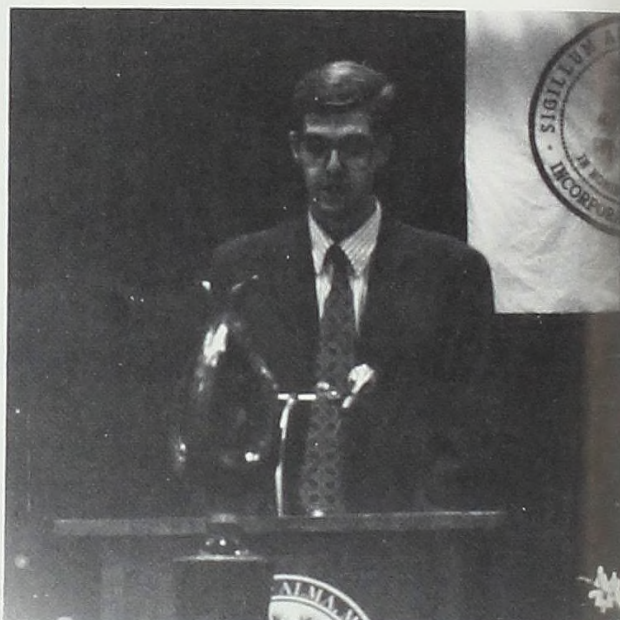

DEDICATION TO THE MEMORIES



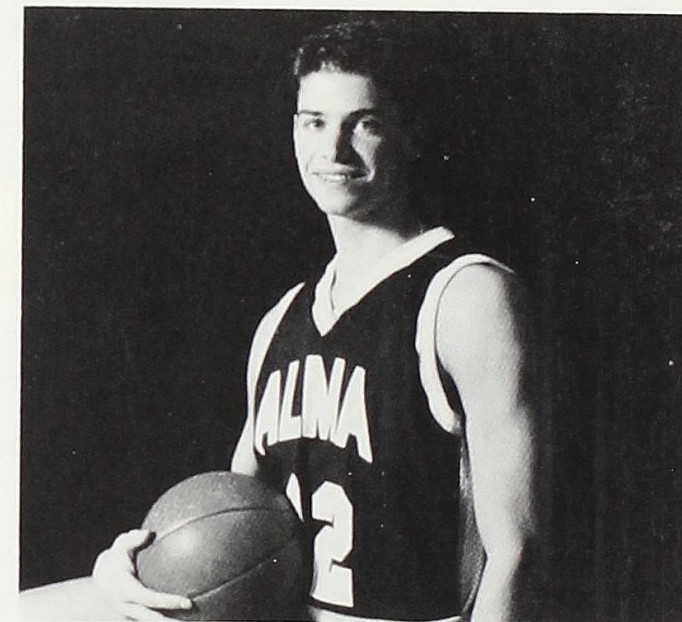
People. People important to you. People unimportant to you cross your life, touch it with love and carelessness and move on.

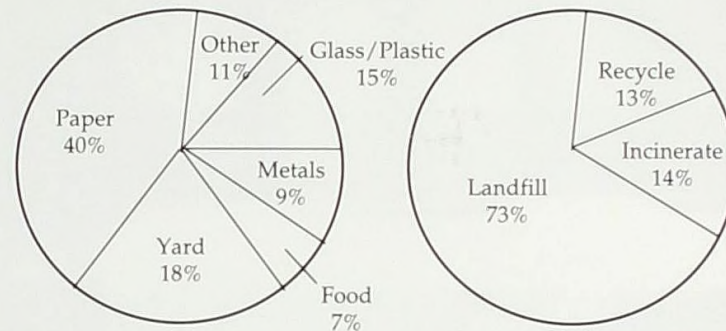
3. Finally, there's "environmentally friendly" paper which is made with as little damage as possible to the environment.

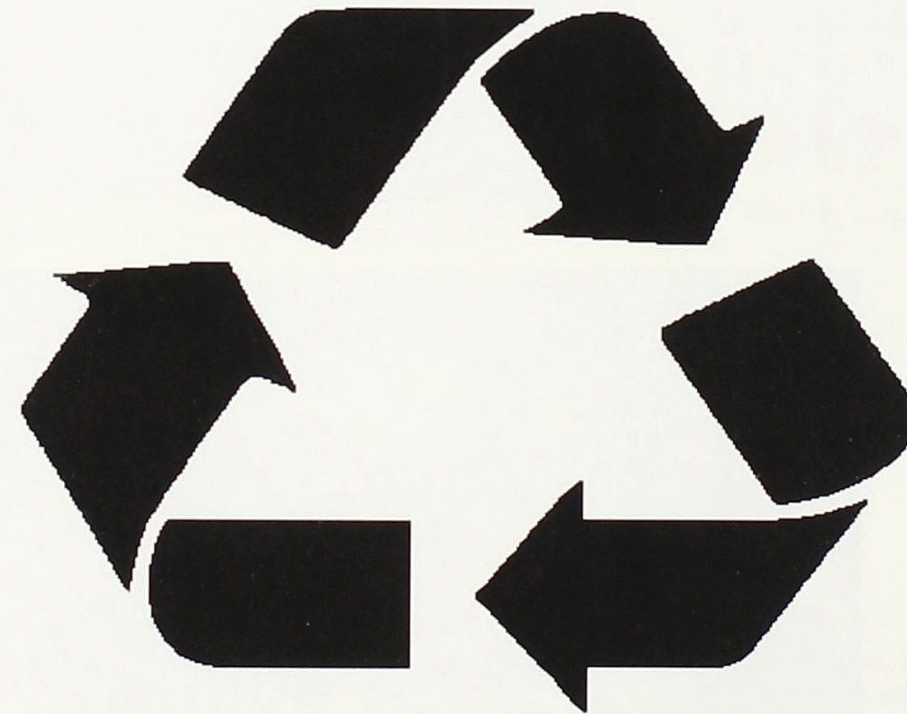


What Kinds of Waste? What Happens to Waste?

ENVIRONMENTAL FACTS AND FIGURES

- Americans throw away enough aluminum every three months to rebuild our entire commercial air fleet.
- 120 supertankers can be filled each year with wasted motor oil.
- Experts say that at current consumption rates, the world's known oil reserves will be used up in 35 years.
- A steel mill using recycled scrap reduces related water pollution, and air pollution and mining wastes by 70 percent.
- A quart of motor oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water.
- Americans recycle about 80 percent of our car batteries.
- Each year, we send about 5.6 billion tons of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere, only half of which is absorbed by the forests and oceans.

