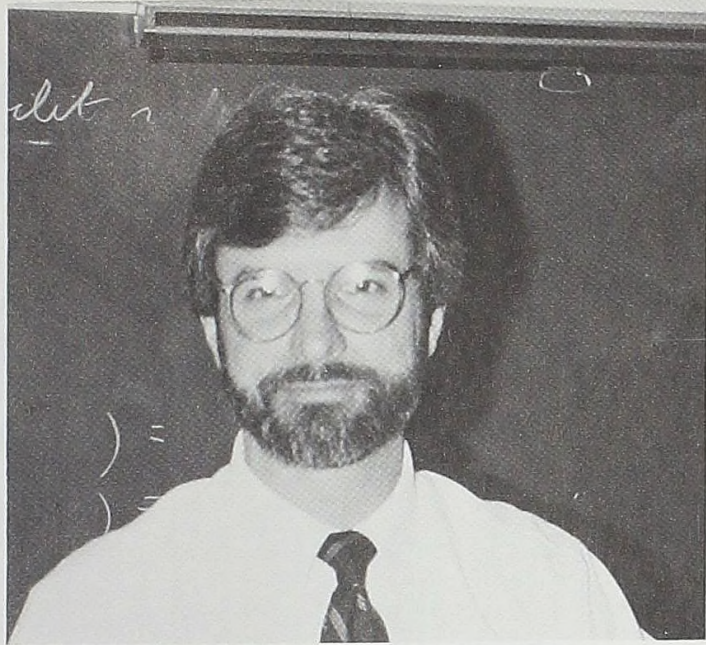

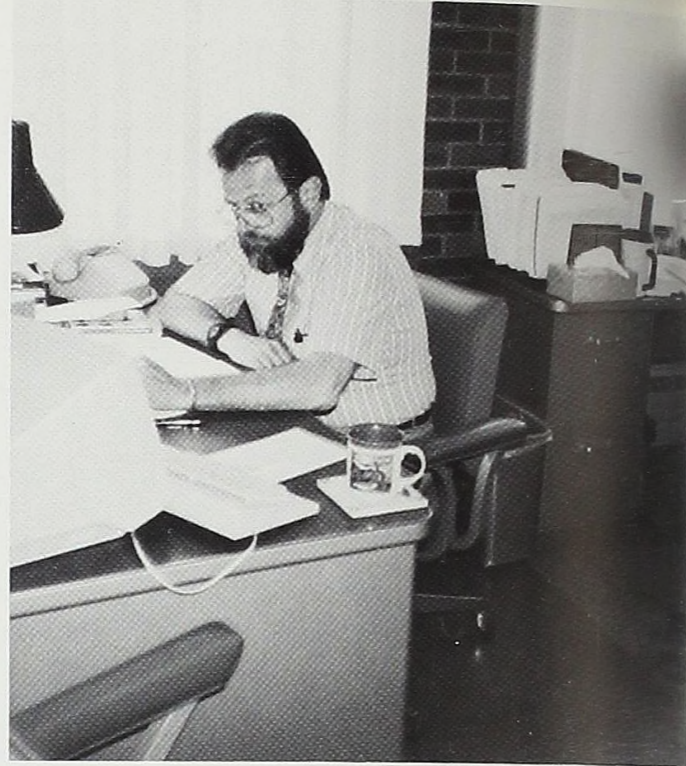

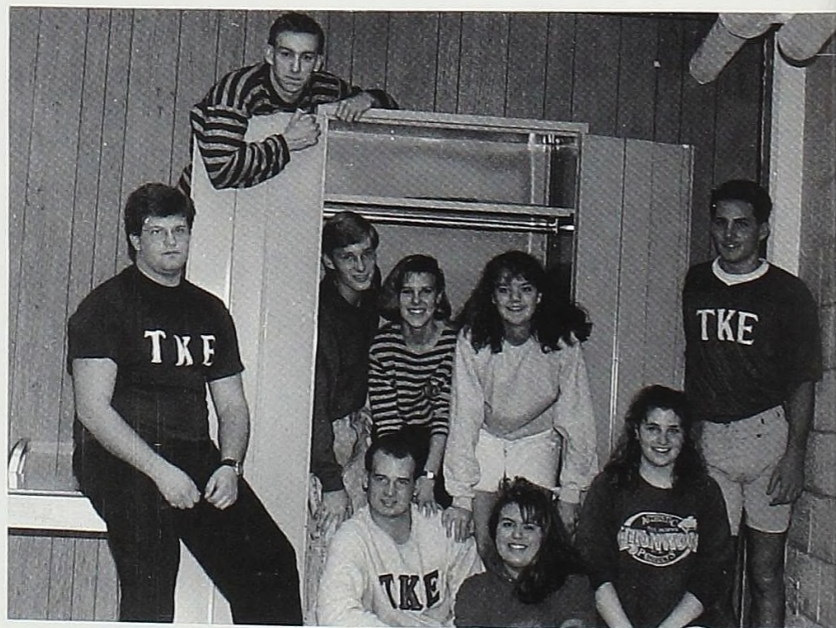

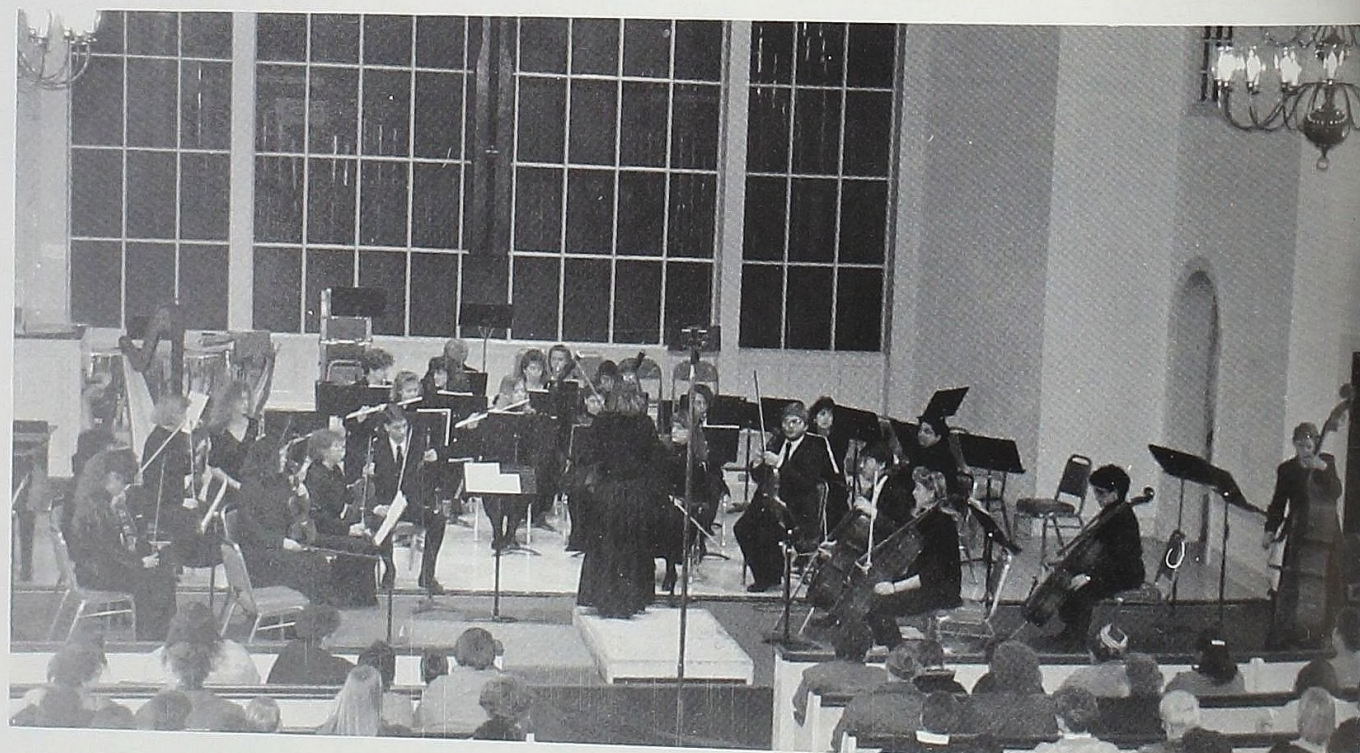

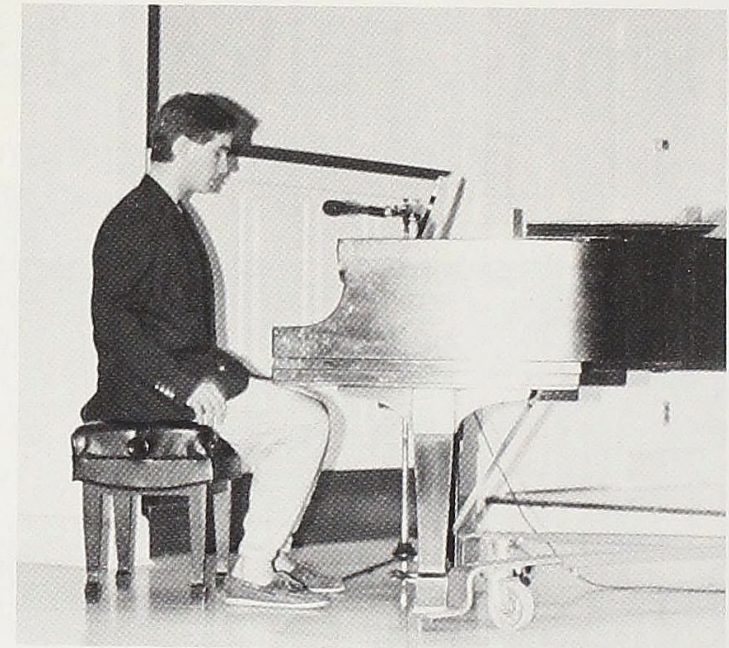

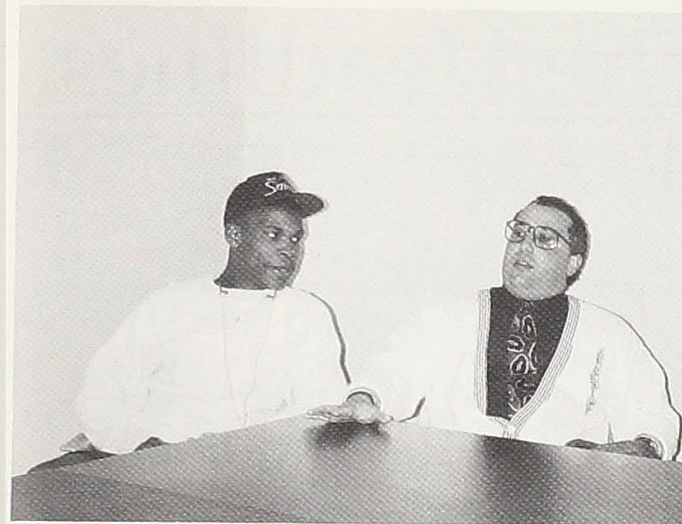

## Excerpt from The Detroit News:

Alma- The light of dawn on Superior Street told the tale Thursday morning. White ribbons remaining: Two. Yellow ribbons: 37. The pro-yellow forces had struck again overnight. The ribbons — yellow supporting U.S. troops in the Middle East and white against war — are going up and getting ripped down in what is an unusual display of political passion at Alma College. "This campus is at a civil war...." a student writes in this week's issue of the college newspaper. "I cannot believe that we are so divided on such a ridiculous issue." Whatever you call it, there's certainly more fuss than the usual inside what people here call "The Alma Bubble" — the shield of political apathy that normally protects the sedate private school of 1,200 students in Alma, South of Mount Pleasant.

Bruske N7 is the meeting place for the energetic members of Students for Peace and Non-Violence (SPAN). This year SPAN's membership more than tripled. This greater participation seems to have led to an increased enthusiasm in the groups ability to "break the Alma bubble."

The basic goal of SPAN is to act as moderator between information about peace and non-violence and the Alma College community. Underlying this goal is the belief that exposure to different, varying and opposing views leads to re-evaluation of one's own thoughts and opinions—thus creating a growth of perspective. It is this growth that produces the atmosphere of peace and understanding which SPAN holds in the highest esteem.

