
Alma's athletic teams worked hard this year, developing strong skills as well as positive attitudes of teamwork and sportsmanship.

The senior class is gone but not forgotten. They will always remain a part of Alma College through the memories they left with us.






People. People important to you. People unimportant to you cross your life, touch it with love and carelessness and move on.


3. Finally, there's "environmentally friendly" paper which is made with as little damage as possible to the environment.


Alma Celebrates the GREEN at Irish Pub






VESPINE






