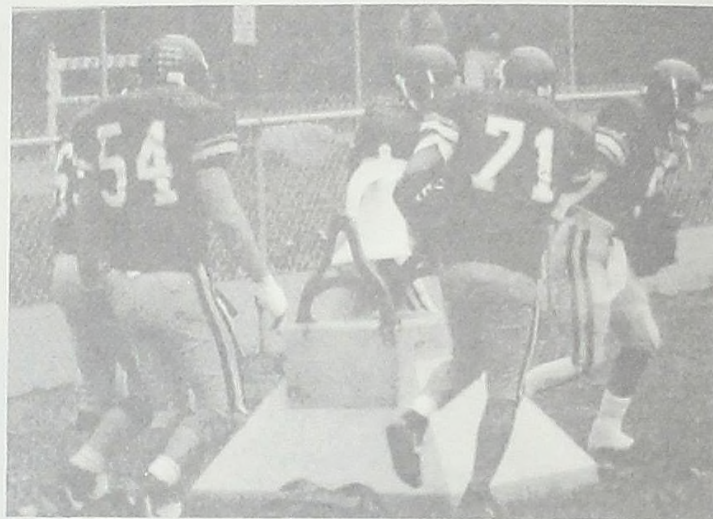

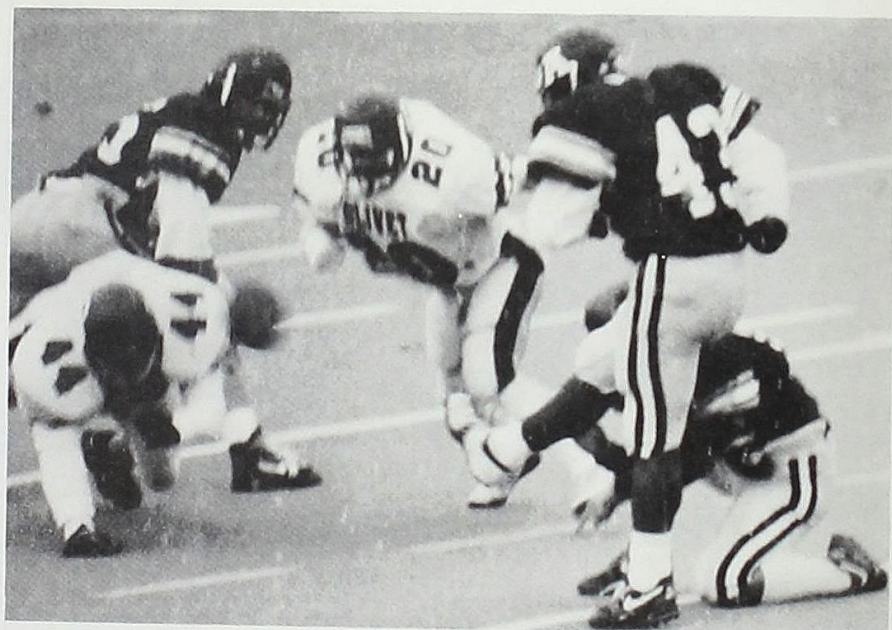
HOMECOMING

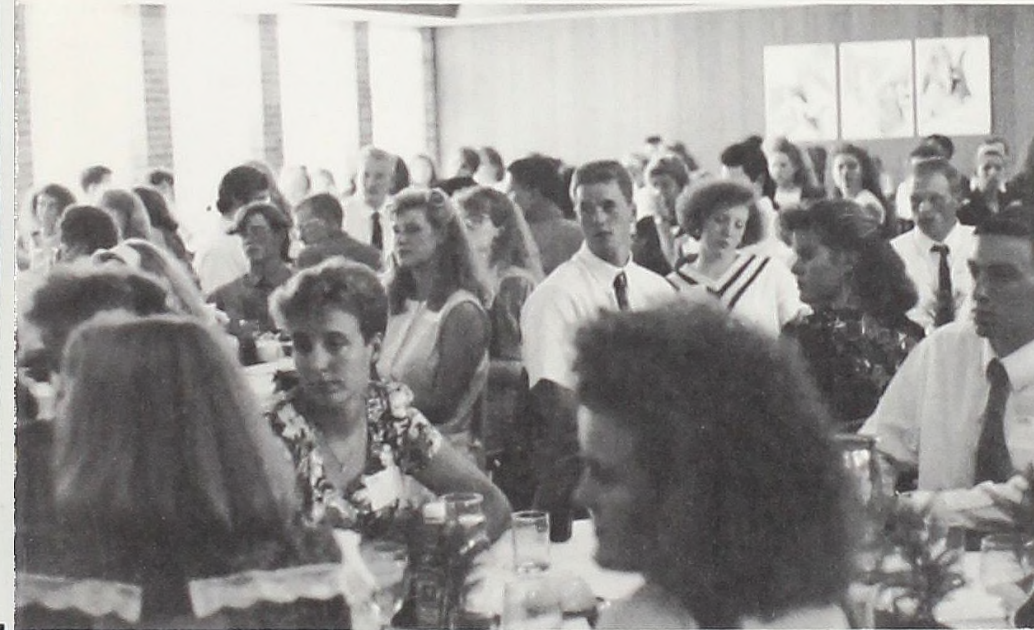

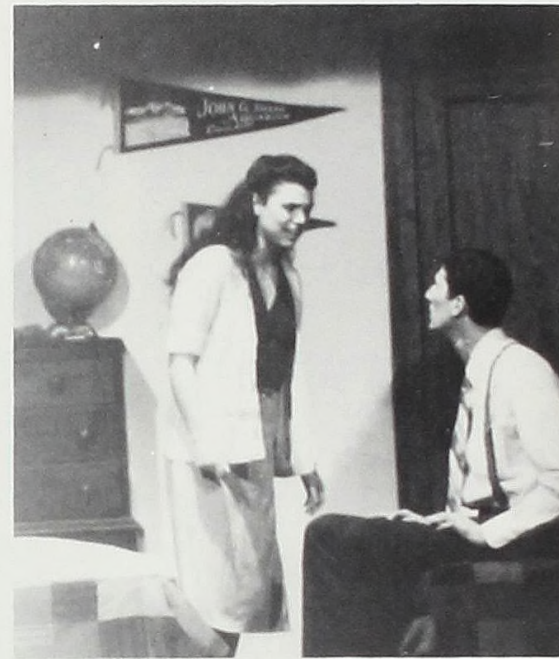