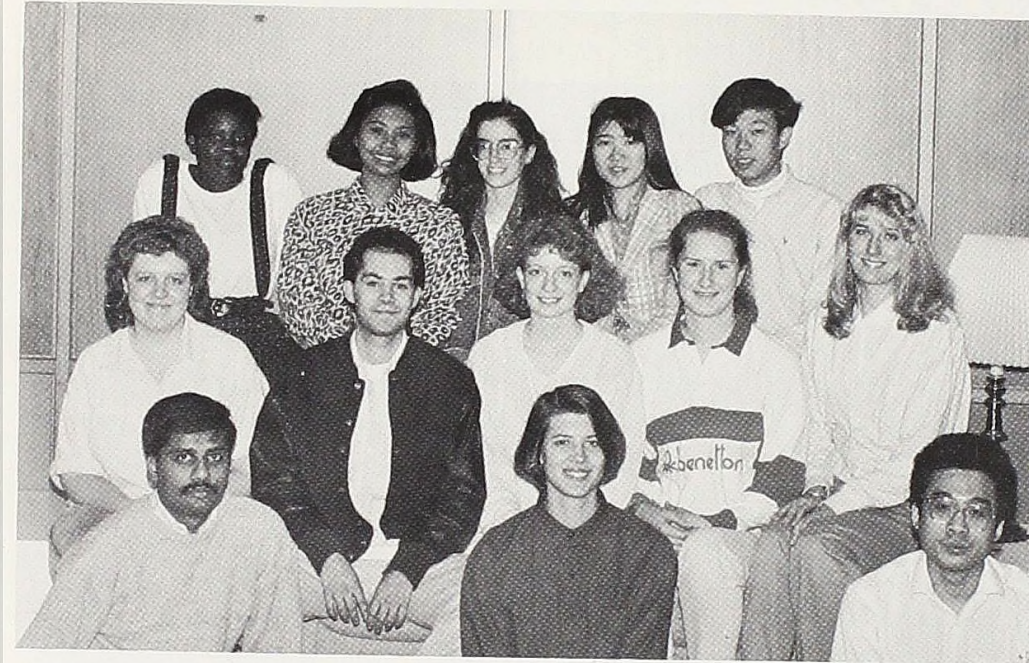
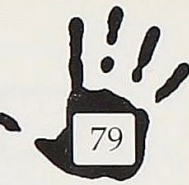