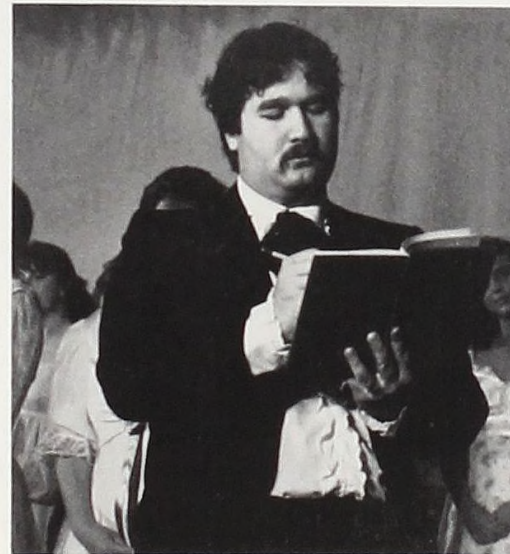

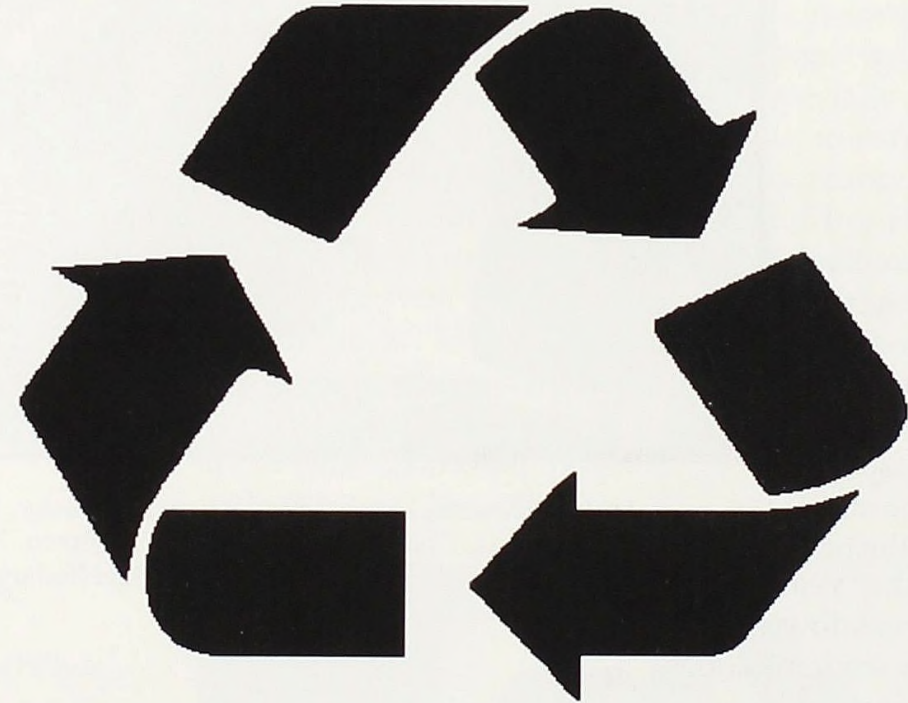

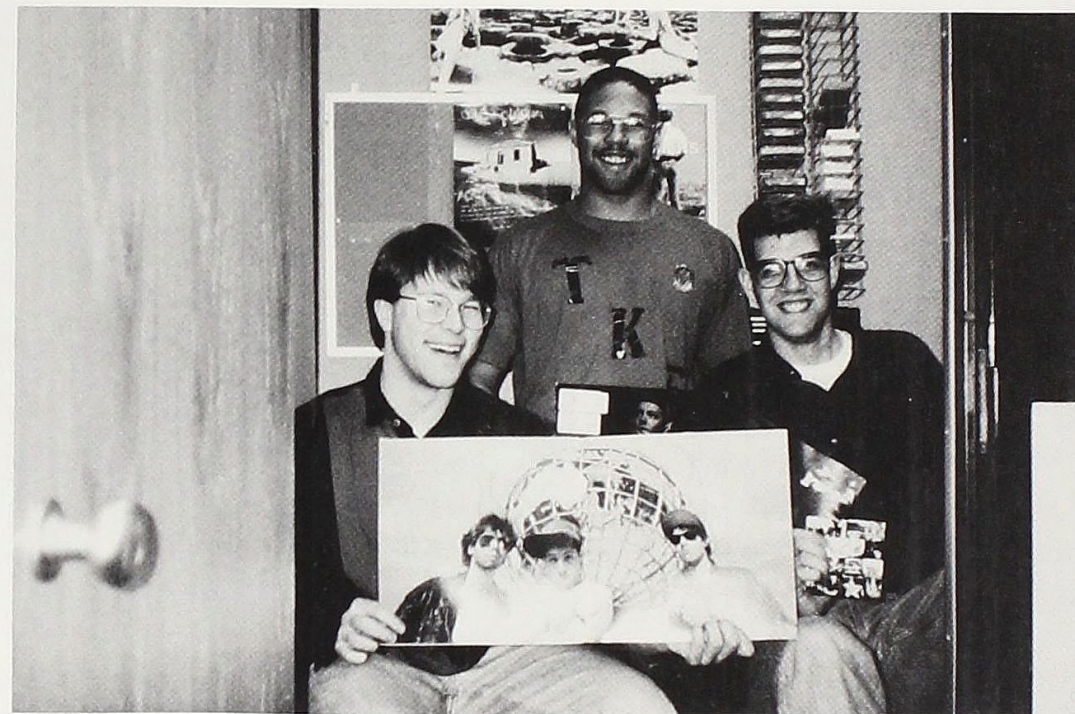
PINE RIVER ANTHOLOGY

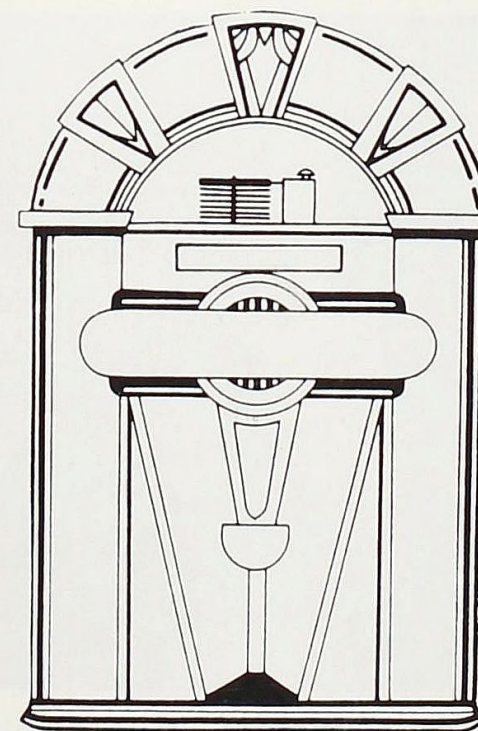
ALMA'S ON THE AIR!