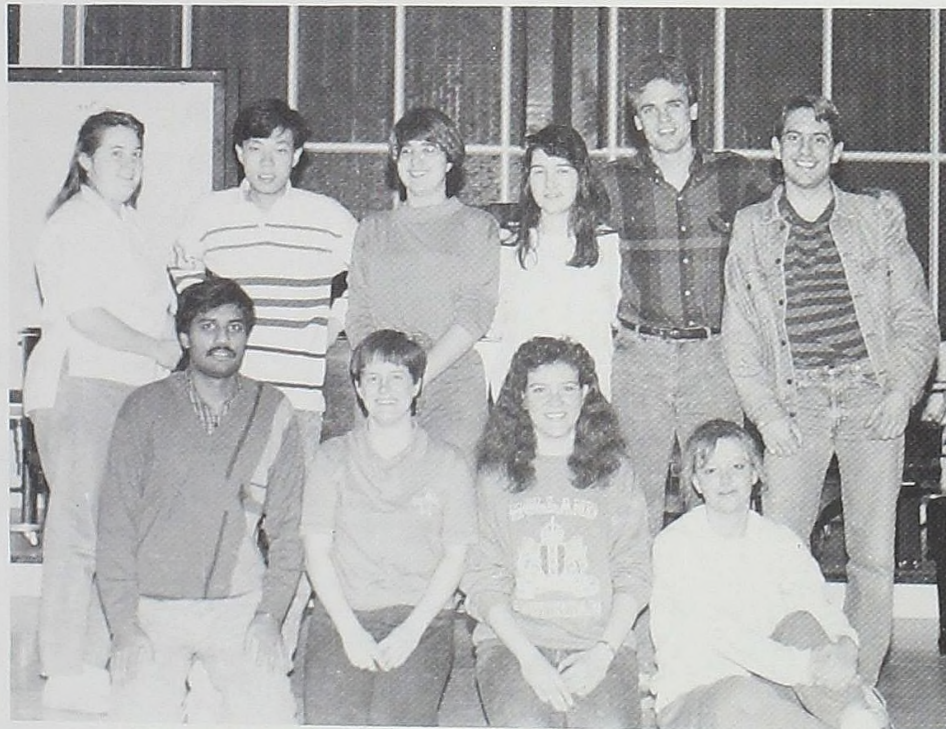
## The Chapel Committee

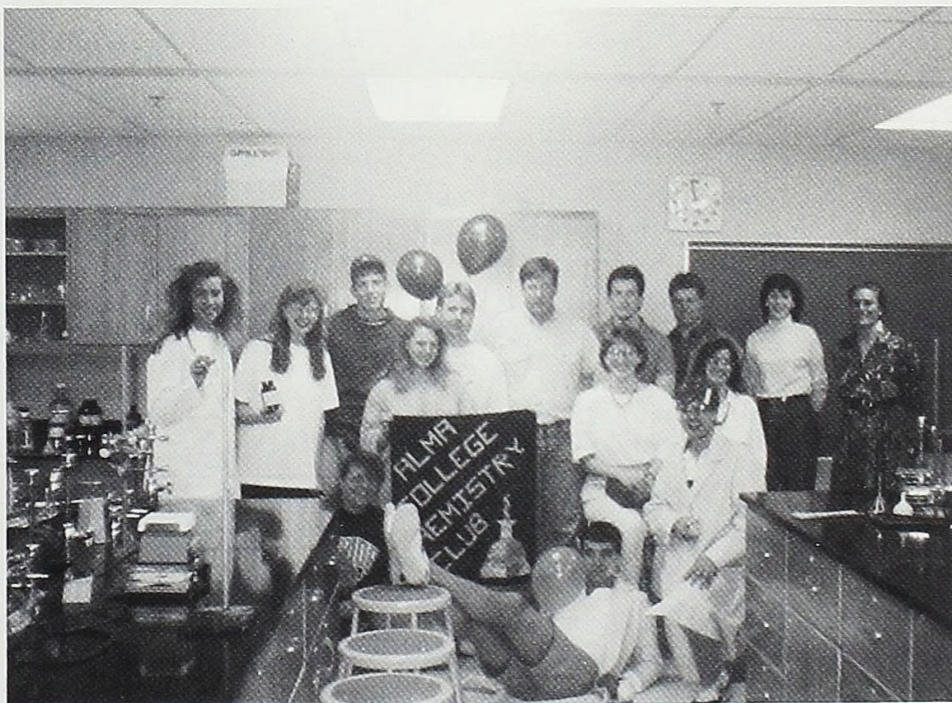

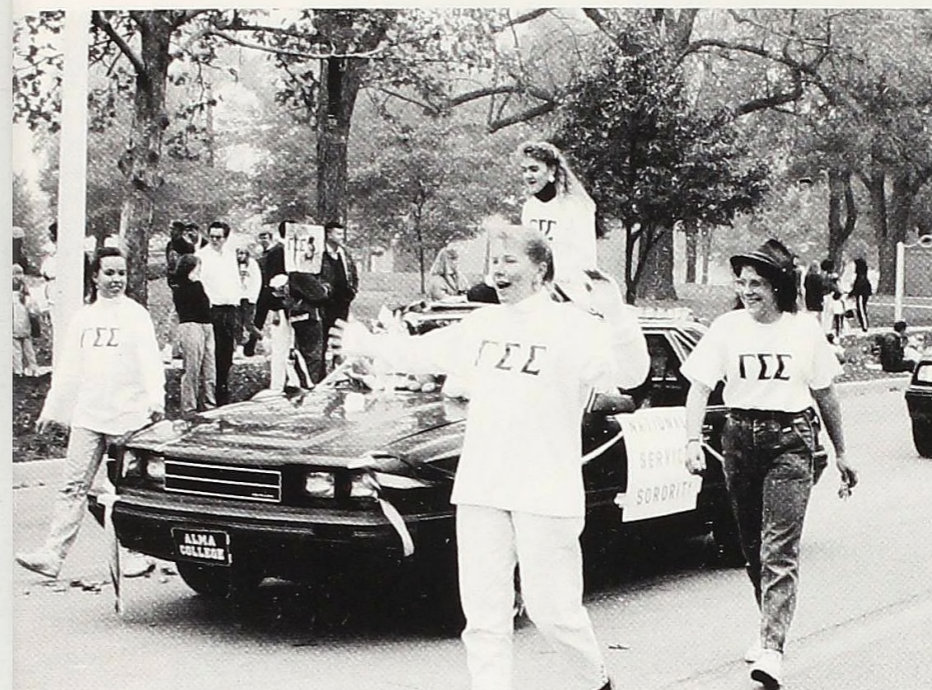

The team was coached by Phil Brooks. The