First-year Class Officers

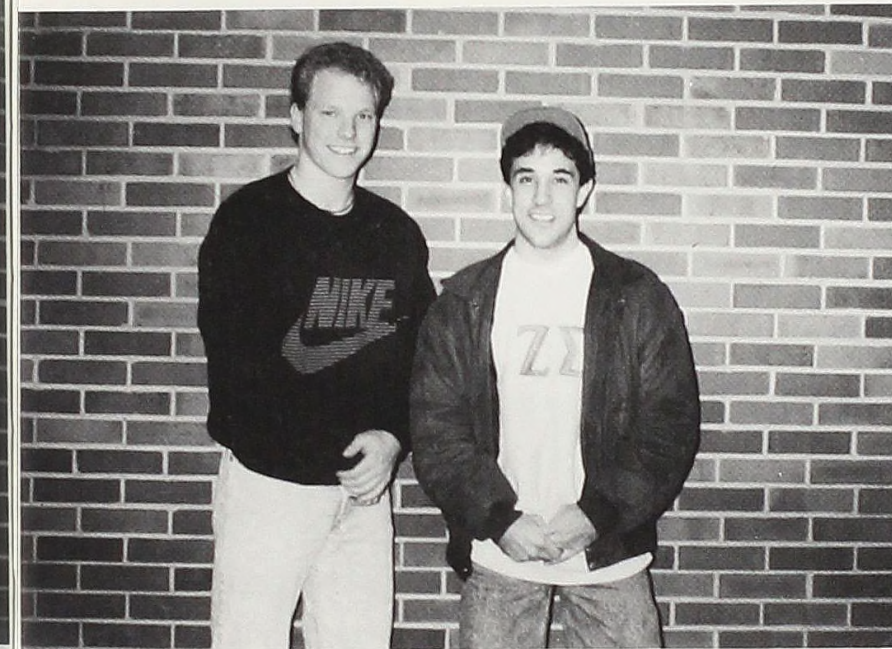

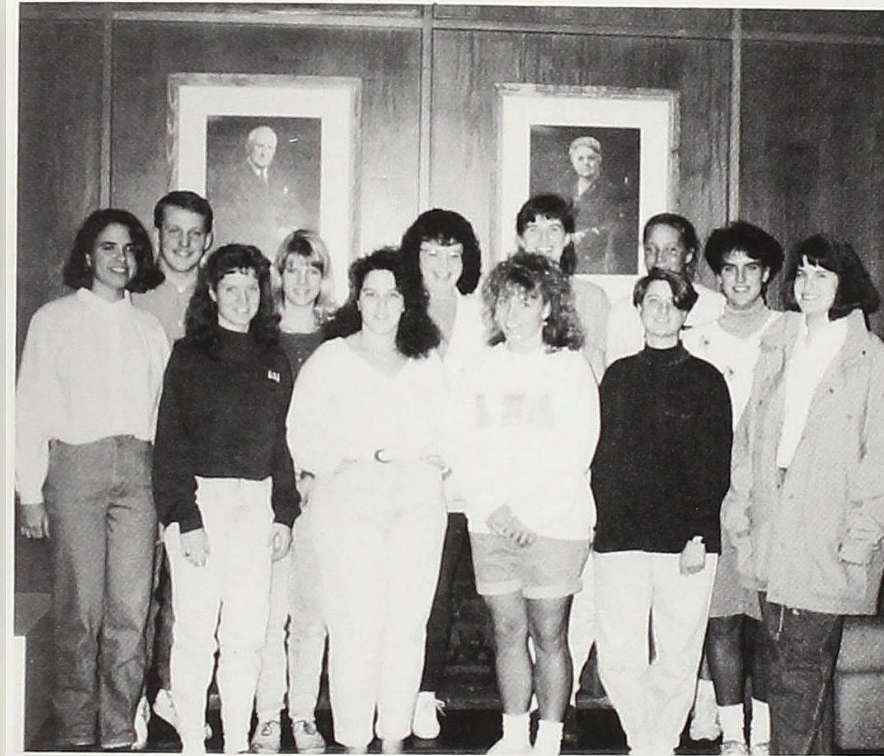

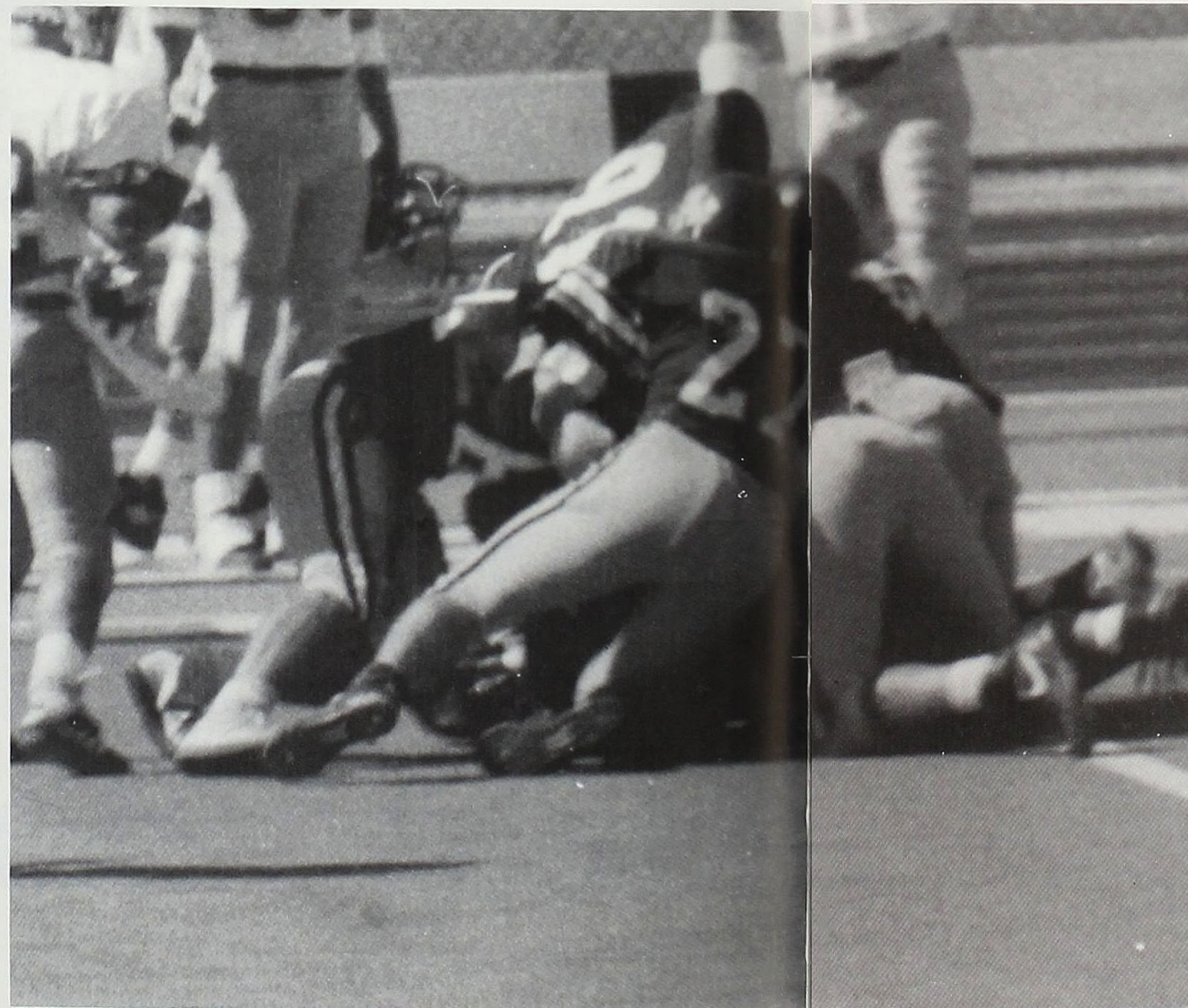