assistant coach was Mike Cavanaugh.

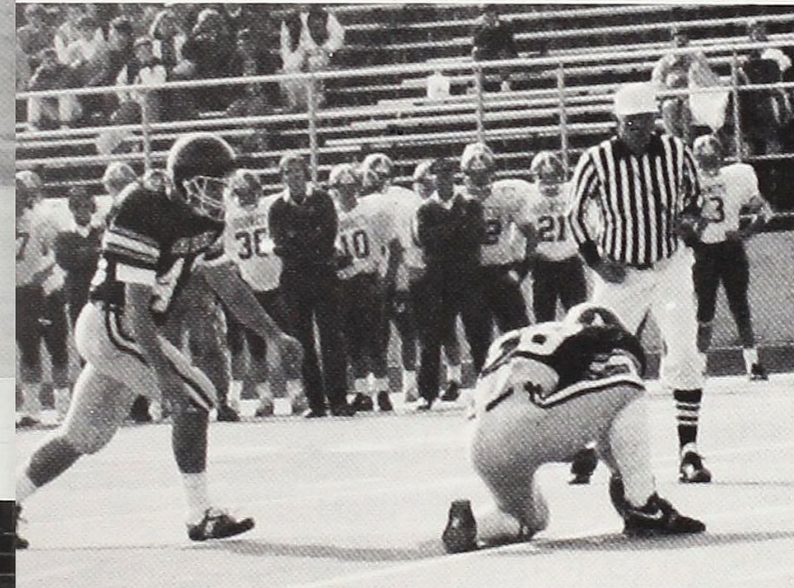

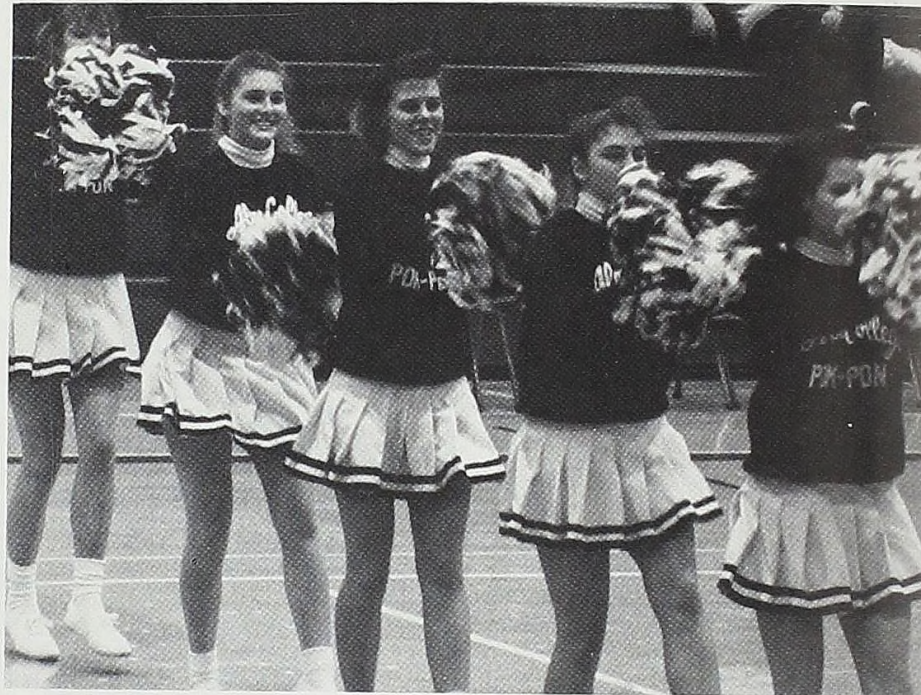

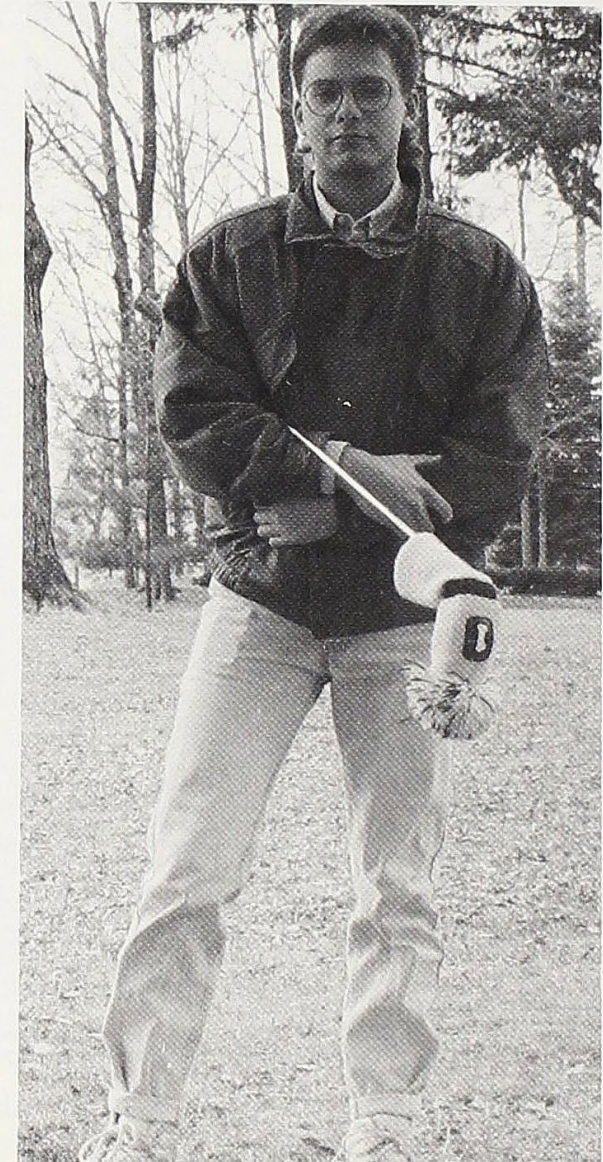
## "Just A Swingin'"