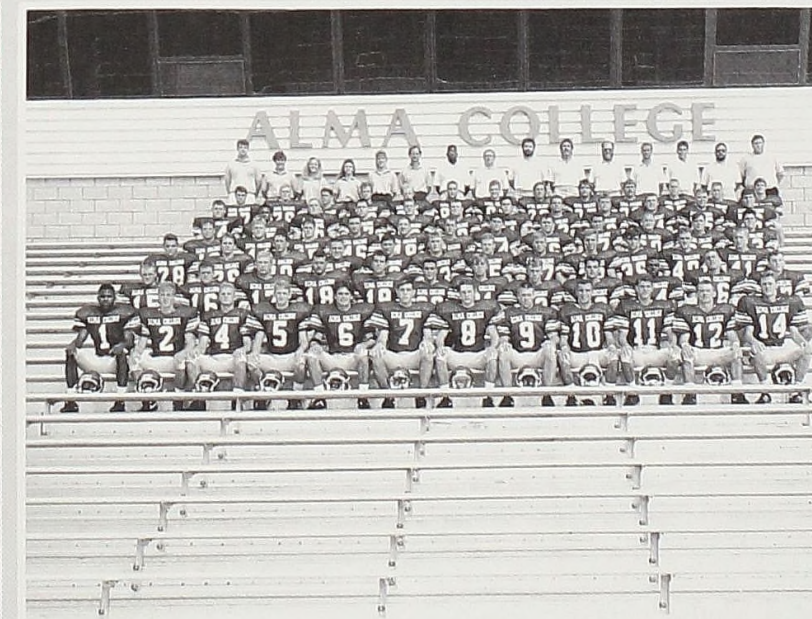

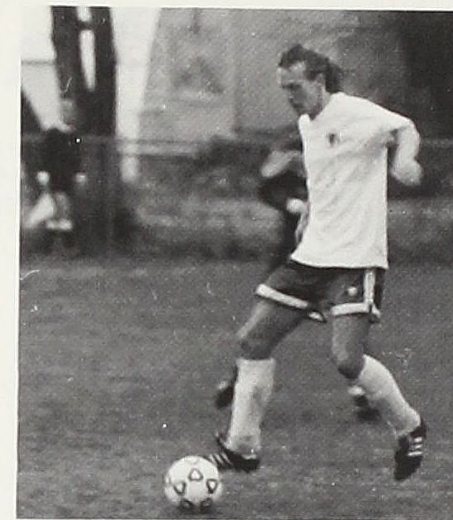

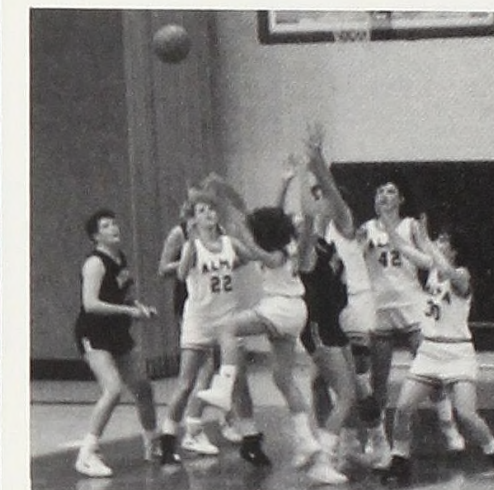

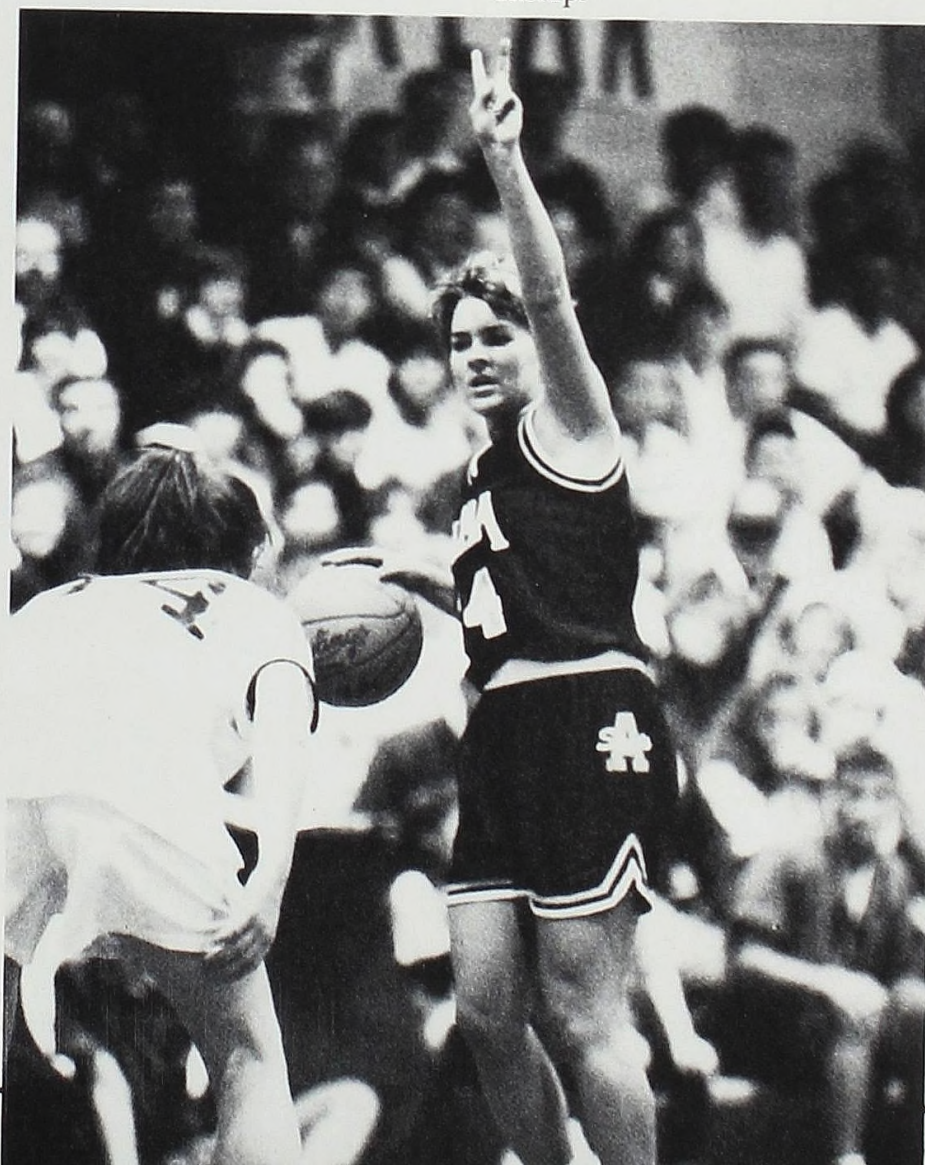

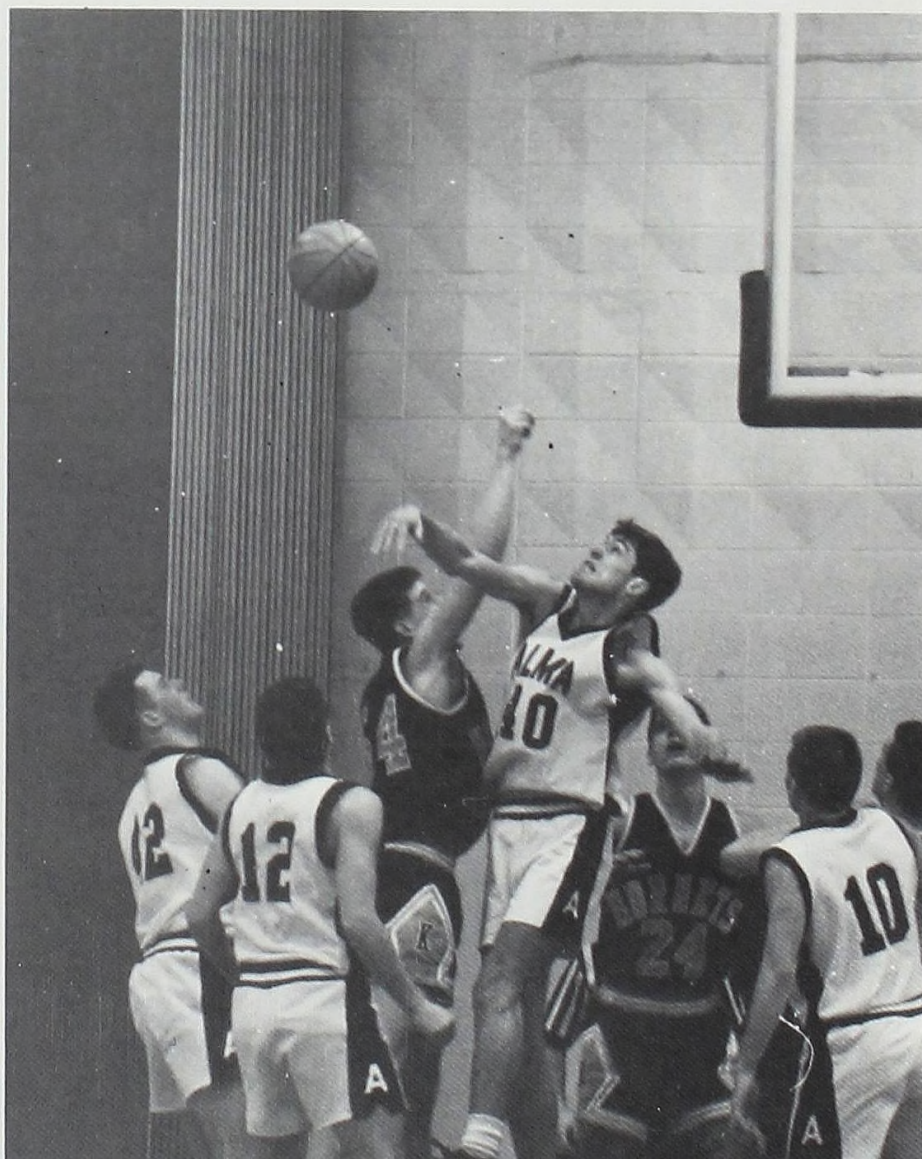

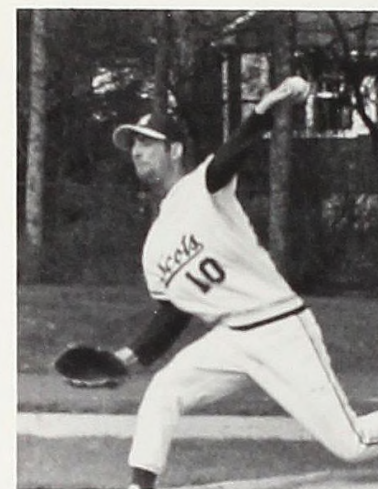

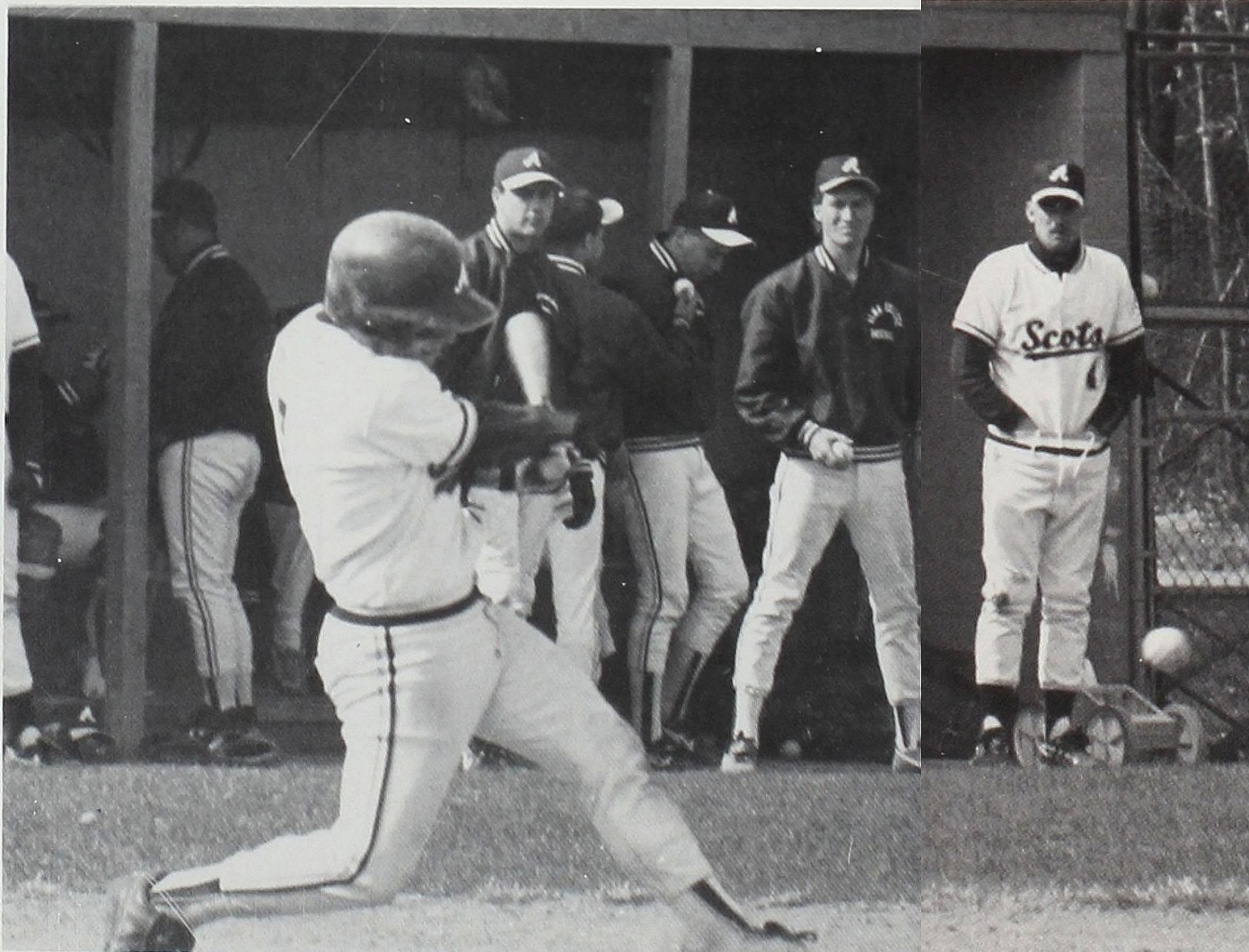

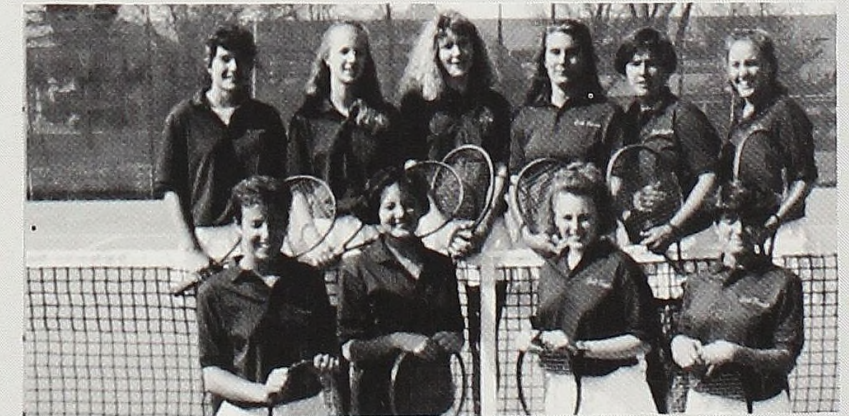