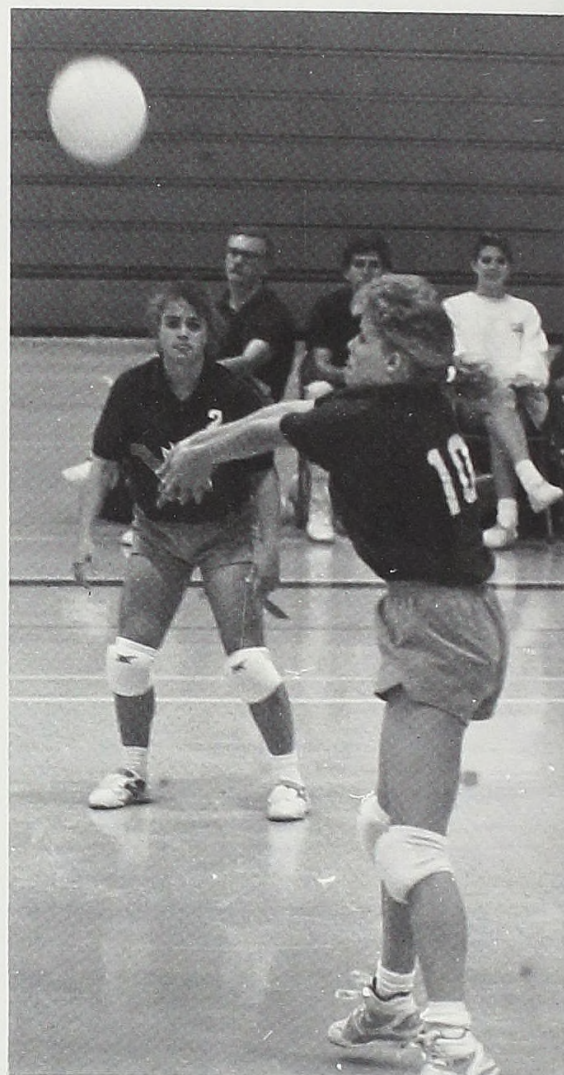
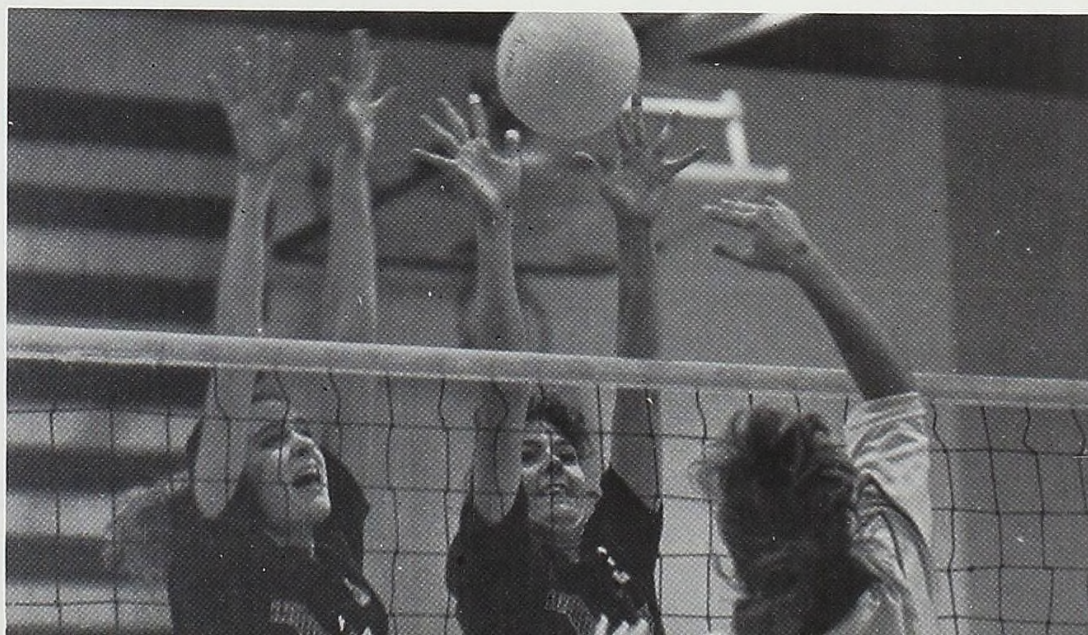
losing two seniors. However, these seniors, Laura Holmes and Shannon Nichols, are two key players and will leave big shoes to fill.

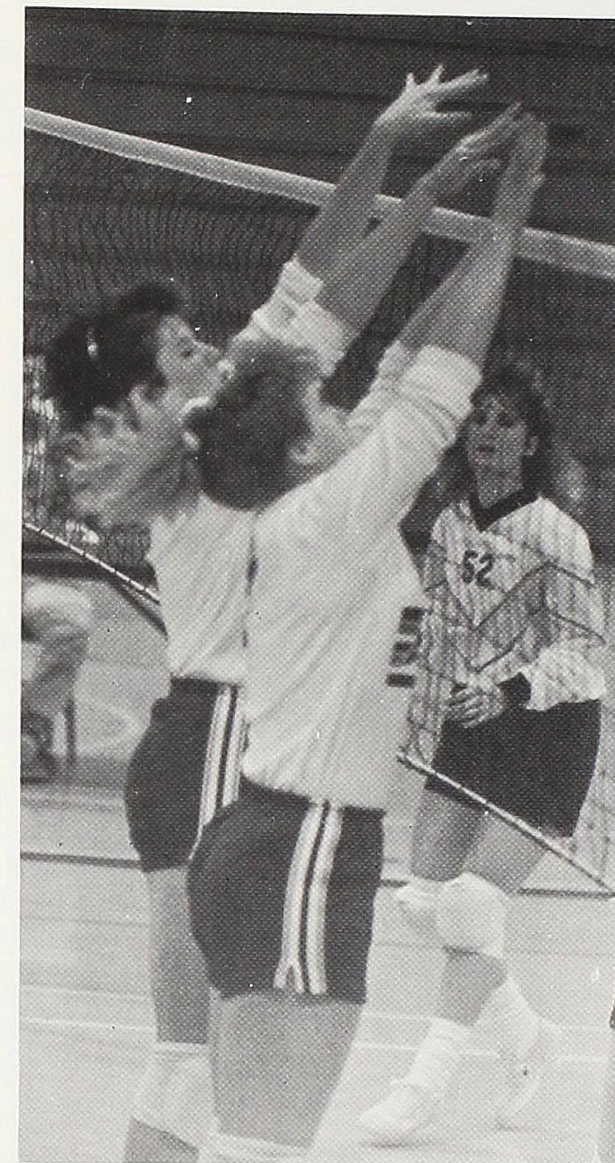

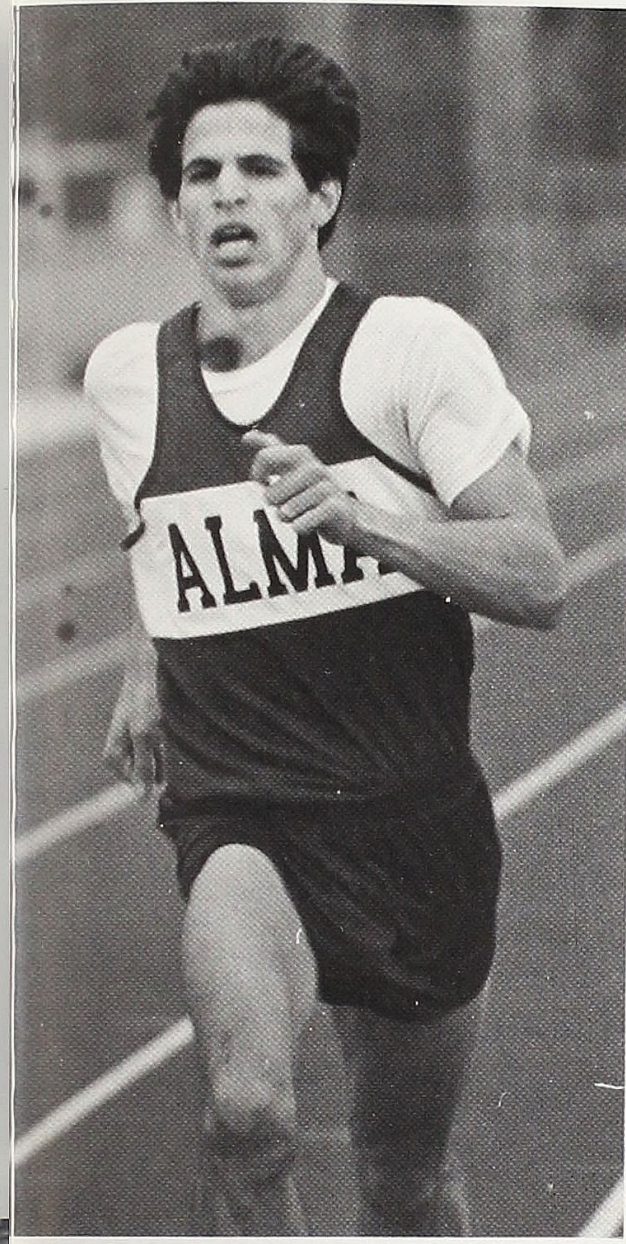

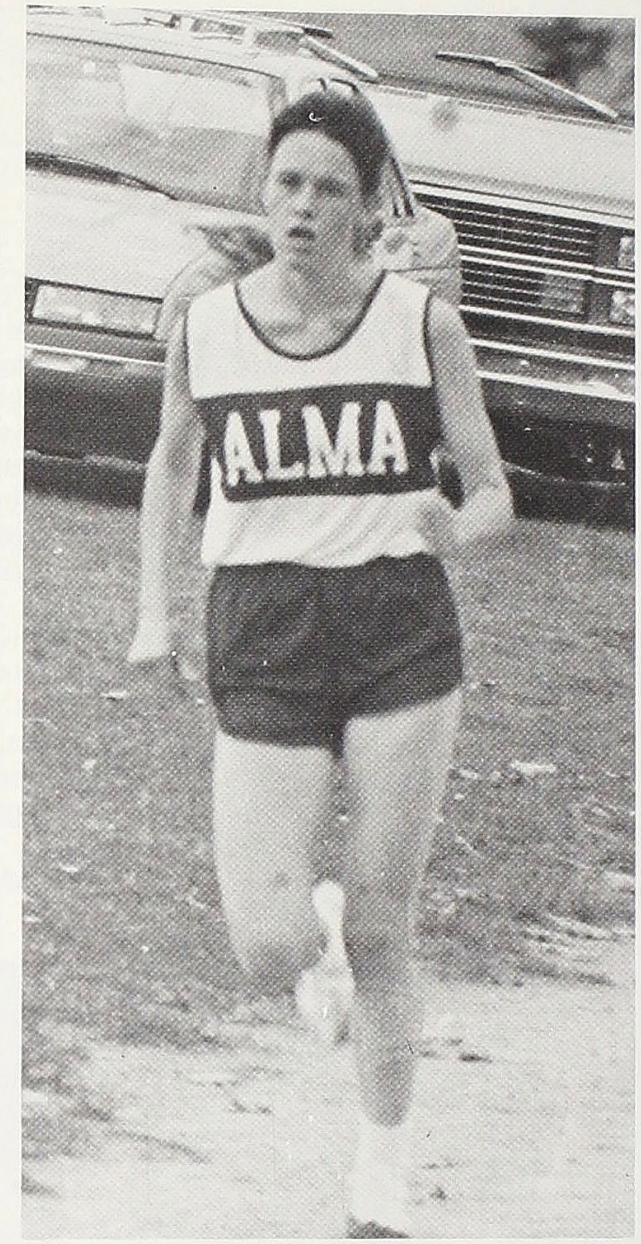

After enjoying the 84 degree temperatures of sunny St. Petersburg, Florida, the 1991 Alma Men's and Women's Swim Teams stepped into the chilly waters of home to start off the season. The 1991 season proved to be full of firsts. Sixty-four new times were entered on the top 10 fastest times board and fourteen team records were broken. First year coach Greg Baadte was pleased with his teams' performances. "They put it all together and that was the key to the season. They are very hard working teams."

The Men's team finished fifth in conference standings with a 2-6 overall record. The 1991 Alma Women's and Men's Swim Teams set high goals for themselves and through hard work and dedication to a long season, they accomplished many.