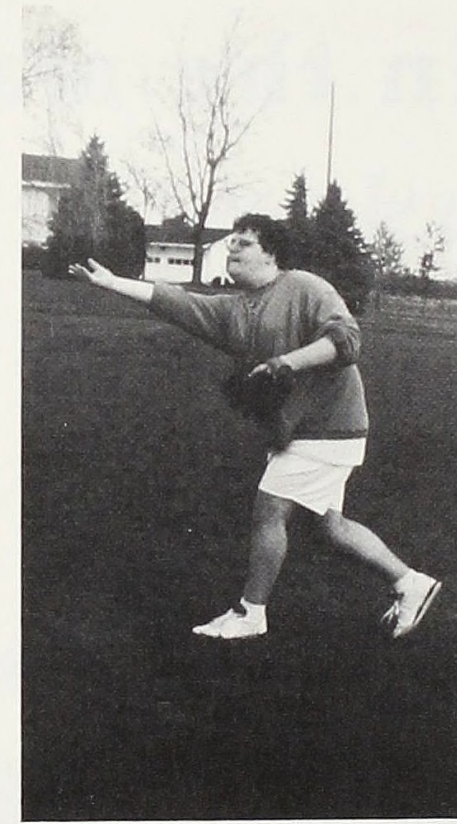

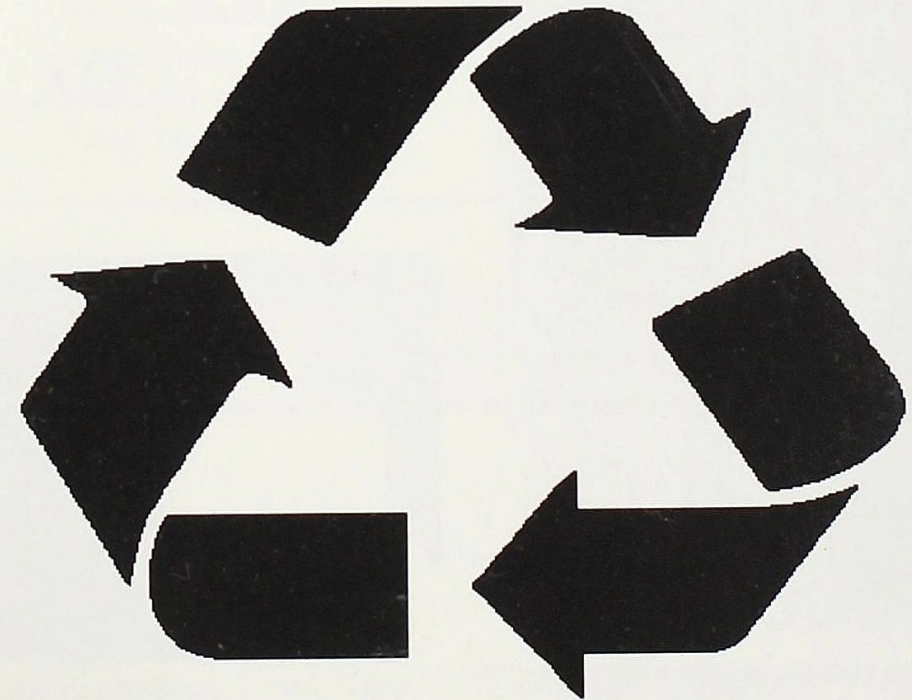

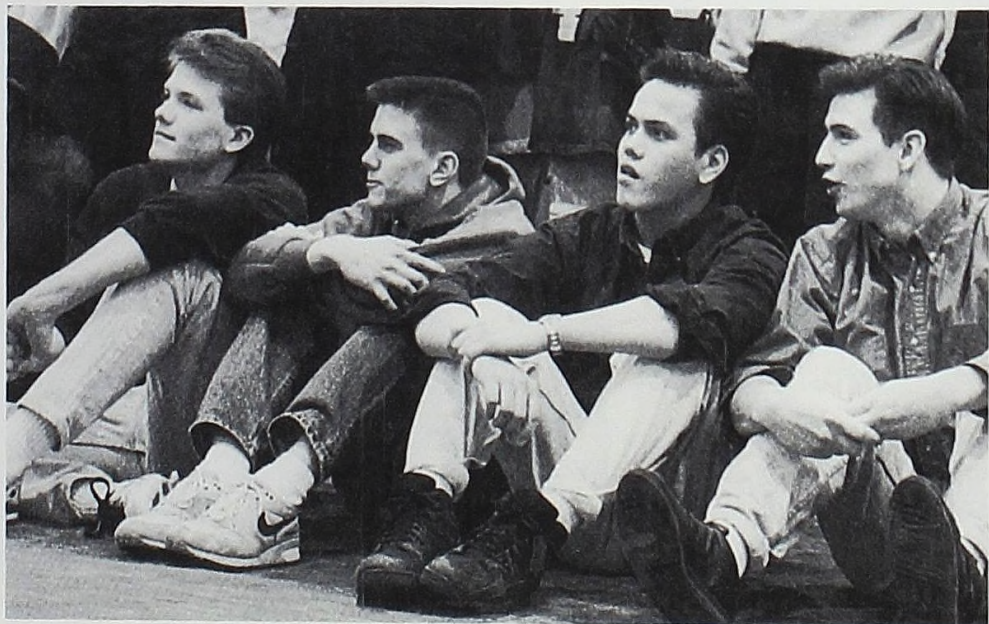

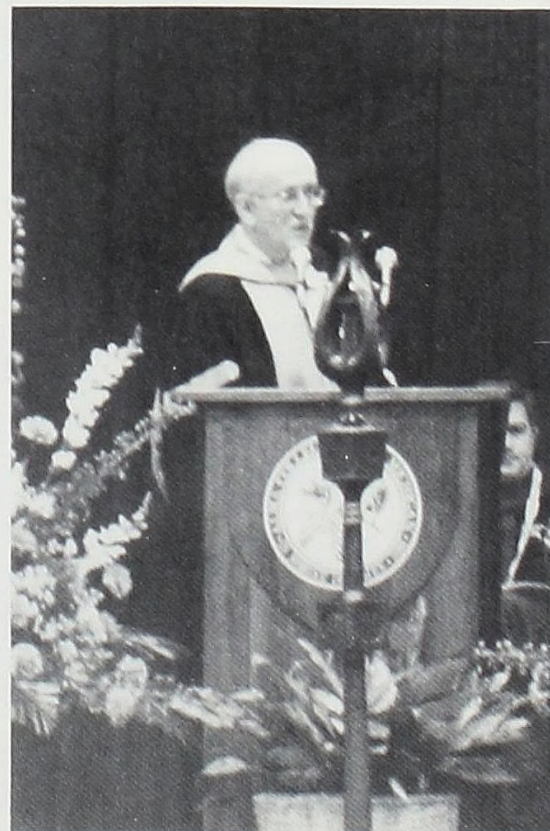