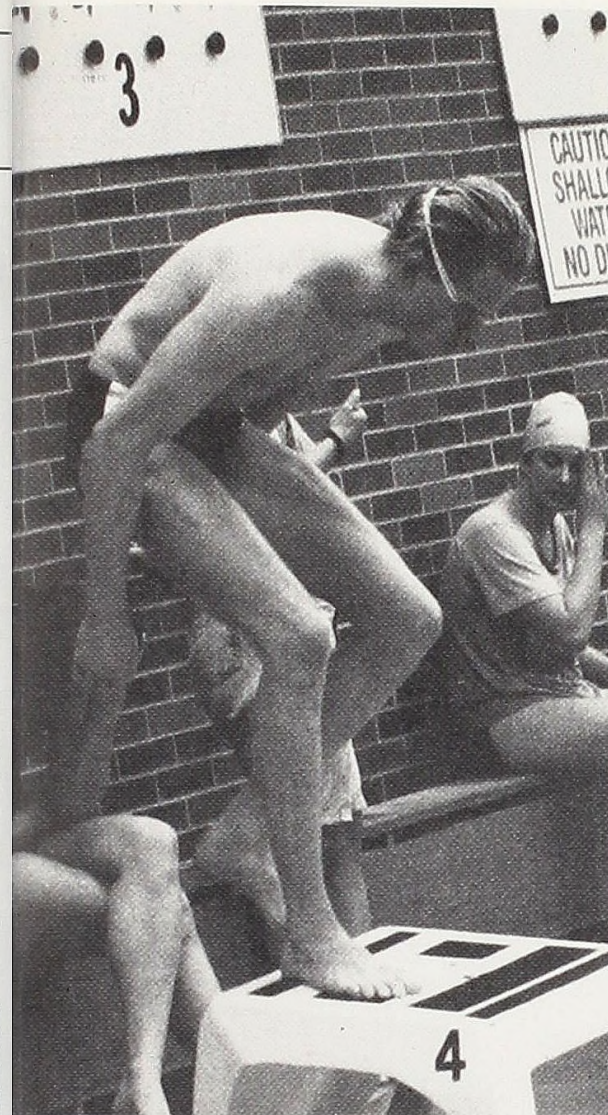

The Head Coach was Jim Cole. Assisting him was Charles Gray, Dan Gibson, Carlos Toro, and student coach Chris Reinsma.