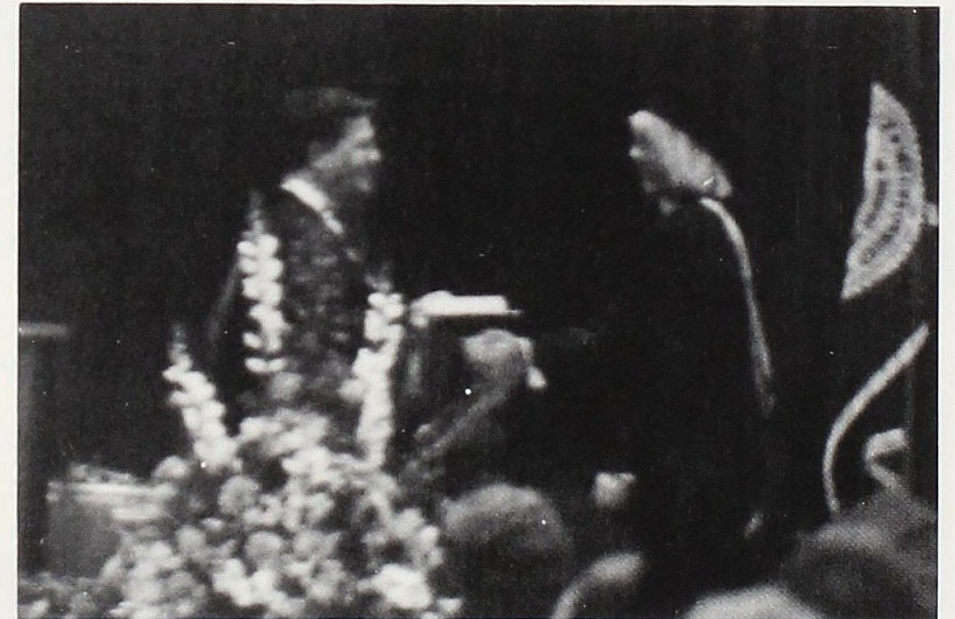

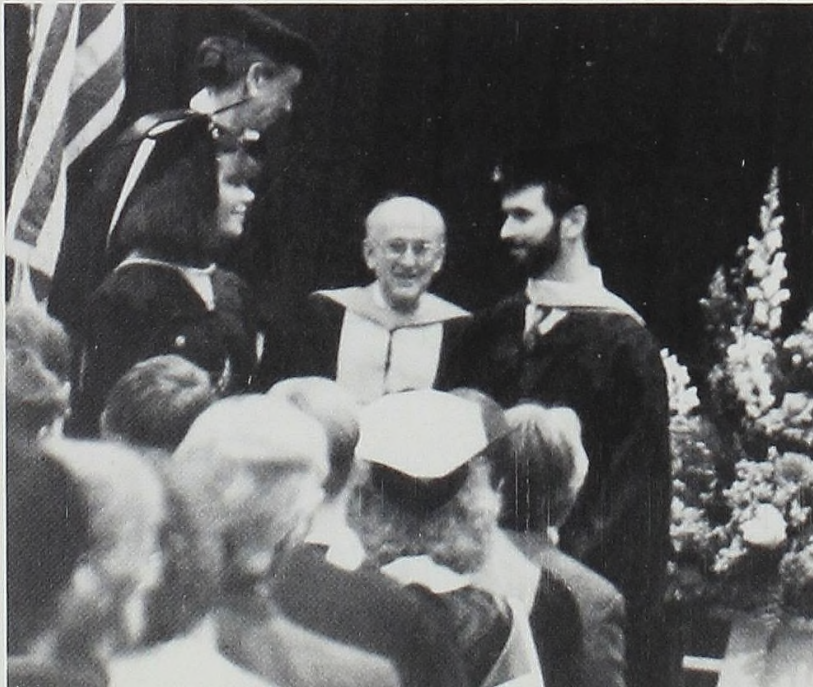

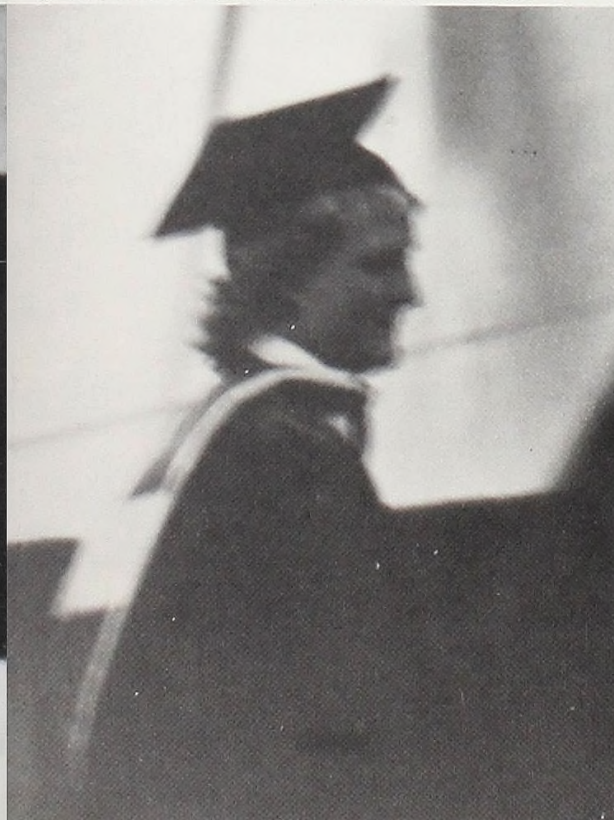

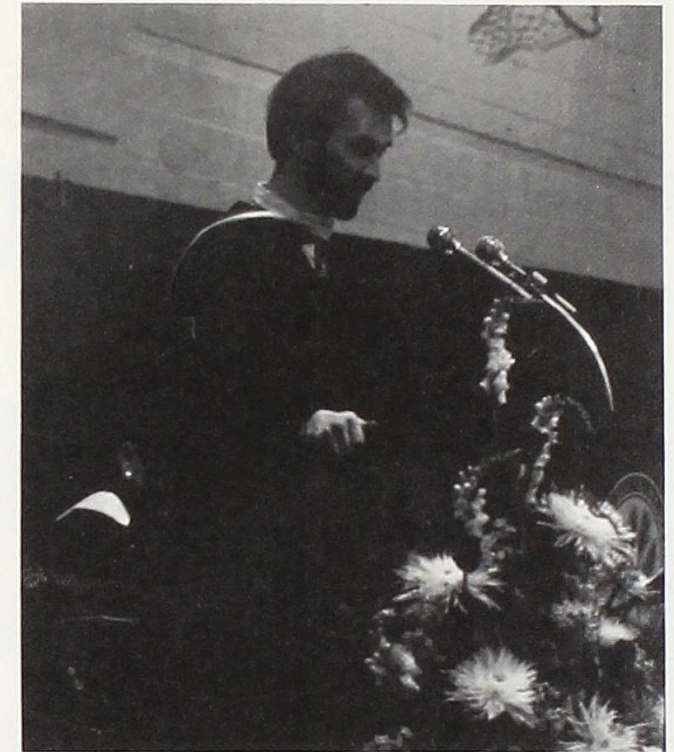