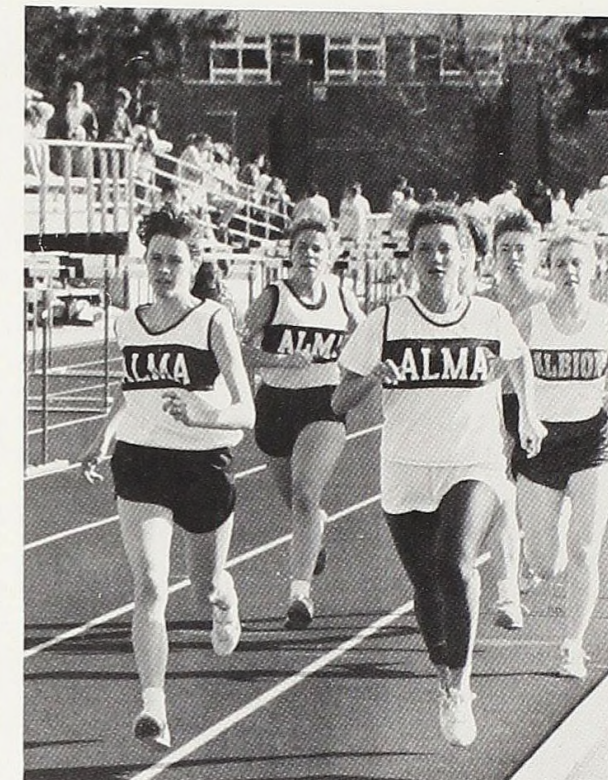

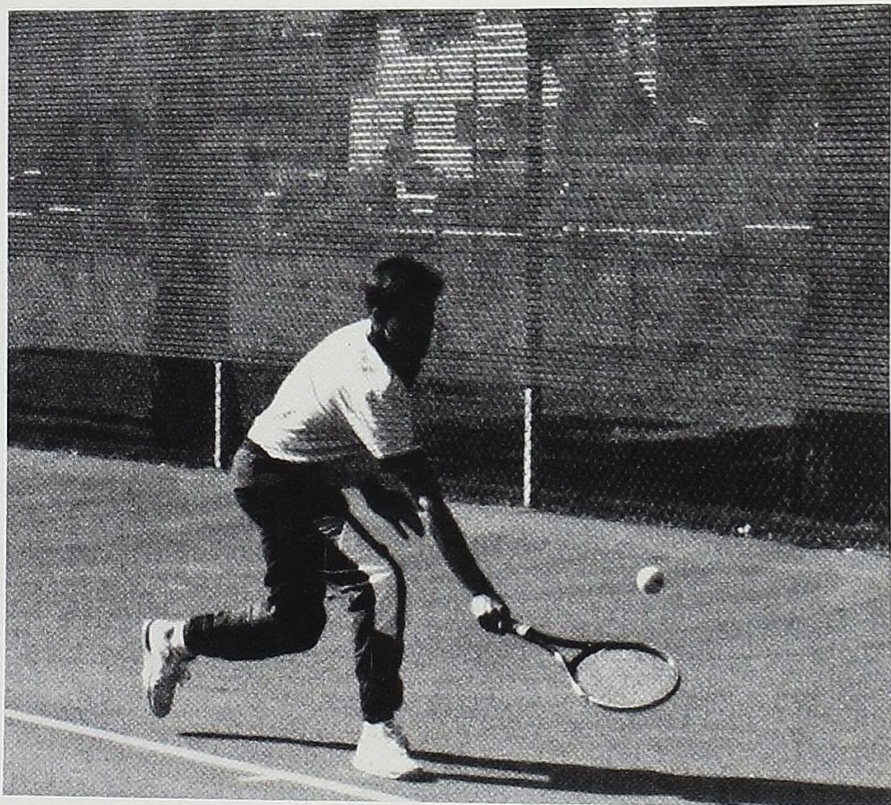
## At Your Service

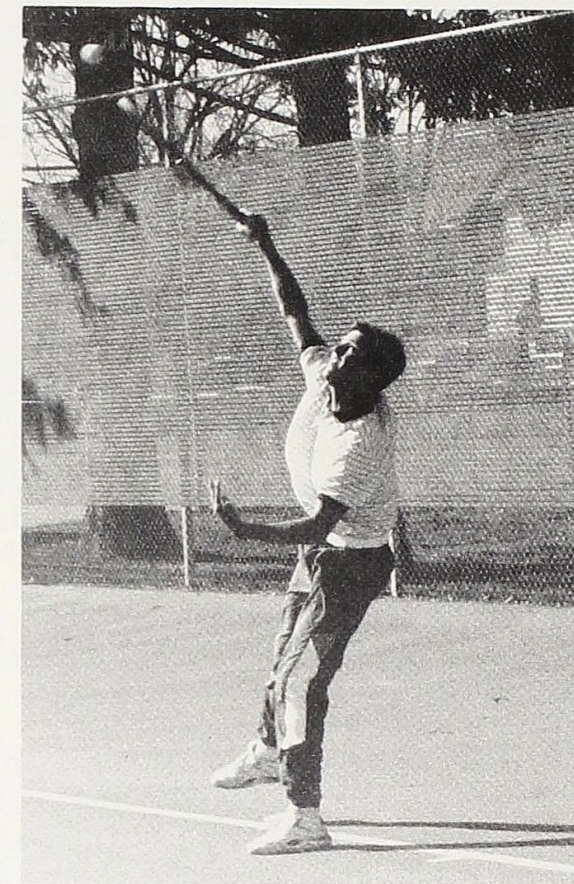

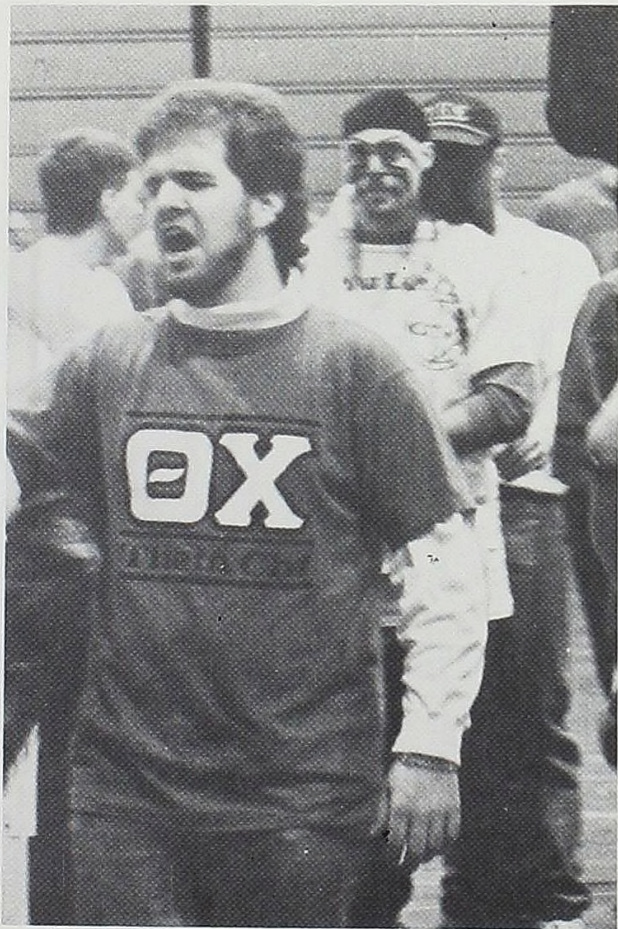


# Run-outs

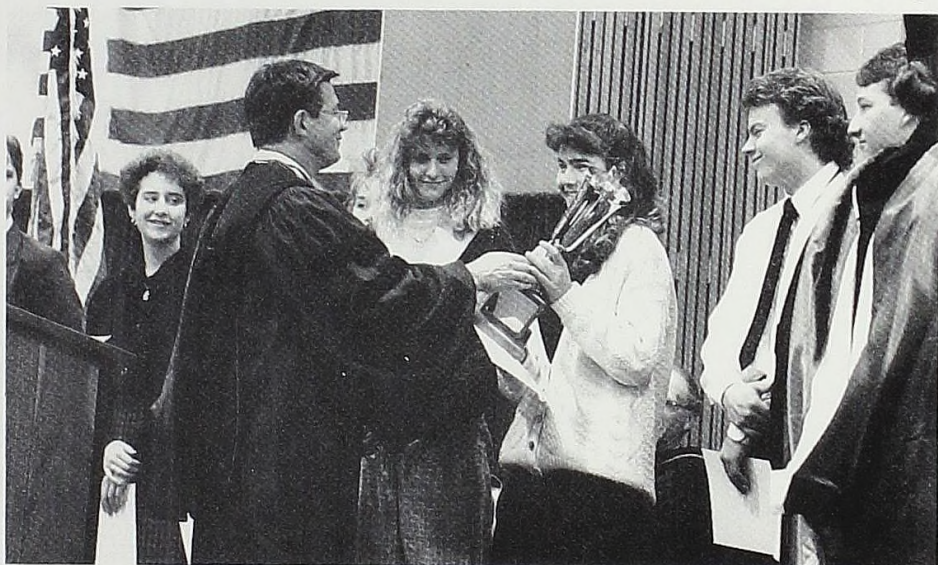
# Honoring Those

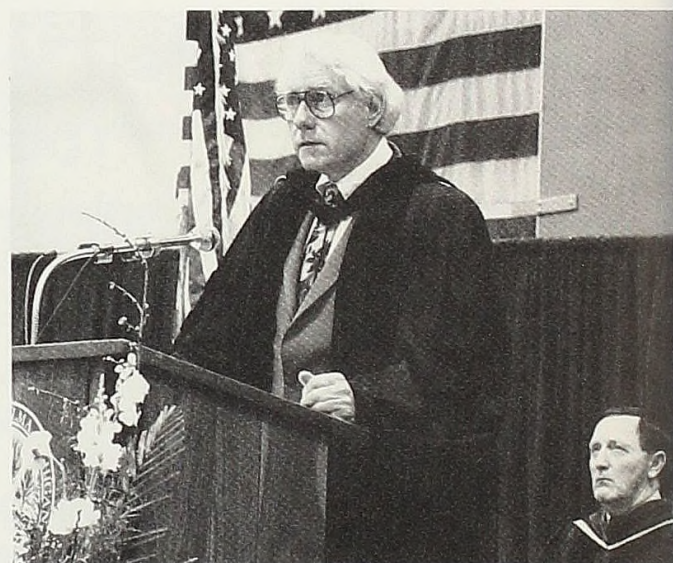


# Dedication To The Dedicated.



Dr. Wegner, professor of English, joined the faculty in 1957. He received his B.A. from Michigan State University and his M.A. and Ph.D. from Case Western Reserve University. He has taught rhetoric, American literature, prose and topics in literature. Among his publishing credits are a critical biography of e.e. cummings and various short stories and poems. He was also co-editor of *The Third Coast: Contemporary Michigan Fiction*.

Dr. Sutfin, professor of English, considers literature first and foremost a private pleasure; therefore, his teaching has focused on helping students get more out of their personal reading. He came to Alma College in 1970. He has taught British literature, poetry, advanced rhetoric, advanced English language and grammar, and topics in literature. He was also instrumental in forming the mime troupes that had been at Alma. He received his B.A. and M.A. from Southern Illinois University and his Ph.D. from Vanderbilt University.



Dr Splitstone, professor of physics, received his B.A. from Western Michigan University and his Ph. D. from Ohio State University. He joined the faculty in 1963 and for twenty-eight years has taught courses in introductory astronomy, general physics and mechanics. He has applied his scientific and technological knowledge as a participant in archaeological fieldwork in Israel. Well-respected by both colleagues and students, he has encouraged mental training aimed at the central point of an issue, using common sense and knowledge of the subject.





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
